about the nations of the Soviet Union. We have sympathy and give support to the Asiatic and African nations in their struggle for independence. Why do we ignore the European nations occupied by our enemy - Russia? Why do we support Russian imperialism against them?

According to the 1958 edition of the Encyclopaedia Americana, Kiev is the capital of the Ukrainian Soviet Socialist Republic. "The population of the Ukraine, according to election districts in 1950 was 40,800,000. The population of the Ukraine is the most highly urbanized in the U.S.S.R., over one-third of the people living in urban settlements..."

Do not let us make the same mistake towards those people as the Germans did in 1941-45. I believe that our duty is to give them at least as much moral support as possible in their struggle for independence. This support should be viewed not only from a humanitarian standpoint, but also we must think that our defense lines lie not solely on our east and west coasts, but between Russia and the Baltic states, White Ruthenia, Ukraine, and the other territories. These occupied countries are, without a doubt, our best friends.

A Successful Musical Career of Talented Ukrainian-American

Editor's Note: Under the title, "Fair Amount of Corn Pays Off for Bill Gale," Reporter Kay Gardella wrote in the January 4, 1959 Sunday News the "success story" about Bill Gale, well-known Ukrainian-American New York musician. The article, accompanied by Bill Gale's picture, reads:

Bill has more than one string to his musical bow. He and his zany band have recorded more than 1,500 best-selling records in more than 40 foreign languages. For each country, he played a different instrument (clarinet - Balkans, accordion - Sweden, maracas - Latin America), and used various names - "Wasył Gula," "Guillermo," "Wiejska Balowa," and Willie Bumchek, depending on the country involved.

Gale, a tall, bespectacled product of New York's lower East Side, is bandmaster on NBC-TV's "County Fair," which is a 4:30 P.M. Monday through Friday feature.

At 13, Bill began to take dollar-an-hour violin lessons. Entertaining even then, he started a school of his own, teaching 25 neighborhood kids to fiddle - at 25 cents a lesson.
