Sealing Of Shevchenko Documents Will Be Held On May 22 In Washington

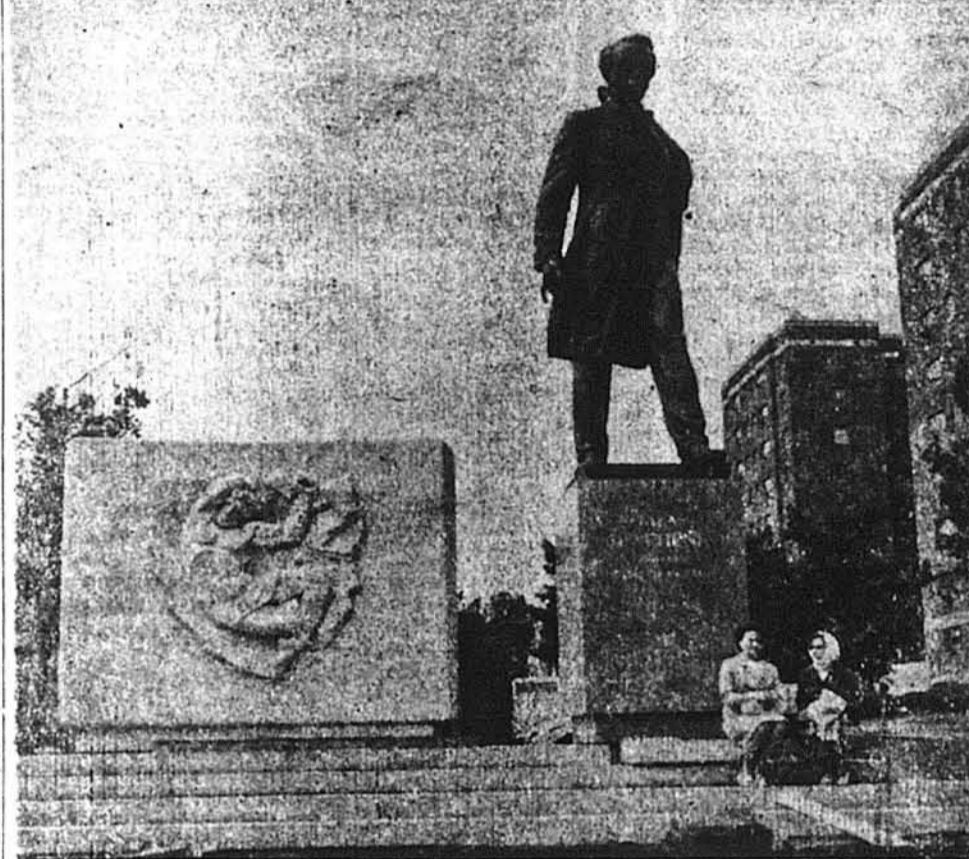
WASHINGTON, D.C. — (Special). — The final ceremony of sealing the historic documents connected with the erection of the Shevchenko monument in Washington, D. C. will be held on Saturday, May 22, 1965 in the nation's capital, according to the Shevchenko Memorial Committee of America.

The ceremony will consist of two principal parts: a) the sealing of the Shevchenko documents at the Shevchenko statue at 4:00 P.M.; and b) a banquet to be held at the Mayflower Hotel at 7:00 P.M.

Guest speaker at the banquet will be Prof. Watson Kirkconnell, president of the Acadia University in Wolfville, Nova Scotia, Canada, a prominent Canadian Slavist and co-author of two books, one on Ukrainian literature and the other on Taras Shevchenko. Prof. Kirkconnell is also a member of the Editorial Advisory Board of The Ukrainian Quarterly.

Prof. Roman Smal-Stocki, of Marquette University, and president of the Shevchenko Scientific Society and the Shevchenko Memorial Committee of America, will be the main Ukrainian speaker at the banquet.

18th Annual Convention of Ukrainian Orthodox League Of the U.S.A.

The Ukrainian Orthodox League of the United States of America, a member organization of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA, will hold its 18th Annual Convention in Newark, New Jersey July 15-18, 1965. The Convention will be hosted by the New Jersey-New York City Region of the UOL, which includes senior and junior chapters in Carteret, Newark, New York City, Passaic, and Trenton. General Chairman Metro J. Baran is being assisted by Co-Chairman and Region President John Lesky, as well as a number of sub-Committee chairmen and committee members.

Headquarters for the Convention will be the Robert Treat Hotel in Newark where the National Executive Board will meet on Wednesday evening and business sessions will be held on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday preceded by Moleben services.

The League is comprised of 30 Senior and 25 Junior Chapters in various cities extending from Connecticut to Minneapolis (site of last year's UOL Convention). CACEED Supports Claims of Ukrainian Persecutees of Nazi Regime

NEW YORK, N. Y. — The Conference of Americans of Central and Eastern European Descent (CACEED) has thrust its full support behind the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America (UCCA) and the United Ukrainian American Relief Committee (UUARC) in their demand, presented recently to the German Embassy in Washington, for the compensation claims for Ukrainian persecutees and former victims of the Nazi regime. A delegation of the UCCA and UUARC was recently in Washington and discussed the claims and the eventual amendment of the German law on compensation to former persecutees with the First Secretary of the Embassy of the Federal Republic of Germany, Dr. Helmut Mueller-Dethard.

CACEED is an American anti-Communist organization consisting of 10 major American ethnic nationalities, specifically, the following: Albanian Literary Society, American Bulgarian League, Czechoslovak National Council of America, Estonian National Committee in the U.S.A., American Hungarian Federation, American Latvian Association, American Lithuanian Council, Polish American Congress, Rumanian American National Committee and the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America.

