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IVAN FRANKO

Our Ukrainian American youth has more in common with Ivan Franko, the great Ukrainian patriot, poet and prose writer, than it realizes.

From his very youth to old age, it should be well worth recalling, Franko and the Ukrainian youth were inseparable.

To tell the true tale of Franko's life, we must recall the fact that the old order of his day was ultra-reactionary, with but little vision.

It was at this juncture that young Franko appeared. Although endowed with an unusual poetic spirit, he was a great realist nevertheless.

With a flaming pen he sought to show that the Ukrainian people's strength was being frittered away through inertia, illusions and vain dreams.

But like the prophet that he was, Franko found his efforts not only misunderstood but met with hostility as well.

Nevertheless, Franko remained true to his convictions. His courage did not falter; nor did he spare himself in the least in giving vent to his teachings through the medium of his genius-like talents.

But what gave him most strength and courage to hammer away at public indifference and hostility was the confidence Ukrainian youth had in him.

So it is no wonder, then, that, on the occasion of the 25th anniversary of his literary career, in 1898, the Ukrainian youth thus addressed Ivan Franko:

"With your unremitting toil you have raised a generation that bow its head before you, and regards you as its father, leader, and teacher!"

The same words could be well repeated by our Ukrainian American youth today. For in Franko's life and works can be found inspiration to kindle the hearts of the most indifferent.

The Western diplomats are well aware of this but at the outset of the Conference they were too polite and too desirous of relieving tensions to remind Gromyko of his country's record in international relations.

Khrushchev — Flexible Apparently Khrushchev, who is thoroughly flexible in his choice of means, grasped almost immediately the situation.

The Western package was drawn up in an effort to relieve the tensions between East and West and to guarantee the rights of the people of West Berlin to continue to enjoy those liberties which they have during the past years.

It is already clear that the amount of progress that is to be made will depend upon what he regards as necessary to bring about a summit conference. Yet what is the point of the summit conference? Here we are completely at a loss, for it is chimerical to believe that he is preparing, once he meets with the leaders of the other states, to make any grand gesture which at one fell swoop is going to guarantee that Communism is going to accept the doctrine of coexistence and to remain satisfied within its present sphere of control.

So far as we have sober logic to back us, the conference is to be called primarily because Stalin conferred alone with Churchill and Roosevelt and in 1955 when Khrushchev was not fully in power he had to share with Bulganin meetings with the Western leaders.

On the other hand, Gromyko has a far more simple plan which can be understood by the underdeveloped countries, even better than it can by those peoples who have been on the firing line between East and West.

Senator Kennedy Introduces Three Point Immigration Program

American spirit of welcome for the oppressed and persecuted of all nations and religions and the American tradition of freedom and equality of treatment for all."

Hearings are scheduled upon this bill, as well as other immigration bills introduced by Senator Kennedy and others, beginning May 20.

There are, in addition, various minor changes in the law. In introducing the bill Senator Kennedy stated that it was the purpose of the bill to "eliminate discrimination in our immigration laws and restore the principles of equality and humanity."

The Allied package was defective by its very nature for it committed the West to the same inconclusive attitude toward the satellite states that it had previously adopted when it recognized the Communist ambassadors from these states without regard to whether or not they represented anything but Moscow.

Gromyko's Action In the first round of the conference, with the exception of a few attacks on Chancellor Adenauer, Gromyko has courtously but inflexibly called for the implementation of Khrushchev's ultimatum to the West.

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UNA SHOWS GAINS FOR APRIL

The membership figures as of the end of April will show that the Ukrainian National Association admitted a total of 422 new members during the month, resulting in an increase of 147.

Branch 427 of St. Catherine's, Ont., comes into the April picture with 13 new members.

Also worthy of mention is Branch 361 of New York City with 9 members. Close behind are Branches 266 of Amsterdam, N. Y., 341 of Windsor, Ont., and 397 of Philadelphia, each with 8 members.

Additional details, such as names of organizers, leaders in certain categories, and the like, will appear in the UNA "Tribune" section of Svboda, to be published soon.

There are still 8 months remaining (May to December) in the current UNA 65th Anniversary membership campaign.

It is apparent that it will take more than 400 new members per month for the UNA to reach its goal of 75,000 members before December 31st.

The 20 branches mentioned accounted for 235 of the new members admitted during April, which is more than half of the total for the month.

It is long past the time when we should have made it clear to the world the American people are reconciled to the idea of discrimination and we owe both ourselves and foreign nations the duty to be fair to all nationals.

Mr. President, the bill I am introducing would substitute for the present national origin quota formula a system of immigration visa distribution based on a first-come, first-served principle.

A total annual quota of 250,000 would be authorized. This number was selected as one which will authorize a substantial number of immigrants without having any adverse effects on our economy.

These 250,000 are divided into three groups. The first group includes brothers, sisters, grandparents, great-grandparents, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, aunts, uncles, nieces and nephews of citizens and permanent resident aliens.

The second group consists of persons who have special skills and qualifications needed by America. They would be entitled to 50,000 visas per year.

The third group consists of "new seed" immigrants. They would be entitled to 50,000 visas per year.
