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PRESIDENT KENNEDY ASKED TO ISSUE "CAPTIVE NATIONS WEEK" PROCLAMATION

DR. DOBRIANSKY, NCNC CHAIRMAN, URGES 'ALLIANCE FOR FREEDOM' DRIVE

WASHINGTON, D.C.—In a letter to President Kennedy the chairman of the National Captive Nations Committee, Dr. Lev E. Dobriansky, called for the issuance of an early Proclamation of "Captive Nations Week" (July 15-21), stating: "We have never believed, nor do we now, that under your leadership we are to 'accommodate' in thought, faith or action the barbaric imperio-colonialist enterprise of Moscow and Peking."

Pointing to the two successive Eisenhower Proclamations in 1959 and 1960, Dr. Dobriansky suggested to the President that he follow up his 1961 Proclamation with one in Philadelphia on Independence Day to "crystallize the Alliance for Freedom we uphold in behalf of all the captive nations."

"Captive Nations Week" came into being as a result of the passage of the Captive Nations Week Resolution by Congress in July 1959, and has been observed annually throughout the country since 1959. Plans are now being completed for numerous city-wide ceremonies under the sponsorship of the Mayors of our larger cities.

The National Captive Nations Committee, whose Honorary Chairman is former President Herbert C. Hoover, is composed of Senators, Congressmen, Governors and leaders in all walks of life including labor leaders, industry executives, university presidents, newspaper editors and publishers, and civic, patriotic and ethnic groups.

The text of the letter to President Kennedy is as follows:

"Dear Mr. President: In all major cities throughout the country preparations are under way for the nationwide observance of Captive Na-

tions Week. This third anniversary of the Week falls in the period of July 15-21. The 1962 Week promises to surpass in scope and spirit the previous observances.

"As you know, on the basis of Public Law 86-90, former President Eisenhower issued Proclamations for the Week in 1959 and 1960. His successive Proclamations were hailed by all freedom-conscious Americans as a solid step forward in the encouragement and spiritual sustenance of all the captive nations in Eurasia. Your ringing Proclamation last year was received with equal enthusiasm and gratitude across the Nation."

"Expressing the feelings and hopes of associated communities and groups which are now planning their observances, we look to your early Proclamation of the 1962 'Captive Nations Week.' May we suggest that your forthcoming appearance in Philadelphia on July 4 would provide an excellent occasion for the issuance of the Proclamation. Since you rightly placed particular stress on national independence in your 1961 Proclamation, it appears to us that the solemn occasion of our own Independence Day celebration in the City of Brotherly Love would crystallize the Alliance for Freedom we uphold in behalf of all the captive nations."

"Your early Proclamation will doubtlessly inspire Americans even to greater efforts in spotlighting world attention on the totalitarian Russo-Chinese Empire. We have never believed, nor do we now, that under your leadership we are to 'accommodate' in thought, faith or action this barbaric imperio-colonialist enterprise of Moscow and Peking."

A new book by Franklin Mark Osanka, entitled Modern Guerrilla Warfare, published by the Free Press of Glencoe, contains a whole chapter on the "Guerrilla Warfare in Ukraine," a reprint of the article by Enrique Martinez Codo, which appeared in the November 1960 issue of Military Review and subsequently in the Autumn 1961 issue of The Ukrainian Quarterly.

NEW YORK (EPS).—The Lithuanian exiles in the United States have voiced the demand that in case of the creation of a new free system of order in East Central Europe it would be necessary, among other things, to attach the districts of Grodno and Bialystock, at present part of the Polish People's Republic, to the Lithuanian state. This claim was advanced, in particular, by the Lithuanian exile political leader V. Mantvydas in the periodical Karys (The Fighter) which appears in the United States.

MAYOR OF NEW YORK CITY PROCLAIMS "CAPTIVE NATIONS WEEK"



On Tuesday, July 3, 1962 the Hon. Paul R. Screvane, Deputy Mayor of New York, issued an official proclamation of "Captive Nations Week" signed by Mayor Robert F. Wagner before his departure for Europe. The proclamation was received by the Hon. Thomas Cuite, Councilman of Brooklyn, representing the N.Y. Captive Nations Committee. In the group are Joseph Lesawyer, Walter Dushnyck and Stephen J. Jarema, representing the UCCA, and Ivan Bazarko, Mrs. Catherine Peleshok and Walter Steck, representing the United Ukrainian American Organizations, a branch of the UCCA. Ukrainian girls in costumes are Maria Pryshlak and Lesia Korchly.

NEW YORK, N.Y.—A proclamation by Mayor Robert F. Wagner calling upon the people of New York to observe "Captive Nations Week" from July 15-21 was presented by Acting Mayor Paul R. Screvane to Councilman Thomas Cuite in a ceremony held at City Hall on Tuesday, July 3, at 10:45 A.M.

