### PROF. DOBRIANSKY WARNS U.S. AGAINST FAVORABLE TRADE POLICY WITH REDS

WASHINGTON, February 25.—The Senate Foreign Relations Committee heard a prediction that the Communist dream of world domination would be realized by 1980 if the Western powers adhered to policies that exacted no political concessions from the Soviet Union in return for easier trade.

Dr. Lev E. Dobriansky, professor of economics at Georgetown University and president of the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America, told the committee that the greatest hope for the West lay in the creation by the United States and Western Europe of a North Atlantic Treaty Organization council on free world trade. The council would use the exchange of goods and services as "an economic weapon for freedom and infuse a new life of working partnership into the Atlantic Community."

"We should have no hesitation or fear to utilize trade as a weapon for freedom just as the Red totalitarians manipulate it as a weapon for conquest," Dr. Dobriansky said. "This policy of proportioning trade bids to political concessions bids represents a middle way between complete embargo and slipshod liberalization."

Any relaxation of present licensing and credit restrictions on trade with Communist countries should require reciprocal political concessions by the Soviet Union, he argued.

Listed among the most obvious "graded" concessions to be sought by the United States, preferably in concert with the Western European allies were the dismantling of the Berlin Wall, an expanded cultural exchange, the satisfaction of the Soviet's World War II agreements, the neutralization of Laos, the reunification of Germany, "exodus" from Cuba and withdrawal of Soviet troops from Hungary and other satellite areas.

Dr. Dobriansky was one of several witnesses heard by the committee in an open hearing on the advantages and hazards of expanded East-West trade. The inquiry, started a year ago, has become part of a broader Administration investigation into the desirability of relaxing present legislative restrictions to this end.

President Johnson is pushing a program for "building new bridges to Eastern Europe" and has completed a committee to canvass the question of expanded trade with Eastern European countries under J. Irwin Miller, an Indiana industrialist.

The core of both inquiries is the Battle Act requiring Federal licenses for exports to the Soviet and other Communist countries of strategic material and equipment that might add to their military potential.

Dr. Dobriansky's testimony was the most vigorous attack yet heard by the committee on what he called an "unconditional, or non-reciprocal relaxation of restrictions. He said Soviet strategists had themselves described Soviet policy of using trade as a political weapon in the following stages:

"1. The buildup of USSR industry in the twenties and thirties and its reconstruction in the postwar period, to which the West contributed heavily.

"2. In the fifties, East European integration and the plunge into the world economic offensive, again with Western assistance.

"3. In the sixties and seventies, the complete 'liberation' of the underdeveloped countries from politico-economic ties with 'the imperialists.'

"4. By 1968, with the West so isolated and in turmoil, victory will fall like a ripe apple into the laps of the 'world-wide Socialist camp.'"

### Report Secret Pamphlet Accusing Moscow of Enslavement Circulates in Ukraine

NEW YORK N.Y.—March 1.—Secretariate-General for Foreign Affairs of the Supreme Ukrainian Liberation Council (UHVR) made public today the text of a secret pamphlet written in Ukraine.

The pamphlet had been distributed throughout the Ukrainian Republic and the rest of the Soviet Union. It was written on the occasion of the trial of a man convicted of setting fire to the largest library of Ukraine in Kiev last May.

It tells about the virtually secret trial in a small court in the city of Kiev, and about the testimonies of witnesses who had been carefully coached by the KGB (Soviet Security Police).

Authors of the unsigned pamphlet wrote that they could not put their names to it because "we live in a country where for a word of truth people are being criminally destroyed without trial."

They charge that "Russian chauvinism, like anti-Semitism, has been rehabilitated long ago in the colonial empires called the USSR," and make reference to two other fires in the national libraries of Turkmenia and Uzbekistan.

Mention is also made in the pamphlet of the secret trial and execution a few years ago of a group of Kiev and Lviv lawyers who wanted to bring before the Supreme Soviet and the United Nations the question of colonial oppression in Ukraine.

And the pamphlet also exposes the threats made by the Communist Party and police officials to students who planned to gather near the grave of Taras Shevchenko, Ukraine's greatest poet, as had been their annual custom. The ceremonies at the grave took place last May, two days before the fire at the library, in spite of the warnings.

Mykola Lebed, secretary-general for foreign affairs of UHVR, who made the text of the pamphlet public, said he also brought this matter to the attention of the United Nations Commission on Human Rights.

He said the pamphlet is being copied by hand photographically and passed from one person to another in the Soviet Union.

