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### WEST GERMAN GOVERNMENT ACCUSES MOSCOW IN MURDER OF REBET AND BANDERA

BONN, West Germany. — According to the Bulletin des Presse und Informations-amtes der Bundesregierung (April 25, 1963, No. 73) the government of the Federal Republic of Germany lodged a formal protest against the Soviet Union for the murder of two leaders of the Ukrainian liberation movement, Stepan Bandera and Dr. Lev R. Rebet. The accusation was contained in a diplomatic note delivered to the Soviet Union on April 23, 1963. The protest was based on the findings at the trial of Bogdan Stashynsky in Karlsruhe last fall during which the KGB agent confessed that he committed both murders upon the instructions of the Soviet government.

The text of the German protest read as follows:

"The Ministry of Foreign Affairs has the honor to notify the Embassy of the USSR of the following:

"In October, 1962 a trial was held in the Federal court against Soviet citizen Bogdan Stashynsky. Stashynsky assassinated Lev Rebet in October, 1957 and Stepan Bandera, in October, 1959 with a gas pistol which was handed to him by those who ordered him to commit these murders. Stashynsky was sentenced to eight years of hard labor. According to the findings of the Federal court both crimes were committed upon instructions of official Soviet organs. For this reason the Federal Government is compelled to call the attention of the government of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics that such conduct is sharply contrary to the generally accepted rules of law, especially international law. The government of the Federal Republic of Germany is hereby requesting the government of the USSR to undertake the necessary measures and guarantees to prevent similar action from occurring in the future."

Two affairs are planned for 1963: a picnic to be held at the Ukrainian National Home and a Fall Dance to be held at the Ukrainian Center. Regular meetings are scheduled every first Friday of the month at 8:30 P.M.

OTTAWA. — A 27-year old Soviet seaman, Peter Ilkiw, has given himself up to Canadian authorities and is seeking political asylum in this country, it has been reported here. At present the Department of Citizenship and Immigration is studying his application for admission to Canada.

The Ukrainian-born seaman was on one of the boats of the Soviet fishing fleet, which is currently fishing off the coast of Canada. When his boat pulled into Sydney, Nova Scotia for a few days, the Soviet sailor obtained shore leave, but never returned to his sailing vessel.

The Ukrainian contingent was organized by the United Ukrainian American Organizations of Greater New York, a branch of the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America.

### Ukraine's Freedom — Our Concern, Says Congressman Flood

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following letter written by the Hon. Daniel J. Flood of Pennsylvania, appeared in the April 25, 1963 issue of The Tablet, Brooklyn, N. Y.:

"Would Probe Nations Captured by Soviet"

Dear Sir: The Ukrainian Congress Committee of America and its extensive membership of Americans of Ukrainian ancestry have caused to be published a valuable brochure on the 45th anniversary of Ukraine's independence. The entire project, with which I and others were happy to be associated, is in the fundamental interest of our Nation.

The unusual fiery reaction of Moscow and its puppets to the statements in this brochure underscores once again Moscow's fear of our exposing the Soviet Russian imperio-colonial system in the USSR and bringing to full light the status of the captive non-Russian nations in the Soviet Union. This evidence I shall soon present in our continued effort for a Special Committee on the Captive Nations.

Congress cannot for long ignore the pressing need for such a committee. To satisfy this need and to advance our position in the cold war, my colleagues and I are fighting for the passage of the measure establishing a Special Committee on the Captive Nations. Over two dozen resolutions are now before the House Rules Committee.

You can help us by (1) writing to Hon. Howard W. Smith, Chairman, Committee on Rules, House of Representatives, Washington, D. C., urging that quick action be taken on H. Res. 14 (send me a copy of your letter), and (2) having your Congressman submit a similar resolution.

During the festive and solemn ceremony the ancient chapel was filled with beautiful Ukrainian religious choral music, sung by the Ukrainian seminarians of Rome.

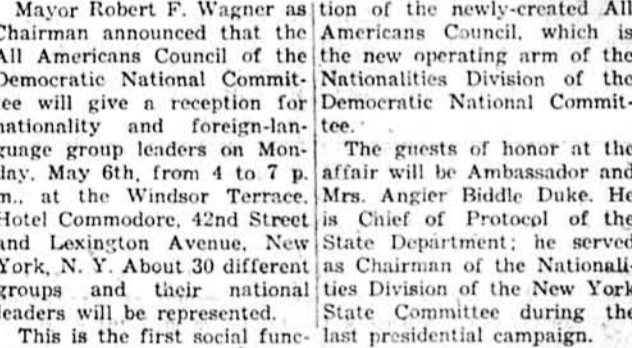
Mr. Zazworsky delivered a moving appeal for concentrated action to organize members.

Ukrainian in Chester, Pa., Beaten in Robbery

EDDYSTONE, Pa. An elderly Chester man who operates a check-cashing service was severely beaten in a robbery recently.

Nicholas Miller, 69, of 716 Morton Ave., a Ukrainian, was struck several times on the head and face.

Police said the robbers apparently got \$400, they missed another \$1,100.

Miller was admitted to Chester Hospital with a fractured skull. He underwent an emergency operation.

His condition was reported as critical. Miller operates a check-cashing service on the second floor of the Baldwin Hotel, 920 Simpson Street.

Chief County Detective Maurice L. Maitland said Miller was found unconscious in a pool of blood behind the hotel about 8 p.m.

