Ukrainian Breads Are Displayed At Exhibits in New York

NEW YORK, N.Y. — Ukrainian breads displayed in two Fifth Avenue museums here are winning accolades from press and public alike.

Five loaves of Ukrainian wedding bread are included in the "Bread and Wine" exhibit currently on display at the Hallmark Gallery on Fifth Avenue and 56th Street.

Clementine Paddleford, food writer for the World Journal Tribune, wrote recently that "the breads from Ukraine are the most breathtakingly beautiful breads."

Lester Gaba, display columnist for Women's Wear Daily, urged his readers not to miss Hallmark's super-exhibit showing 400 different breads.

Several of the loaves, including high round breads adorned with dozens of tiny birds sculptured in dough, were baked by Mrs. Maria Bilecky of Philadelphia.

Ukrainian bread, topped by a bread tree-of-life hung with flowers, ribbons and candies, was created by Mrs. Mary Sosiak of Yonkers, N.Y.

Varnish and strong preservatives have been used on all the breads to prevent mold from forming during the two-month long display.

Shown Once Before

Mimi Sheraton, cookbook author and food and travel writer, who spent two years with designer Walter Swartz tracking down and borrowing pieces for the exhibition, told The Ukrainian Weekly that two Ukrainian wedding breads were included in Hallmark's "Art of the Wedding" exhibit three years ago.

The Hallmark show, one of a continuing series sponsored by the card company, includes wine memorabilia such as wine cups and goblets dating from the 18th century.

A Great Day For Pro's

It was a great day for the owners in the National Professional Soccer League as 45,210 spectators came out to see the NPSL teams battle in the major stadiums throughout the United States.

The biggest crowd came out in Philadelphia. More than 14,000 showed up for the Philadelphia Swarthan officials to double as ticket sellers.

The Philadelphia officials did not expect as many mainline due to the fact that the Philadelphia 76ers were playing in a playoff basketball match and the Philly baseball club was meeting the New York Mets.

The average attendance at all five games was 9,000. The Chicago-St. Louis match attracted the least with a little over 4,000 people showing up.

Officials there blamed it on bad weather.

To a seasoned soccer watcher, the televised game between Baltimore and Atlanta was less than spectacular but judging from the crowd noise it was enjoyed thoroughly. More than 8,000 were in the stands in Baltimore and this despite the fact that the match could have been seen on TV.

A Bad Day For USC

While the professional league enjoyed success at the gates, the New York Ukrainian Sports Club suffered a setback in New York when the rival Hota S.C. toppled the Ukrainians from the top of the German-American Soccer League's standings with a 4-1 victory.

The loss placed the Ukrainians in third spot, behind Hota and Hellenic, both tied for first place.

FILM ON SHEVCHENKO IN NEW YORK
