WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 22 (Special).—Several U.S. Senators paid tribute to the Ukrainian people on the 45th anniversary of the proclamation of their independence by delivering appropriate speeches and addresses on the floor of the U.S. Senate today. All of them praised the Ukrainian people for their bravery and determination to win back their national freedom and independence which was destroyed by Communist Russia in 1920.

Special prayers were said by Rev. Joseph J. Fedorek, pastor of St. Michael's Ukrainian Catholic Church in Shenandoah, Pa. He was introduced in the Senate by the Hon. Lyndon B. Johnson, Vice President of the United States.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 24.—Congressman Edward J. Derwinski led the House today in commemorating Ukrainian Independence Day, which was postponed from January 22, the day normally observed, since the House was not in session on January 22nd or 23rd.

The special theme emphasized by many speakers was the need for a special House Committee on Captive Nations in order that the true Soviet persecution of Ukraine and other lands behind the Iron Curtain can be properly dramatized before world opinion.

REMEMBER KRUTY!

On January 29, 1963 forty-five years elapsed since the heroic and epic battle at Kruty, in which some 350 Ukrainian students from the schools of Kiev died defending the Ukrainian capital before advancing Red Russian troops on January 29, 1918. They volunteered to serve their native country and went into the battle line fully aware that their courage and patriotism could hardly stop the overwhelming forces of Russian Communist guards.

These young heroes all died in defense of Ukraine. Their heroic deed, like that of the ancient Greeks at Thermopylae, is commemorated every year by Ukrainian youth the world over, except in Ukraine, where such commemoration would amount to high treason and dealt with accordingly.

But the memory of the battle of Kruty will ever live in the annals of the history of the free Ukrainian people as a shining example of supreme sacrifice and patriotism of the Ukrainian youth.

JERSEY CITY, N. J.—An impressive observance of the 45th anniversary of Ukraine's independence was held on Sunday, January 27, 1963 at the Ukrainian Community Center. The commemorative fete was sponsored by the Jersey City Branch of the UCCA. The stirring address at the observance was delivered by the Most Rev. John J. Dougherty, Auxiliary Bishop of Newark and President of Seton Hall University. Moscow Attacks Governor Rockefeller for Proclaiming 'Ukrainian Independence Day'

MOSCOW, Jan. 23 (AP).—The news agency TASS reported today a "groundswell of indignation" among the working people of Ukraine over New York Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller proclamation of a "Ukrainian Independence Day." TASS quoted from letter of workers, one of whom denounced Rockefeller as a "capitalist who has waxed rich on the blood and sweat of millions."

Earlier this week the Governor proclaimed yesterday as "Ukrainian Independence Day," calling it a gesture of "our keen sympathies" with the Ukrainian people's hopes for freedom.

Without saying how the people in Ukraine learned of the Proclamation, TASS cited these reactions from among the "numerous letters" received from Ukrainians:

Pyotr Stepanchuk, building worker, "Hero of Socialist Labor" and Deputy of the Ukrainian Supreme Soviet: "Look who is showing concern for us! Rockefeller, a capitalist who waxed rich on the blood and sweat of millions of people.... (My people) do not need aid from anybody... to our self-appointment benefactor from abroad I say: Don't butt your nose, Mr. Rockefeller, into our Soviet Home."

Nikolai Tarnovsky, a writer who TASS said lived 49 years in the United States: "Don't show yourselves fools! The people of the whole world are well aware that it is your famous

America that lacks freedom. What goes on in your Southern States?.. The Ukrainian people freed themselves long ago, as far back as 1917, when they did away with the rule of the Czars and such magnates as you." Vasilii Rubanyk, chairman of a collective farm: "We do not want your freedom... We have no use for it. American correspondents who visited our collective farm last year expected to see dilapidated huts, but they saw spacious houses, they saw abundance instead of misery. You ask about this from Lauren Soth, the editor of The Des Moines (Iowa) Register-Tribune, and other newsmen. They could not understand how it was possible in such short time and after a devastating war to achieve such successes."

"Voice of America" Broadcasts Observances of Ukrainian Independence in U.S.