Attending the ceremony were representatives of Polish, Czech, Ukrainian, Latvian, Lithuanian, and Rumanian nationalities, dressed in their native costumes. Councilman Cuite accepted the proclamation in the name of a number of organizations devoted to the restoration of freedom to the oppressed citizens of lands under dictatorships. These organizations include the Conference of Americans of Central and Eastern European Descent, the National Captive Nations Committee, the Assembly of Captive European Nations, the American Friends of Captive Nations and the American Conference for the Liberation of Non-Russian Nations of the U.S.S.R. Among those attending the issuance of the proclamation were Joseph Lesawyer, Walter Dushnyck and Stephen Jarema, representing the UCCA's Executive Board, and Ivan Bazarko, Walter Steck and Mrs. Catherine Peleshok, chairman, public relations director, and vice-president, respectively, of the United Ukrainian American Organizations of Greater New York, a branch of the UCCA.

The City's proclamation is in line with a resolution adopted by Congress urging "Captive Nations Week" as a national observance. (Text of proclamation follows.)

Whereas: In accordance with the Congressional Resolution designating the third week of July as "Captive Nations Week," the people of this country believe that: the subjugation of any nation, state, or municipality under rule of dictatorship or tyranny is evil; and

Whereas: harmonious unification of the diverse elements of our free society has led the people of the United States to have a thorough understanding of the aspiration of their fellow man and to recognize the natural interdependency of all nations and people in every phase of our civilization; and

Whereas: domination of any part of the world's population by power constitute a mockery of freedom and is detrimental to natural bonds of understanding between the citizens of the United States and other peoples.

Now, therefore, I, Robert F. Wagner, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby proclaim the week of July 15-21, 1962, as "Captive Nations Week" in New York City, and do call attention to the fact that we desire through peaceful means, the restoration of basic rights to all peoples wherever dictatorship exists so that these peoples may enjoy the righteous principles of a true parliament of the world and an indestructible brotherhood of man.

Pittsburghers to Observe "Captive Nations Week"

PITTSBURGH, Pa.—The Ukrainian community in Pittsburgh and vicinity will join with other nationalities in observing "Captive Nations Week" by attending a giant Freedom Rally to be held in Kenwood Park on Sunday, July 15, 1962.

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Special Articles on Captive Nations Featured in "The Ukrainian Quarterly"

NEW YORK, N.Y. — Three separate articles in the Spring issue of The Ukrainian Quarterly are devoted to the refutation of historical inaccuracies about Ukraine, as they appeared in public pronouncements of our policy-making officials. One of these, of course, is the ignominious utterance of the Secretary of State Dean Rusk in his letters to Congressman Howard W. Smith, Chairman of the House Rules Committee, in which Mr. Rusk expressed his opposition to the establishment of a permanent House Committee on Captive Nations. A similar incongruity was made in the State Department bulletin, Soviet Affairs Notes (No. 158), which stated that "the term 'Ukraine' in itself is a modern political rather than historical term. It was invented in the nineteenth century by nationalists seeking to detach the southwestern borderlands of Russia from the Czarist empire." Since both of these statements reveal complete lack of knowledge of Eastern European history, The Ukrainian Quarterly presents elaborate and historically documented articles by Bohdan Krawciw, Gregory D. Gourjian, and George Nakashidze, in which the authors demonstrate conclusively the falseness of the assertions and state the cases of Ukraine, Armenia and Georgia, respectively. Prof. Clarence A. Manning's article "The State Department, Russia and the Cold War" represents an analysis of the causes behind our policy-making officials' failure to understand the tenets of Russian Communist ideology and tactics at a perilous time in our history. The editorial, "Anti-Semitism in the U.S.S.R.: Moscow's Double-Edged Weapon" discusses the recent cases of anti-Semitism in the U.S.S.R. as evidenced by the Soviet government's legislative and executive measures against Jewish religious observances coupled with arrests and imprisonment under the guise of "speculation and crimes against the state." A parallel is drawn to similar cases of religious persecution of Ukrainians in the U.S.S.R., so as to refute the false myths and fables of Ukrainian anti-Semitism, propagated by some circles abroad thus playing into the hands of the Kremlin rulers. A timely article on Free China by Prof. Lev E. Dobriansky, who travelled recently to the Far East, and an article by Prof. John P. Pauls, "The Russian Academy of the Ukrainian Language," are valuable contributions to this issue of The Quarterly. The book reviews in this issue analyze several publications: Hugh Seton-Watson's The New Imperialism, reviewed by Slava Stetsko; John Armstrong's The Politics of Totalitarianism, reviewed by Clarence A. Manning; Warren Walsh's Russia and the Soviet Union by Nicholas Andrusiak and other reviews on scholarly works dealing with politics and history of the Soviet Union and East Central Europe which were written by Prof. Joseph S. Roucek, Walter Dushnyck, Prof. Lev E. Dobriansky and Prof. Yar Slavutych. "Ukrainica in American and Foreign Periodicals", prepared by L.E.D., concludes the Spring issue 1962 The Ukrainian Quarterly, which is published by the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America.
