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### UNA ASSETS REACH TWENTY-SEVEN MILLIONS

JERSEY CITY, N.J. (Special).—According to the last financial report of the Ukrainian National Association the assets of the organization reached the sum of \$27,000,000.00 at the end of January, 1963. The bulk of the sum, that is, \$19,462,216.56, or 71.87 percent, is invested in bonds, and \$5,916,278.34, or 21.85 percent are invested in mortgages, contracted mostly by members of the UNA.

The UNA assets are divided into various funds which have specific designation provided by insurance laws. The largest

fund is the mortuary and reserve fund, which is \$26,068,900.52 and is designated to cover liabilities of UNA policies. The remaining \$1,000,000.00 comprises all other funds, such as the administration, convention, national and indigent funds, including also the Emergency Fund which now has a total of \$14,890.73 in a special account.

This report is indeed a convincing proof that the UNA is growing financially from year to year, thus contributing generally to the economic betterment of the Ukrainian American community.

### Metropolitan Slipy Moved to Vatican Quarters

VATICAN CITY, Feb. 25 (UPI).—Archbishop Joseph Slipy, Metropolitan of Ukraine, who was released recently by the Russians after 18 years imprisonment, has moved into a new apartment in the Vatican, it was learned today.

The 71-year-old prelate, who arrived in Rome on February 10 after his unexpected release, moved Saturday night from the Abbey of St. Nile in nearby Grottaferrata, where he had spent his first two weeks of freedom.

Although the role Pope John XXIII has in mind for

the Ukrainian Church leader is unknown, the move indicated the Pontiff intended to keep him in Rome, and, presumably, give him a post in the Curia, the Central Administration of the Church.

Archbishop Slipy was given the apartment of the late Nicola Cardinal Canali in a building called the "Little Palace of the Archpriest." The building faces St. Martha Square, in front of a side entrance of St. Peter's Basilica. Metropolitan Slipy's secretary and two Ukrainian Nuns moved into the apartment with him.

### AMERICAN PRESS REPORTS ON RELEASE OF METROPOLITAN SLIPY

#### Ukrainian Prelate Still Silent

EDITOR'S NOTE: In connection with the release of Metropolitan Joseph Slipy, the American press commented extensively on this significant development. Following are some of the comments:

NEW YORK (Special).—After 18 years of silence in Soviet prisons, Archbishop Joseph Slipy, Primate of Ukraine, is still keeping silent, not because he is afraid, but to protect his countrymen who would be sure to suffer reprisals for anything he might say or write about his release from the hands of the Communists.

The new freedom of this great Ukrainian Churchman has been greeted with joy throughout the world and it has inspired the hope that Cardinal Mindszenty of Hungary and other Church leaders and clergy held by the Reds may also be released.

Several prominent Americans, many of them of Ukrainian descent, have issued statements regarding the release of Archbishop Slipy. The Register publishes a sample of these comments.

• Archbishop Ambrose Sanyshyn of Philadelphia, head of 300,000 Ukrainian Catholics in the U. S.: The release of Archbishop Slipy "is an answer to our prayers. It is deeply significant and the full importance will gradually become known. The information he gave Pope John will have a marked influence on the development of the Ukrainian Catholic Church." (Archbishop Sanyshyn left for Rome where he will meet personally with Archbishop Slipy.)

• U. S. Representative Daniel J. Flood of Pennsylvania, honored in 1962 by the Ukrainian Congress of America for his distinguished service on behalf of captive nations, including Ukraine: "My first reaction to the announcement was that the release of the Archbishop was long overdue. We can only

### Prof. Kubyovych Visits University Of Toronto Press, Publisher of 'Ukrainian Encyclopaedia'

#### UKRAINIAN ENCYCLOPEDIA SCHEDULED TO BE ON MARKET IN AUGUST, 1963

TORONTO, Ont. (Special).—Prof. Volodymyr Kubyovych, editor-in-chief of the Ukrainian Encyclopedia and Ukraine: A Concise Encyclopedia, and general secretary of the Shevchenko Scientific Society, spent two days in Toronto, February 24 and 25, 1963, where he consulted with the editors of the University of Toronto Press, which is printing the Ukrainian encyclopedia in English. Accompanied by Anthony Dragan, editor-in-chief of Svoboda, and Dr. George Luckyk of the University of Toronto, Prof. Kubyovych held extensive conferences with Miss M.J. Houston and Mrs. A.M. Magee, editors of the University of Toronto Press, and H.S. Marshall, sales manager of the organization.