The CACEED Memorandum was signed by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John Balkunas, President (Lithuanian), Pamfil A. Riposanu, Chairman (Rumanian) and Miron Butariu, Secretary (Rumanian). The memorandum was proposed by the UCCA delegates in CACEED, Joseph Lesawyer, Chairman of the Political Committee, and Walter Dushnyk, Chairman of the Press and Information Committee who prepared the text of the Memorandum.

In appealing to the Bonn Government to amend the pre-

sent Compensation Law, the CACEED Memorandum stated, among other things:

"This discriminatory decision of the German Government has been especially harsh as regards Ukrainian political persecutees, members of the Organization of Ukrainian Nationalists (OUN) and the Ukrainian Insurgent Army (UIA). In the eyes of the German law-makers, these were persecuted not for opposition to Hitler and his racial policies, but for opposition to the German state as such and its army, the Wehrmacht. "It seems that this contention could be easily disproved by noting the fact that the German authorities did not consider them as bona fide prisoners of war (POWs). Not only did they deny them treatment according to the Geneva Convention on prisoners of war, but actually treated them as ordinary rebels subject to summary execution and hanging without due process of law..."

After suggesting several points for amendment of the German Indemnification Law now before the Bundestag in Bonn, the Memorandum concluded:

"In conclusion, we wish to point out that among our members there are many whose relatives are in the category of former persecutees now disqualified from indemnification by the German Government. They are eager to see that justice is applied to them in the same measure as to those who are now receiving such indemnification... We sincerely hope that Your Excellency will forward this Memorandum to your Government in Bonn with recommendation for prompt and positive consideration at this time when the German Indemnification Law is being considered for amendment by the Bundestag in Bonn."

UKRAINIAN CATHOLIC AND ORTHODOX HIERARCHIES EXCHANGE EASTER GREETINGS

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. — (Special). — On the occasion of the Easter holiday the Ukrainian Catholic and the Ukrainian Orthodox Bishops exchanged Easter greetings and expressed mutual good wishes for the clergy and the faithful of both religious denominations.

The Ukrainian Catholic hierarchy, headed by His Eminence Joseph Cardinal Slipyi sent a message dated March 31, 1965 to the Most Reverend Ambrose Senyshyn for transmission to Metropolitan of the Ukrainian Catholic Church, the Most Reverend Ioan Theodorovych, Archbishop and Metropolitan of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church in the United States. In addition to Cardinal Slipyi the letter was signed by Metropolitan Ambrose Senyshyn, Metropolitan Maxime Hermaniuk, Archbishop Ivan Buchko, Archbishop Gabriel Bukatko, Bishop Nell Savaryn, Bishop Isidore Borecky, Bishop Andrew Roborecky, Bishop Joseph M. Schmondiuk, Bishop Jaroslav Gabro, Bishop Ivan Prashko, Bishop Platon Korynyak, Bishop Volodymyr Malanchuk, Bishop Joseph Martynets, Bishop Andrew Sapelink, Bishop Augustine Hornyak and Bishop Joachim Segedi, all representing 14 Ukrainian Catholic Sees throughout the free world.

In their message the Ukrainian Catholic hierarchies stated, among other things:

"Imbued with this spirit (Christian unity-Ed.) we, the Ukrainian Catholic Bishops are elated that with the approaching Feast of the Resurrection of Christ we can in a singular way direct our thoughts and our hearts to Your Eminence, and to the Most Reverend Archbishops-Metropolitans, to the Most Reverend Bishops and to the Reverend clergy, and to our dear brothers and sisters and faithful of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church, and to greet you with our Easter greetings, Khrystos Voskres, and to convey our best wishes and the expression of our deep esteem."

In a reply transmitted to Metropolitan Senyshyn, the Ukrainian Orthodox hierarchy, Metropolitan Ioan Theodorovych stated as follows:

"I wish to express to you, Your Excellency, our special thanks for sending us the Conciliar Archbishopal Message of the Ukrainian Catholic Episcopate headed by His Eminence Cardinal Joseph... With great joy and emotion I read the message, this truly Eastern and brotherly message in Christ... We sincerely rejoice with this Easter message of the Ukrainian Catholic Episcopate and we share with them our faith in the inevitable unity of all Christians, for which we pray to the Almighty. My expressions of thanks are shared by my brothers and arch-shepherds of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church in the U.S.A. — Most Reverend Archbishops Matyslav and Volodymyr."

Two Ukrainian Teams in Eastern Cup Finals

NEW YORK, N.Y. — For the first time in the history of the U.S. Challenge Cup competition, emblematic of the United States soccer supremacy, two Ukrainian teams will meet in the eastern regional finals, with the winner of the two-game home-and-home series advancing to the grand finals against the winner of the western regional bracket.

The New York Ukrainians and the Philadelphia Ukrainian Nationals, two of the top teams on the North American continent, will seek to resolve the issue when they meet in the first game of the series on Sunday, May 2, at the Ukrainian field in College Point, Astoria, L.I. The kick-off is scheduled for 2:30 P.M. There will be no other major league soccer competition in the area on that day. The second game of the series will be played in Philadelphia. The date has not yet been determined.

Both teams advanced to the regional finals by virtue of their victories in the quarter-final round played last Sunday. The New York Ukrainians gained a narrow 2-1 victory over the N.Y. German-Hungarians, while the Philadelphia Nats were eliminating Detroit's Carpathia Kickers in Philadelphia by a 1-0 score.

PARMA, Ohio (Special). — Michael Zadorecky, well-known Ukrainian American leader in the Cleveland area, is a candidate for the post of councilman in the 9th Ward in Parma, Ohio, in the Democratic primaries to take place on Tuesday, May 4, 1965. Voting will take place from 7:30 A.M. to 7:30 P.M. There are over 150 Ukrainian families in the 9th Ward, and if all would register and vote Mr. Zadorecky could be elected.
