INSTALLATION OF METROPOLITAN BOHACHEVSKY — A HISTORICAL EVENT IN UKRAINIAN-AMERICAN COMMUNITY

Today, on November 1st, a truly great and historical event will take place in Philadelphia's Convention Hall, when Archbishop Constantine Bohachevsky will be installed as the first Ukrainian Catholic Metropolitan in the United States.

Great Array of Catholic Dignitaries Expected

According to a communique by the "General Committee for the Erection of the Metropolitan for Ukrainian Catholics in the United States," the installation celebrations will draw a great number of Catholic prelates and priests and 15,000 faithful.

Ukrainian Catholic Church — Most Important Among Eastern Rite Churches

The Ukrainian Catholic Church is one of the largest from the viewpoint of membership and best organized among the various Churches of the Eastern Rite.

Significance of Ukrainian Catholic Metropolitanate

The new Ukrainian Catholic Metropolitanate was created last August by the late Pope Pius XII, as one of the far-sighted steps in the reorganization and strengthening of the Ukrainian Catholic Church in the free world.

There is a general misconception in the United States about Eastern Catholicism, and there is a definite tendency on the part of a few Russian Catholics here to monopolize the name and give it a Russian character, even if only for propaganda purposes.

It is recalled that the Ukrainian Catholic Church in Western Ukraine and Carpatho-Ukraine was brutally destroyed in 1945-46 by the Soviet Russian government in its ruthless drive against the Ukrainian people and the Catholic Church as such.

The Russians arrested all the Ukrainian Catholic bishops, including Metropolitan Slipy, and sentenced them, on spurious charges of "high treasons" against the Soviet state, to various prison terms. Many of the 3,000 Catholic priests of Western Ukraine have been executed or exiled and some are hiding underground to this very day.

It was in defense of the Ukrainian Catholic Church that Pope Pius XII issued on December 23, 1945 his famous encyclical, Orientales omnes Ecclesias, in which he deplored the barbaric persecution of Ukrainian Catholics by Moscow.

Later, on December 15, 1952, Pope Pius XII issued another encyclical, Orientales ecclesias, singling out Ukraine, Rumania and Bulgaria as the most persecuted countries by Communist Moscow.

Subsequently, we saw the steady development of the Ukrainian Catholic Church as demonstrated by the creation of new exarchies, eparchies and metropolitanates, e m b r a c i n g

From time to time scholars of many countries meet at international congresses. Their purpose is to co-ordinate research in the arts and sciences, to discuss methods of work, to inform and report on progress in the respective fields of human knowledge, and to become personally acquainted with their colleagues from other nations.

A number of congresses of this kind were held in Europe this summer; the International Congress of Mathematicians in Edinburgh; the International Convention of Philosophers at Rome; the 4th International Congress of Slavists at Moscow; the 6th International Congress of Onomastic Sciences (which are related to the personal and place name) at Munich.

Some of the congresses were attended by American scholars; in Moscow, the Canadian delegation was headed by Professor J. St. Clair-Sobell, chairman of the Slavonic Department of the University of British Columbia, that of the U.S.A. by Dr. R. Jacobson of Harvard.

This writer was an official Canadian delegate to the Congress of Onomastic Sciences at Munich. The congress was attended by more than 500 specialists in the field of place and personal names, who represented many countries, among them Canada and the U.S.A.

Faith in Democracy Said To Be Most Effective Weapon

The spread of our faith in freedom and democracy over the entire world was advocated as a means of combatting the expansionist aims of Imperialist Russia by Dr. Paul Yuzyk, prominent Ukrainian Canadian scholar, of the Department of History and Slavic Studies, University of Manitoba, reports The Brandon Daily Sun (September 25th last), which is Western Manitoba's daily newspaper.

Dr. Yuzyk was addressing the Seventh International Relations Conference of students of Brandon College and Minot State Teachers' College.

Speaking on "Russia and the Captive Nations," the Manitoba professor outlined the Russian plan for domination of the world developed over the past five centuries. Beginning with the Ivans and progressing through the reigns of Peter the Great and Catherine the Great to the present day leadership of Russia, the speaker disclosed three dominant features in the history of the country.

Dealing first with the imperialist plan for expansion he showed that Russian had always moved in the same direction west into Europe, south into the Near East and east into Asia.