In connection with the final reading and checking of galley proofs and page proofs, Prof. Kubyovych will remain in the editorial offices of Svoboda for some time. He is assisted in his work by Z. Snylyk, an editor of The Ukrainian Weekly, who is checking the English language of the manuscript.

While in Toronto, Prof. Kubyovych attended a meeting of the Ukrainian Pedagogues of Canada and met several of his friends whom he had not seen since their migration to Canada.

According to the schedule the breaking of the pages of the encyclopedia will begin on Monday, March 4, 1963 and will be completed by the end of March, 1963. The final part of the volume, the index, is being completed by M. Sosnovsky under the direction of Prof. Luckyk. It is estimated that the printing of the 1,300-page encyclopedia will last about three months and the volume will be on the market in August, 1963.

### U.C.C.A. IN ACTION

On Friday, February 15, 1963 the monthly meeting of the executive board of the UCCA was held in New York City, at which 18 members were present. The agenda of the meeting comprised reports by Dr. Lev E. Dobriansky, UCCA President; Dr. Jaroslav Padoch, UCCA Treasurer; Dr. Matthew Stachiw, Chairman of Information and Publications Commission of the UCCA, and Vasyly Mudry, Staff Director of the UCCA.

Dr. Dobriansky reported on the impressive observances of the 45th anniversary of Ukraine's independence in Washington and subsequent attacks by a few "Russia Firsters" against the Rev. Frederic Brown Harris, Chaplain of the U. S. Senate, for his article on Ukraine, which appeared in his syndicated column throughout the country. Dr. Dobriansky also reported that a brochure of statements and addresses by U. S. Senators and Congressmen on the 45th anniversary of Ukraine's independence will soon be ready for distribution. He also reported on a number of new projects to be carried out by the UCCA in Washington.

Dr. Padoch reported on the financial situation of the UCCA and outlined a new plan for a money raising campaign for the Ukr. Nat. Fund. Several members of the UCCA executive board took part in the discussion, and in view of the importance of the problem, it was decided to bring the subject up again for discussion at the next meeting of the UCCA executive board in March, 1963.

Immediately after news reports regarding the release of Metropolitan Joseph Slipy from Soviet jails was made known in the United States, Dr. Dobriansky in the name of the UCCA, sent a long telegram to the martyred Ukrainian Catholic prelate, wishing him good health and further strength in his efforts on behalf of the enslaved Ukrainian Catholic Church.

NEW YORK.—The New York Ukrainians were defeated by Gotschee, S.C., 2-1, in the quarter-finals of the Indoor Tournament, sponsored by the German-American Soccer League, at the 34th Street Army two weeks ago.

The Ukrainians jumped off to a 1-0 lead but could not hold the German team. Two defensive errors resulted in two quick goals and a surprisingly early defeat for USC.

Among other upsets of the evening was a 2-0 victory gained by the New York Hungaria over the favored Greek-American Sports Club in the finals. With this victory Hungaria took the championship of the tournament.

The weather having cleared a bit, permitted three weeks ago for the Ukrainian Nationals of Philadelphia to play a several times postponed match against the amateur German-Hungarians of Philadelphia. The Nationals were a bit rusty but managed to trounce their rivals to the tune of 5-1.

After the start of the second half Mike Noha came through with one of his solo efforts which resulted in the fourth marker. Czyzowych raised the count to five goals a few minutes later.

The most important event in sports' last week-end was the international track meet at New York's Madison Square Garden. NEW YORK, N. Y., Feb. 14.—The American Bulgarian League honored on Thursday, the Free Europe Committee and "Radio Free Europe" for "effectively countering the efforts of the Communist regime in Bulgaria to enslave her freedom-loving people."

The special awards were presented before a distinguished international audience at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel by Dr. G. T. Obreshkow, President of the American Bulgarian League, to John Richardson, Jr., President of the Free Europe Committee, and Nicholas Pentcheff, Chief of the Bulgarian Desk at "Radio Free Europe" in New York Office.

Speakers included Edward Page, Jr., former U. S. Minister to Bulgaria; Rep. John S. Monagan (Conn.); Rep. John Brademas (Ind.); Leo Cherne, Chairman of the International Rescue Committee; Dr. G. M. Dimitrov, Chairman of the Assembly of Captive European Nations and Dr. Obreshkow. Other guests of honor included Liu Chieh, Permanent Representative to the U. N. from the Republic of China; Ellis Clarke, Permanent Representative to the U. N. from Trinidad and Tobago; Christopher Emmet, Chairman of

the American Friends of the Captive Nations; Alexander Kutt, Vice Chairman of the Assembly of Captive European Nations. Edward Page, Jr., speaking of his experience as U. S.
