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POPE JOHN XXIII, "MAN OF PEACE," DIES AT 81 IN ROME MILLIONS THROUGHOUT THE WORLD MOURN THE GREAT PONTIFF — HEADS OF GOVERNMENTS AND LEADERS OF ALL FAITHS SEND MESSAGES OF SYMPATHY

VATICAN CITY, June 3.— Pope John XXIII, the "man of peace and goodness," died today in the fifth year of his Pontificate, leaving his great dream—the unity of all Christians-unrealized. He died after four days of extreme agony and pain at the age of 81. The Pope died clutching a crucifix, and his last words were "Ut unum sint" (That they should be one), the prayer of Jesus Christ at the Last Supper.

His death ended a reign described by many as one of the greatest in the 2,000-year history of the Catholic Church. Pope John XXIII was the 261st occupant of the throne of St. Peter. A gentle man who reached out to all mankind, Pope John XXIII knew that the end was nearing and he died fully satisfied with his fruitful and successful life as the Supreme Pontiff.

Pope John XXIII was elected Pope on October 28, 1958. He was born on November 25, 1881 in the village of Sotto il Monte in Northern Italy, in a family of humble worker.

At his deathbed were his three brothers, a widowed sister, a nephew and nieces and several members of the Papal entourage.

A few days before Pope John's death the American press reported that among the Cardinals and high-ranking Catholic prelates who were at his bedside was also the Most Rev. Joseph Slipy, Metropolitan of the Ukrainian Catholic Church in Western Ukraine, who was released in February, 1963 after 18 years of confinement in Siberia.

Cardinals Preparing to Elect New Pontiff

Roman Catholic Cardinals who are in Rome began preliminary steps for the election of a successor to Pope John XXIII. Machinery for the election was set in motion immediately after the death of Pope John. Speculation about a successor has mentioned four cardinals as favorites:

Giovanni Battista Cardinal Montini, 65-year-old "liberal" Archbishop of Milan and close friend of Pope John XXIII; Gregory Peter Cardinal Agagianian, 67-year-old Armenian; Giovanni Cardinal Urbani, 63, who succeeded Pope John as patriarch of Venice, and Giacomo Cardinal Lercaro, 71, the Archbishop of Bologna.

GLEN SPEY, N. Y. — The seventh National Executive Board meeting of the Ukrainian American Veterans was held at the UWA Resort Center, Glen Spey on Sunday, June 2, 1963. This meeting was preceded by the solemn dedication of the "Mohyla." The "Mohyla" bears the same meaning to the Ukrainian people as the "Tomb of the Unknown Soldier" means to the American people.

Following the dignitaries and heads of national organizations, the Ukrainian American Veterans carrying the American and Ukrainian colors and bearing arms marched from the Main Building to the site in a military manner. Leading the formation was Major Walter Steek, well known New York Attorney. At the conclusion of the military part a 36 gun salute was fired.

Prominent speakers were Dr. Wytwytaky, President of the Republic of Ukraine in exile, Joseph Lesawyer, Supreme President of the UNA, Anthony Batiuk, Supreme President of UWA, Matthew Pope, National Commander of UAW and Michael Piznak, representatives of the evening was Dr. Stepan Wytwytaky, President of the Ukrainian National Republic in exile. Other speakers at the dinner were Joseph Lesawyer representing the UNA and the UCCA; Prof. A. Archimovych from the Ukrainian Academy of Arts and Sciences; Prof. J. Andruszkiv from the Shevchenko Scientific Society; Dr. Chelsky and Dr. Shybutchak from the Ukrainian Medical Society and its New York branch, respectively; S. Memorial to War Heroes Dedicated in Glen Spey

GLEN SPEY, N.Y. (Special).—On Sunday, June 2, 1963 several hundred persons took part in the dedication of a special memorial-grave in honor of the Ukrainian war heroes who lost their lives in fighting against the enemies of Ukraine, erected on the estate "Verkhovyna," owned by the Ukrainian Workingmen's Association. The religious services were held: one for the Catholics celebrated by the Rev. S. Sabol, OSBM, and another one for the Orthodox, celebrated by the Rev. V. Kolodnytsky.

There was a special parade of Ukrainian war veterans on the spacious grounds of the estate.

The dedication ceremony was opened by an address by General A. Valysky who outlined the purposes and reasons for erecting the memorial grave.

The principal speaker was Dr. Stepan Wytwytaky, President of the Ukrainian National Republic in exile, who spoke on the symbolic meaning of the memorial.

Speakers included J. Lesawyer-Ukrainian National Association; A. Batiuk—Ukrainian Workingmen's Association; M. Piznak, Esq.—Ukrainian Consular Committee of America, and Dr. I. Kozak, head of the Ukrainian War Veterans; I. Skira, head of the Brotherhood of the 1st Ukrainian Division; M. Pope, national commander of the Ukrainian American Veterans; Y. Lopatynsky, Association of Former Soldiers of the UPA; I. Kedryn, representing the "Chervona Kalyna" publishing association, and Mrs. J. Bencal of the Ukrainian National Women's League of America, H. Yaremchuk, I. Zerkovskyy, the architect of the memorial, O. Stetkevych, chairman of the "Brody-Lev" Association, W. Steek, Esq., commanded an honor guard of the American Ukrainian Legion, and Dr. B. Levitsky was master of ceremonies.

An impressive concert followed the dedication ceremony, featuring the Ukrainian Choir "Dumka" of New York under the direction of J. Zadorozny, the Choir "Trembita" of Newark under V. Budny, and the "Kobzar" Chorus of Philadelphia under the direction of A. Rudnytsky.

NEW YORK, N.Y. (Special).—On Saturday, June 1, 1963 the Ukrainian American community paid well-deserved homage to Professor Clarence A. Manning, prominent American scholar and educator, and a foremost authority on Ukraine and Ukrainian history and literature in this country, by sponsoring a special conference, at which Prof. Manning's contributions to the studies on Ukraine were analyzed and highly praised.

The conference was sponsored by the Shevchenko Scientific Society, the Ukrainian National Association, the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America, the Federation of Ukrainian Student Associations of America and the Ukrainian Youth League of North America.

The conference was opened by Prof. Vasyl Lew of the University of Scranton, who in turn introduced Prof. J. Andruszkiv, of Seton Hall University and Vice President of the Shevchenko Scientific Society, who read a special message to Professor Manning from Prof. Roman Smal-Stocki, President of the Shevchenko Scientific Society and Director of the Institute of Slavic Studies at Marquette University.

Subsequently, Prof. Lev E. Dobriansky of Georgetown University and President of the UCCA, assumed the chairmanship of the conference and introduced the speakers who took part in the conference.