WASHINGTON, D. C. (Special).—On January 22, 1963 the Ukrainian desk of the "Voice of America" broadcast to Ukraine an extensive report on the observances of the 45th anniversary of Ukraine's independence held throughout the United States. It stated that the observances were held in commemoration of the 45th anniversary of the independence of Ukraine which was proclaimed on January 22, 1918 and which subsequently was destroyed by Communist Russia. The broadcast also reported that in both houses of the U. S. Congress special prayers for the Ukrainian people were delivered by a Ukrainian Catholic and a Ukrainian Orthodox priest, and that in many States and Cities Governors and Mayors issued special proclamations designating January 22 as "Ukrainian Independence Day" in the time of the anniversary of Ukraine's independence, and finally, that a number of U. S. Senators and Congressmen made appropriate statements on the floor of the Congress to mark this important date in Ukrainian history.

The banquet was sponsored by the Friends of the Ukrainian National Republic, while the first part of the 45th observance, the commemorative concert, was held on Sunday, January 20, 1963 under the sponsorship of the Committee of United Ukrainian American Organizations of Greater New York.

Hota Downs Sitch On Penalty NEW YORK. — The Newark Ukrainian Sitch eleven failed to reach a play-off berth in the New York Indoor tournament, sponsored by the German-American Soccer League, when they were defeated in overtime penalty-kick duel by Hota, S. C. 2-1 last Saturday at the 34th Street Armory here.

Sitch managed to hold the German team to a 1-1 tie in the regulation 15 minute game but lost out when Alex Czayka missed his chance at the penalty. Garcia of Hota converted his shot which gave the team a 2-1 win and eliminated the Ukrainian side from further competition.

Two other American Soccer League teams, Hakoah and Portuguese, were eliminated by Pfalzer S. C., of the German-American premier division, depriving ASL of a representative in the tournament.

Snow Halts Play

The soccer situation goes from bad to worse as the big freeze-up and snow-fall continues. All games in both major soccer leagues last Sunday were canceled because of Saturday night's snowstorm that covered the pitches with six inches of that white stuff.

16 Teams to Compete in Tokyo

The International Football Association (FIFA) — Olympic Committee decided that 16 teams will compete in the final stage of the 1964 Olympic tournament in Tokyo.

After qualifying matches, five European, three African, three Asian, two South American, and one team each from North America and the Caribbean will move into the final round. The defending champion, Yugoslavia, and Japan, which will be the host to the 1964 Olympic games, are exempt from the preliminary matches.

Qualifying matches will be held on a home-and-away basis and must be completed by January 1964. The North American and Caribbean section will hold its tournament in either Los Angeles or Mexico, and the winners will be qualified to go to Tokyo. The North American group will have to play an extra preliminary game with Netherlands Antilles in Surinam. The winner of this game will play against Mexico, Panama, and the United States.

S. Sacharnoski, 86, Dies

MILLVILLE, N. J. — Funeral rites were held for Stephen Sacharnoski, 86, on January 14, 1963, with a Requiem Mass at the Saints Peter and Paul, Ukrainian Church and interment in the church cemetery. The Very Rev. Alex Zaryk, church pastor, conducted the services and paid high tribute to Mr. Sacharnoski's unselfish devotion to religious and other church activities.

In the fall of 1926, he moved his family to Millville, N. J., where he became active in church affairs for a period of over thirty-five years and was a trustee of the Sts. Peter and Paul Church until his demise.

Vancouver, British Columbia, has invited a crack Italian team to play an exhibition game against England's Wolverhampton Wanderers at Vancouver's Empire Stadium next summer.

The Wolves already are scheduled to meet a British Columbia All-Star team and Victoria All-Star team next summer. The Italian team was not identified.

Burnley Beats Spurs

Tottenham Hotspurs' hopes to win the Football Association Cup three times in a row were dashed last week when they were beaten 3-0 by Burnley. The match was played on a treacherous snow-covered pitch with the results that both sides had great difficulty with footing.

The 32,000 fans saw Spurs suffer their first cup defeat since February 1960, when they lost to Blackburn.

Ref. Stoned in Italy

Angry soccer fans stoned a referee and clashed with the police after possessing a visiting team for more than two hours in a match between Como, 1-0, were similar to riots that disturbed a half-dozen Italian matches a week ago.