### "BE LOYAL, STRONG, BRAVE AND STEADFAST! PRAY TO GOD AND HAVE FAITH THAT THE UKRAINIAN PEOPLE WILL NOT PERISH, BUT WILL TRIUMPH IN VICTORY," SAYS POPE PAUL VI TO UKRAINIAN GROUP IN ROME

ROME (A. D.)—These words were spoken by His Holiness Pope Paul VI on February 25, 1965 during a special audience with the Ukrainian delegation in Rome.

The text of the Pope's brief address was translated from the Italian language and it runs as follows:

"Monsignori, Cardinal, Brothers and Sons:

"In these briefs words We wish to express Our great joy in meeting you on this particular occasion.

"We wish to share with you Our thoughts and feelings born in Our soul at this joyful moment.

"First of all We wish to tell you why We have elevated Joseph Slipy to the dignity of cardinal.

"In summing up these feelings, We wish to tell you that in doing so We wanted to express Our deep respect for Monsignor Joseph Slipy and for the entire Ukrainian people.

"What is binding Us with the Ukrainian people are our unforgettable events of Our life and Our pleasant memories. We had an opportunity to meet personally with Monsignor Andrew Sheptytsky in one of the most difficult periods of his life.

"This honor for Us occurred at the time when We stayed in Warsaw for a few months, in the period of your history, when the problem of Lviv and those parts of Ukrainian territory which were subsequently incorporated into the Polish state had emerged in full force on the international political arena. It was at that time that We had ample opportunity to learn about the Ukrainian national and political problems and the aspirations, and sufferings of the Ukrainian people.

"By elevating to the dignity of cardinal a Ukrainian Metropolitan We wished to attest to the whole Church and the entire world that his suffering, his steadfastness in the con-

### Communist China Intensifies War on Church

HONG KONG — Brain-probing tactics are still being employed in Red China to uncover and destroy vestigial religious beliefs — Christian and Moslem — according to an interview with a visiting Chinese student from Canton, published in Hong Kong Chinese language daily. The unidentified student described anti-religion classes held in schools to convince students that since Catholicism and Protestantism are enemies of the communist regime, all people who cling to these two religions must be enemies of the people.

He said that to get rid of "old feudal religious ideas" and set up new modern ideas, students regularly attend meetings to discuss what the government wants them to do in order to think clearly on the subject.

Under the guidance of a student leader, he said, they analyze:

- 1) What they have in mind about religion.
- 2) What reasons they have for believing religion a good or bad thing.
- 3) Why religious ideas persist even though the government has "liberated" them from need to hold such "feudal thoughts."
- 4) What a student should do if his parents still hold old religious beliefs.

The student said that the high school students still remember the Christian religions but that they are almost 100% Communist party members.

### CARDINAL SLIPY'S ALLOCUTION TO POPE PAUL VI

ROME, N.Y. (A.D.)—During the audience of the large Ukrainian group with Pope Paul VI on February 25, 1965, His Eminence Joseph Cardinal Slipy delivered the following address:

"Holy Father! When in our humility and modesty we look upon the arena of world events, we see above all the gigantic efforts of Your Holiness to bring about the unity and preserve humanity from conflicts and war, and especially to bring about the unity of Christ's Church, torn by conflicts stemming from human weaknesses and frailties and to restore to Her bosom all and particularly the separated Christian Churches and communities, so that the Church of Christ may have a beneficial influence also upon earthly actions of states and peoples and fulfill in dignity Her tasks imposed by Christ the Lord.

"We are happy and grateful to Your Holiness for Your great endeavors in reaching out to our suffering Church and people and embracing them under Your Holy protection.

"The political conditions of the past and the fact of being situated at the crossroads between the East and the West, with their often contradictory aspirations, weighed heavily upon our unity and contributed in large measure to religious, political and national strife and discord. And when we look today upon the sad past, we cannot but be most joyfully thankful to the Apostolic See for always striving to strengthen and unite our religious and political forces and instill in our souls the great power of unity. For the wisdom of the ancient Roman adage is that 'Ubi est"

concordia, ibi victoria est (Where there is unity, there is victory)."

"In the ancient past Apostle Andrew endeavored to unite the warring tribes in our land with the help of the Gospel. This word was also preached by Pope Clemens. His remains, found by the Slavic Apostles Cyril and Methodius who went to the Khazars on the Volga, also fulfilled a salutary mission among our people of awakening the veneration of Pope Clemens, forgotten in the wake of the great folk migrations. His remains, brought to Rome, became a new stimulus for unity with the Apostolic See. It was Princess Olga who first sent her legates through Emperor Otto in 959, asking that Catholic bishops to be sent to her land. Subsequently, Papal emissaries came to her grandson, Great Prince Yaropolk, and afterwards on three occasions the Papal legates came to Grand Prince Volodymyr in Kiev, bringing the remains of Pope Clemens and recalling his martyred death in our lands.