Those who preach appeasement at this time, who would have us back off in the face of Red threats, are displaying a shocking ignorance of this atheistic menace. As a veteran of two World Wars, and a delegate to many international conferences, I have met the communists face-to-face and know their evil tactics. The only language the Soviets understand is tough-minded strength backed by a national defense second to none. I pledge my efforts in the Senate to a continuation of that policy by this nation. I pledge to continue my opposition to the recognition or entrance into the United Nations of godless Red China—a government with the blood of free men on its hands. As a part of this effort, I shall do everything possible to insure a continuation of our active participation in the United Nations and the pursuit of a foreign policy grounded on principles of morality and morality and right. I pledge to work unceasingly for the President's immigration recommendations, which I have sponsored for years in

As for the Russian desire to make us believe Ukraine is a Russian province "on the border of Russia," we may be able to discount this wholly unfair inference by going back to the 12th century. In this century Ukraine is known far and wide, as well as locally, by her ancient name, Rus. In this same century Rus is already referred to by her native population as "Ukraine." Muscovy (the ancient name of present day Great Russia) began her formation as a state in this same 12th century. This formation, according to Great Russian historians, was not completed even in the 13th century. In view of the above, where in the name Ukraine was already used as a synonym for Rus by the population of Rus-Ukraine as early as the 12th century, at which time the founding of the Muscovite state was only beginning and its territory as yet possessed no common, all-embracing name, whether it be "Muscovy," or the latter appropriated from the Rus-Ukrainian people name of "Russia," the Great Russian claim that Ukraine means a Russian province "on the frontier of Russia" defeats itself. For the name, Ukraine, to the Ukrainian people bearing the same meaning in the 12th century that it bears today, antedates Muscovy or Great Russia. And what is the meaning of that the name "Ukraine" holds for the Ukrainian people? Well this question has been answered by Prof. Serge Shelukhin, who carried on and published a considerable research

With the New York Yankees stacking their tremendous comeback after being down 1 and 3 in the recent World Series, and thus regaining the title as World Champions, the baseball season closed with things once again normal. Steve Souchock, former New York Yankee first baseman who later played 3rd base and the outfield for the Chicago White Sox and Detroit Tigers, won his second straight championship as the manager of the Yank's Binghamton (N. Y.) Barons farm team in the Eastern (A) League. Thus, Souchock and Monchak, both World War II veterans who served with great honor and distinction, are rising young men of promise in the two best run organizations in basketball, New York and Milwaukee, and perhaps both these lads may make it to the majors again as managers some day. John Logan, Milwaukee Braves shortstop who had his worst season in baseball this past season, looked like a great thorn in the Yanks' side in the recent series, but fizzed out in the last couple of games as did his team-mates. Myron "Moe" Drabowsky, born in Halychyna, Western Ukraine, and brought here at an early age, had arm trouble and thus suffered a disappointing 11 lost campaign for the Chicago Cubs. Drabowsky, who wrote his dad is Ukrainian, received a bonus estimated from 50 to 80 thousand dollars three seasons ago. Moe, who starred on the baseball team at Trinity College in his home area or Hartford, Conn., is attending Trinity to complete his credit requirements for a degree in Business Administration. With that bonus, the lad could teach the course. Decentralization Believed Stranglehold in Russia

Decentralization of government and of economic control has strengthened the "stranglehold" the Soviet Union has on its people, Walter V. Chopyk of Buffalo charged here Tuesday. Factory Workers' Earnings and Buying Power Rise

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Spendable earnings of factory production workers continued to edge upward in July as hourly pay rose, the U. S. Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics reported. The buying power of these earnings also increased despite a small rise in consumer prices of goods and services. A factory production worker with 3 dependents received \$75.88 a week on the average, after Federal income and social security taxes had been deducted. A walker without dependents received \$68.46. These figures were about 30 cents higher than in June and were at a record high for July. Buying power remained below the July 1957 level, but the over-the-year gap—a little over 1 percent—was smaller than in the previous 10 months. The Bureau reported that consumer prices in United States cities rose 0.2 percent between June and July. Higher prices for transportation, food, and medical care accounted for the advance. Prices of housing and recreation declined slightly. The July Consumer Price In-
