### OSYP BOYDUNYK, PRESIDENT OF UKRAINIAN NATIONAL RADA, DIES IN MUNICH

MUNICH, Germany.—Osyp Boydunyk, President of the Ukrainian National Rada and member of the Supreme Council of the Ukrainian Nationalists, died of a heart attack here on Maundy Thursday, April 7, at the age of 71.

Born in Dolyna, western Ukraine, in 1895, Mr. Boydunyk devoted all of his life to revolutionary and political activity in search of Ukraine's freedom and independence. An officer in the Ukrainian Galician Army and in the Army of the Ukrainian National Republic he was one of the co-founders of the Organization of Ukrainian Nationalists which came into being in 1929. He was also a member of the Ukrainian Military Organization.

#### OUN Member

An economist by profession, Mr. Boydunyk obtained his higher education in Czechoslovakia, before he returned to Lviv. In 1931-32 he was member of OUN's National Executive Committee. An able writer, he was editor of the nationalist paper "Holos Natsii" (Voice of the Nation) in the mid-1930's. Arrested in 1933 for his participation in OUN's constitutional assembly in Vienna, he was sentenced to four years of hard labor.

#### Imprisoned

Hunted by the Polish authorities for his underground political activity and thrown into concentration camp by the Nazis in the early 1940's, Mr. Boydunyk remained true to his cause and refused to give into pressures, often involving tortures and beatings.

A member of the Supreme Council of the Ukrainian Nationalists since 1941, he was the organization's representative on the Ukrainian National Rada, Ukraine's government in exile. He served as

President of the Rada from 1954 through 1957, and again since 1961 until his death. In July of last year, Mr. Boydunyk was re-elected to the Supreme Council of Ukrainian Nationalists, an organization headed by Mr. Shtul-Zhdanovych.

A man of great erudition and subtle political tact, Mr. Boydunyk traveled extensively in Europe, North and South America. On several occasions in recent years he visited major centers of Ukrainian life in the United States and Canada. A man of moderate political views, though strong in his convictions, he was respected by followers and opponents alike.

#### Wrote Essays

He authored a number of articles and essays on politics, including such well-known treatises as "National Solidarity," "Ukrainian Internal Politics," and others.

Funeral services were held in Munich, Germany, Wednesday, April 13. The body was interred at one of the local cemeteries.

### Congressional Pamphlet on Ukraine's Independence

WASHINGTON, D.C.—All statements, addresses and remarks made by U.S. Senators and Congressmen this past January on the occasion of the 48th anniversary of the proclamation of Ukraine's independence have been published in the form of a congressional pamphlet.

Entitled "Independence for the Largest Captive Non-Russian Nation in Eastern Europe: 48th Anniversary of Ukraine's Independence," the booklet contains 72 pages and features speeches of Hon. Daniel J. Flood of Pennsylvania and the Hon. Edward J. Derwinski of Illinois.

All in all, 11 U.S. Senators and 70 Congressmen contributed to the observance of the 48th anniversary of Ukraine's independence by delivering their cogent statements and praising the Ukrainian people for their unceasing efforts to attain freedom for Ukraine.

The pamphlet is now in the main office of the UCCA and all Branches and Member Organizations may avail themselves of the opportunity and order copies for distribution in their respective areas, especially to local public and school libraries and newspaper offices.

### All-American Conference Meets in Washington

WASHINGTON, D.C.—On Saturday, April 2, 1966, the All-American Conference to Combat Communism held its Executive Council meeting and its annual Vigilant Patriot Recognition Award Luncheon at the Washington Hotel in Washington, D.C. The UCCA was represented by Dr. Walter Dushnyk, who is a member of the AAC Executive Council.

The UCCA is one of 38 American national organizations comprising the Conference. Dr. Lev E. Dobriansky, UCCA President, and Joseph Lesawyer, President of the Ukrainian National Association, are members of the Conference's National Advisory Committee.

### SHEVCHENKO SOCIETY PROTESTS CONVICTION OF WRITERS IN KIEV

NEW YORK, N. Y.—The Presidium of the Shevchenko Scientific Society in America has issued a strong protest against the persecution of Soviet Ukrainian literary figures in general, and the recent conviction of literary critics Ivan Svitlychny and Ivan Dziuba in particular.

The five-point protest declaration was drawn up at a meeting of the Shevchenko Scientific Society on April 8, here. In it, the Presidium expressed its indignation at the conviction of Svitlychny and Dziuba, defending at the same time the principle of freedom of expression and of the press everywhere in the world.

In addition, the Society protested the secrecy with which the arrests and trials of persecuted literary figures are conducted in the Soviet Union. It called this most recent example of the persecution of Ukrainian writers "the barbarism of the present era, which again confirms that Ukraine is a victim of Moscow's colonialism and imperialism."