"It was for this reason that St. Volodymyr took the relics from Khersones and brought them to Kiev.

"These exchanges of legates by Grand Prince Volodymyr were intended to strengthen the great Kievan State, just as the Church of Christ had already strengthened the peoples of Central Europe.

"Then, other important events followed, such as the nomination of Grand Prince Iziaslav and his son, Yaropolk, as rulers of Kiev by Pope Gregory VII; the nomination of Prince Danylo as King by Pope (Continued on Page 3)

### Investment Seminar Concluded At Institute

NEW YORK, N.Y. — The American stock market is really "a market of stocks and not a stock market," investment expert Michael J. Metrinko told the closing session of a four-week investment seminar here last week. The seminar was held at the Ukrainian Institute of America.

Mr. Metrinko, who is the New York Stock Exchange floor partner for Jones, Kreeger and Company, elaborated on this premise by dealing with specific securities which he considered to be worthwhile investments from both the fundamental and technical aspects.

Participants called Mr. Metrinko's summation a fitting climax to a "highly professional, informative" seminar which began February 3 and continued on successive Wednesdays through February 24. According to Institute directors, the sessions (which were open to the public) were well attended and were enthusiastically received.

### CULTURAL FESTIVAL IN BROOKLYN TO HONOR SHEVCHENKO

NEW YORK, N.Y. — Taras Shevchenko, Ukraine's poet laureate and national hero whose monument was erected last June in Washington, D.C. on the occasion of the 150th anniversary of his birth, will be honored on Sunday, March 14, 1965 at a Cultural Festival to be held at the Brooklyn Academy of Music, 30 Lafayette Street, Brooklyn, N.Y. The Ukrainian Cultural Festival, which is scheduled for 2:00 P.M., is sponsored by the Ukrainian American organizations of greater New York, under the auspices of the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America.

The Festival is dedicated to the anniversary of the birth of Taras Shevchenko, Ukraine's greatest poet and freedom fighter, which falls on March 9. Shevchenko was born on March 9, 1814 in Ukraine and died on March 10, 1861 at the age of 47, after serving ten years in exile in Asia where he was deported by the Russian government for his belief in freedom and democracy. In one of his poems, Shevchenko called for a "Ukrainian George Washington" to bring to enslaved Ukraine "a new and righteous law." It was in recognition of his espousal of American ideals that the U.S. Congress and the U.S. Government allotted a plot of land in Washington, D. C. for the erection of a monument in his honor. The unveiling of the statue took place on June 27, 1964 with General Dwight D. Eisenhower, 34th President of the United States, as the principal speaker. Over 100,000 Americans and Canadians of Ukrainian descent took part in this impressive event.

The Ukrainian Cultural Festival, to be held at the Brooklyn Academy of Music, will include exciting Ukrainian folk dances, under the direction of Wadym Sulima, outstanding Ukrainian choreographer, who will present a series of Ukrainian folk dances, which are adapted to a special montage, "Scenes of Life in Ukraine," written by Leonid Poltava, Ukrainian poet and writer.

Mr. Sulima was born in Ukraine and attended ballet schools in Kharkiv, Ukraine and Leningrad, Russia, and was premier dancer and choreographer with the Kirov and the Bolshoi Ballets; he also performed in Austria and Germany immediately after World War II, and later in Chile. Mr. Sulima was also a member of the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo and ballet master with the Grand Ballet de Marquis de Cuevas. In the United States since 1959, Mr. Sulima has created many new ballets, among them the "Bach Concerto."

The vocal part of the festival will include a performance by the Ukrainian Chorus "Dumka" of New York City under the direction of conductor John Zadorozny, noted European and American director. The "Dumka" Chorus is composed

of 150 men and women singers and has gained well-deserved fame as one of the most renowned choral societies among Ukrainian American choral groups. It has performed in many cities in the United States and Canada, and has appeared on radio and community programs. The Chorus will be accompanied by the Symphony Orchestra of New York City, and among the soloists will be soprano Mary Lesawyer, New York City Center Opera, and bass-baritone Andriy Dobriansky of the Metropolitan Opera Association's National Company.

