## AMONG YOUR VALUABLES

Every once in a while the newspapers would run advertisements, inserted by banking institutions, entitled "Is Your name in This List?" All the persons named in the list are depositors, but they haven't been heard from for a long time and the banks are trying to locate them. What happened to these lost depositors and why don't they claim their money? Well, some have lost their bankbooks and don't know what to do. Some moved away and don't know what to do. Some, believe it or not, simply forgot that they have bank accounts. Some died without letting anyone know of their assets. And some believe that their money is safe in the bank and will earn interest throughout the years, not realizing that their prolonged absence from the bank may render their accounts inactive. Of course the banks locate some of their lost depositors, but many remain in the missing list and their funds eventually are disposed of according to law.

Although the Ukrainian National Association is a fraternal benefit society it has troubles similar to those of a banking institution in that it has money to pay to persons who cannot be located. Many of these people are beneficiaries of deceased members, and others are members who do not realize that their insurance certificates are valuable. You U.N.A. insurance certificate is valuable. Read it and pay special attention to the table of equities. You will note that the certificate provides for cash value, extended insurance and paid up insurance. If there should be a time when you cannot pay dues any longer you can surrender the certificate for its cash value (or arrange for a loan at a low rate of interest and so keep the certificate in force by continuing to pay dues); or you can apply for paid up insurance and be insured for the rest of your life for a reduced

## Hail Maryland University

The football team of the University of Maryland has just been acclaimed by the experts as the Number One Gridiron Team of the nation. Having played a tough schedule against major opponents, it finished the 1953 season, unbeaten and untied. That is something of which the Maryland faculty, its undergraduates and alumni can be highly proud.

But the University of Maryland can take even more pride in another and far more important achievement. Not with any intent to belittle the heroic performances of football gladiators, there really are more important things in higher educational circles than mastery of the pigskin. Some eight years ago, Dr. H. C. Byrd, President of the University of Maryland, took cognizance of that fact, and went into action.

Dr. Byrd realized that the educational institutions of this country, with rare exceptions, had been remiss in teaching American history. There is nothing in that history. There is nothing in that history of which to be ashamed, but on the contrary, it is the story of the heroic men and women who took a wilderness and in three centuries developed it into the greatest civilization the world has ever known. It is the most gripping, exciting and inspiring study the youth of his country can undertake.

And so in 1945 Dr. Byrd announced that henceforth the University of Maryland would include in its curriculum, required courses of study in America's history, government and literature. In doing so he stated that, "It behooves us to develop men and women in this country who can interpret America to other Nations."

One would have thought that in projecting the teaching of American history at the University of Maryland, Dr. Byrd would have had the encouragement cheaply enough to compete in price with the electricity we now get from steam, heated by coal.
