U.N.A. INCREASES INSURANCE AND AGE LIMITS

Recently the Ukrainian National Association issued copies of a brochure to all its branch secretaries and organizers explaining the changes in the By-Laws...

In accordance with the By-Laws, male members heretofore were accepted for an amount of insurance not exceeding \$3,000, and only up to age 55...

The following are the limits of amounts of insurance for various ages: between 16 and 35 not exceeding \$5,000; 36 and 45 \$3,500; 46 and 50 \$2,500; 51 and 55 \$1,500; 56 and 60 \$500.

Heretofore the U.N.A. issued 4 different classes of insurance for adult members, namely, Whole Life (Class W), Whole Life With Dues Ceasing At Age 70 (Class O), 20-Payment Life (Class P), and 20-Year Ehdowment (Class E).

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A person 18 years of age may be insured in Class W for \$1,000 in-

urance for \$1.00 monthly or \$18.39 annually. The old rates were \$1.56 monthly or \$17.67 annually.

A person 18 years of age may be insured in Class P for \$1,000 insurance for only \$2.35 monthly or \$26.99 annually.

A person 18 years of age may be insured in Class E for \$1,000 insurance for only \$4.23 monthly or \$48.39 annually.

A person 18 years of age may be insured in Class O-65 for \$1,000 insurance for only \$1.85 monthly or \$21.18 annually.

We stressed that the new dues in Class P are lower than the old dues for young people because this class of insurance is very popular.

The reader should understand that the rates for ages other than 18 are different and reflect different comparisons with the old rates.

The Myth of Slavic Unity

(Concluded)

There has been an almost endless amount of paper wasted in efforts to prove that there is only one great Slavic literature, of which all the national literatures are a part.

The Stamp of One's People

There is hardly an outstanding author in any of the Slavic literatures who does not bear the stamp of his own people and their mode of thinking.

The events of the last years have brought into disrepute the efforts to determine the essentials of national character. It has been painfully easy to group together scattered data to produce preconceived results.

tional, between the purely accidental and the deep seated and the vital elements of people. Yet it is a striking coincidence that throughout the centuries the various Slavic peoples have maintained that role with which they emerged into history.

Pan-Slavism, Pan-Germanism, Pan-Latinism

From any point of view, a comparison of the various Slav characters as a basis for united action is as futile as the hopes and efforts of the Pan-Germanism of the past.

For the adherents of these ideas, language and the possibilities of language relationships are the all-important items. They are not concerned with history, with national ideals, with the concrete manifestations of life.

of the Balkan Slavs proceeds along the general pattern of the Mediterranean area, whether the Czechs have been under the influence of western Europe for centuries and owe to this many of the peculiarities of their culture and national psychology.

The Revival of Idealistic Theories

It is easy to see how this idea of language can be perverted to suit the interests of the masters of the Kremlin. At the very moment of the foundation of the Soviet regime, Lenin, sure of the success of his ideal internationalism, was ready to cast aside any and all linguistic theories for the success of his experiment.

Now under the new dispensation, Moscow became the elder brother of the Slavs. It was from Moscow that they were to learn how to run their lives; it was from Moscow that they were to receive new ideas to adopt new modes of living.

ideal citizens and subjects of the new Soviet Union, the new hope of humanity. The standards of living and of thinking in Moscow were destined to be the norms for people everywhere and especially among the Slavs who were henceforth to be considered as speaking merely variants of the Muscovite language, even though unfalsified history knows of older forms of the Slav tongues.

Genetics and Language Support

The Muscovite theories have received added support in Kremlin circles from the Soviet theories in both genetics and language. Under both of these as exemplified by Lenin and Marx, it is possible to change all inherited characteristics exactly as it is to be presumed that languages will tend to become similar as they approach the ideal form of human speech.

For more than two centuries the Ukrainians have felt the full weight of the tsarist efforts to remodel their culture and ideals on Muscovite lines and to deny their own individuality as a nation and its people.