The Ukrainian dance ensemble will include 12 Ukrainian folk dance groups from the metropolitan area of New York. Tickets, priced at \$5, \$4, \$3 and \$2, can be purchased in Ukrainian book stores in New York's downtown East Side, and at the Brooklyn Academy of Music on the day of the performance.

### Cardinal Slipy Gets Church In Rome

VATICAN CITY — By custom each cardinal is assigned a titular church in Rome after the consecration of the new cardinals.

Though the choice of titular churches is not to be announced till after the secret consistory (February 22), several Rome newspapers have already published a list of titular churches for the twenty-seven new cardinals.

According to this list, Joseph Cardinal Slipy of Lviv, has been given a titular church of St. Athanasius (Greek Rite); Josef Cardinal Beran of Prague, Czechoslovakia, Holy Cross Church in Via Flaminia; Maurice Cardinal Roy of Quebec the Church of the Canadian Martyrs (Rome's Canadian church); Franjo Cardinal Seper of Zagreb, Yugoslavia, SS. Peter and Paul Church.

The Pope is reported to have selected more than half a dozen modern parish churches, some of them in Rome's populous suburb or in working-class districts, as titular churches for the new cardinals.

KOSYGIN'S ASIAN TRIP

There has been a great deal of speculation about the purpose and the results of the recent trip by Premier Kosygin of the Soviet Union to the Communist countries of East Asia, China, North Vietnam and North Korea.

Stop-Over in China

It was only natural for him to visit Peking first, for it represented the easiest place for the Russian traveler to stop over. Since the Soviet Union has no boundary with North Vietnam, the ostensible object of his visit, it was necessary for him to cross Chinese territory, or make a long detour over countries that are still strongly anti-Communist.

Moscow Chief Instigator

It is often forgotten today that it was the Soviet Union and not Red China who commenced the foreign intervention in both Korea and the Southeast. The movement against the French was launched before Red China was a formidable military power.

After completing his program, he returned to Peking, and the next day went to North Korea which has been increasingly in the news in connection with Chinese threats. This visit, like the one in Hanoi, ended in glowing statements of support but also without any clear indication of the future.

Kennan et al. Still Trying

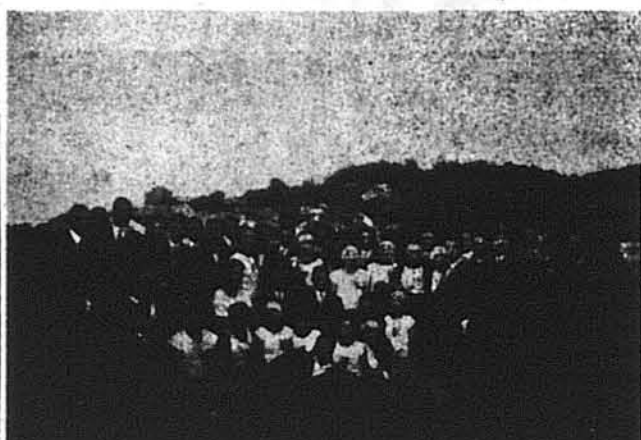

Але „завзяття, що пробивалося на шлях змагань, їхня спортова настанова, наскрізь надхнені спортовими високими ідеями — були тим стимулом, що кермували їхньою спортовою працею.“

На злість московським поєволовачам футболісти столиці України Києва, в друге в своїй історії здобули так зв., Кубок цілої імперії — тобто СССР, після фіналу з московськими Крилами Рад м. Куйбишева, що відбувся, звичайно, в Москві. Кубки цілого СССР здобули і молодіжні збірні України. Визначною подією в українському підсоєвоському футболі були несподівані осяги аж двох клубів з українського міста, СККА і Чорноморця з Одеси. Обидва агадані клуби здобули собі право авансу до найвищої футбольної Ліги СС.СР.А-класу (Перша Група), в якій тепер змагаються київська „Динамо“ та донецька „Шахтар“. Якщо „старший брат не вдасться до свого арсеналу „мошества“ до в червоному сезоні в 17-ті членній А-класі боротимуться уже 4 українські клуби. До таких неспортових „мошеств“ щодо українських спортовців мискали вдалося в різних часах від кох України опинилася під їх чоботом. Одним з доказів цього може послужити нам частинно, цікава розповідь двох теперішніх футбольних суддів так зв., всесоюзної категорії: В. Галицького і О. Романова в статті „Одеса — Чемпіон Росії“, поміщеній в „Р. Спорті“ ч. 136.