Ukrainian Exhibit at Fordham

On April 9, 1963 the five members of the Fordham University Ukrainian American Society sponsored a colorful Easter and Arts Display in the main lobby of the Campus Center. The display consisted of a large table set up in the traditional Ukrainian Easter Dinner, complete with servings for four as well as two side tables with eye-catching Ukrainian Easter eggs, ceramics, carvings, and embroidery.

The display was well-presented by six beautiful girls in native costumes who danced periodically for the delighted student body. The public announcement system of the campus center was especially turned off to permit the playing of rousing Ukrainian melodies and the periodic announcements and political speeches over a specially arranged loudspeaker system.

Politically most effective was the sale and distribution of especially printed copies of the "Voice of Free Ukraine" with its references to the secession. During lunch hours the student body pressed around the display table by the hundreds, asking questions and expressing their shock and indignation about the misfortunes of Ukraine.

Philadelphia Honors Ukrainians

The City Council of Philadelphia approved a resolution Thursday saluting the Ukrainian Nationals for their unparalleled achievement of winning the American Soccer League championship for the third consecutive year.

In the three-year span the Ukrainians had 33 victories, two defeats and six ties, and scored 151 goals while limiting the opposition to 35.

The Council praised the players and officials for their contribution to Philadelphia's fine reputation as a leading sports center.

An engrossed copy of the resolution will be presented to Alexander Yaremko, president of the club.

Egg Dyeing Is Art to Ukrainians

Western New York parents, who pale before the annual job of Easter egg dyeing would stand in awe of the handiwork of their Ukrainian counterparts.

Mrs. Irene Lawriwsky of 6 N. Parade St., has assembled a 150-egg display, to show what a fine art egg dyeing is in her native Ukraine.

The multi-colored eggs replete with innumerable symbols handed from generation to generation since early times, are all brilliantly dyed and hand designed. Some are 20 years old.

Mrs. Lawriwsky came here from Ukraine in 1949. She works in the accounting department at Chevrolet's Tonawanda plant, and also does a Ukrainian radio program on WWOL.

She explained that Easter egg painting is a serious custom in Ukraine.

"We are supposed to have an egg for each member of the family and we never eat them... you wouldn't think of it," she said.

"The most beautiful eggs are put in a basket and taken to church to be blessed. The girl who makes the most beautiful eggs is said to make the best wife."

Ukrainians have been dyeing eggs for 2,800 years, Mrs. Lawriwsky said. It started as a pagan custom to commemorate the coming of spring, she explained, and when Christianity came, the custom was simply carried over for Easter.

Nationals Advance in Lewis Cup

The Ukrainian Nationals, champions of the American Soccer League, advanced in the Lewis Cup play last Sunday by blanking their city rival in the American League, Uhrk Truckers, 6-0, at 29th and Cambria Sts. in Philadelphia.

The loss eliminated Uhrk from further cup competition. Walter Czychowycz, third-ranking scorer in the league, registered a hat-trick to pace the Ukrainian eleven to their victory. The other goal scorers in the game were Carl Yakowina with 2 and Mike Noha, who accounted for one marker.

The Nationals are scheduled to play a further elimination game in the Challenge Cup competition before they finally meet the up-and-coming Giuliana S. C. of the German-American Soccer League. The Nats are expected to overcome the Hurricane S. C. and reach the final.

The elimination games between Ukrainian Nationals and Giuliana S. C. will start in New York and then return to Philadelphia for the second match. Total goals will decide the winner and Eastern finalist. Some soccer writers pick the Nats over Giuliana at 2-1 odds.

USC Downed 2-1

The New York Ukrainians, their line-up weakened, lost another game to Elizabeth S. C. 2-1, last Sunday at the Ukrainian Field in Astoria. The lone Ukrainian goal was scored by Smethorst.

The Elizabeth club is fighting hard to avoid relegation to lower division in the German-American soccer league and has picked up four gift-points from unexpected quarters, namely USC.

Canadian Soccer Opens

The Canadian National Soccer League opened its season last Sunday with two of its top teams playing a 3-3 tie match. The Toronto Ukraina which finished second in the league standings last year came from behind to tie the last year's league champion Olympia before 1,200 spectators.

The Canadian press reported that it was a typical season starter. Both clubs tried out their young players from junior teams. It lacked precision play but the press stated that the play is sure to get better as the season progresses.

Leo Dowhaliuk, who played briefly for Newark Sitch, opened the scoring for Ukraina three minutes after the start of the game with a long curving shot which eluded the Olympia goalie. At the 25th minute of the first half he German eleven tied the score when the Ukrainian goalie was outmaneuvered. Toronto Ukrainians again took the lead seven minutes later when Bill Romaniw slapped in a rebound. Olympia tied the game again and then went ahead 3-2 but Paul Dowhaliuk evened matters before the final whistle.

British Soccer

Manchester United and Leicester City qualified to meet in the Football Association Final, glamor game of the English soccer world, at London's Wembley Stadium May 25.

A single first half goal decided each semi-final.

Italy

Internationale di Milano clinched at least a tie for the Italian Major League Soccer championship Sunday, beating its closest rival, Juventus of Turin, 1-0, before a crowd of more than 80,000 at Turin.

The Sunday games in Italy were marred by riots in which one spectator was killed and a score injured. The outbreaks flared at Naples and Salerno. Thousands of fans invaded the field at Naples to protest a referee's decision. The invaders ripped up goal posts, smashed fences and stands. They besieged the referee and visiting players in dressing rooms before police restored order.

Similar rioting occurred at Salerno between Italy's third league teams where at least 20 people were hurt.
