## Ninth Observance of Captive Nations Week - July 16-22

### Ukrainian Communities Around the Nation To Observe Captive Nations Week

**NEW YORK, N.Y.**  
At a meeting of the Captive Nations Committee of New York, attended by 20 Captive Nations representatives on July 6, at the Taft Hotel, plans were set for the observance of Captive Nations Week.  
On Saturday, July 15, pickets, carrying placards, will distribute informational materials in front of the Soviet mission, at Lexington and 3rd aves., from 12 p.m. to 9 p.m. On Sunday, July 16, Holy Liturgy will be celebrated, after which there will be a march and manifestation.

**PUBLIC LAW 86 - 90**  
Providing for the designation of the third week of July as "CAPTIVE NATIONS WEEK" Adopted by the 86th Congress of the United States of America in July, 1959.

WHEREAS the greatness of the United States is in large part attributable to its having been able, through the democratic process, to achieve a harmonious national unity of its people, even though they stem from the most diverse of racial, religious, and ethnic backgrounds; and

WHEREAS this harmonious unification of the diverse elements of our free society has led the people of the United States to possess a warm understanding and sympathy for the aspirations of peoples everywhere and to recognize the natural interdependency of the peoples and nations of the world; and

WHEREAS the enslavement of a substantial part of the world's population by Communist imperialism makes a mockery of the idea of peaceful coexistence between nations and constitutes a detriment to the natural bonds of understanding between the people of the United States and other peoples; and

WHEREAS since 1918 the imperialistic and aggressive policies of Russian communism have resulted in the creation of a vast empire which poses a dire threat to the security of the United States and of all the free peoples of the world; and

WHEREAS the imperialistic policies of Communist Russia have led, through direct and indirect aggression, to the subjugation of the national independence of Poland, Hungary, Lithuania, Ukraine, Czechoslovakia, Latvia, Estonia, White Ruthenia, Rumania, East Germany, Bulgaria, mainland China, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Georgia, North Korea, Albania, Idel-Ural, Tibet, Cossackia, Turkestan, North Vietnam, and others; and

WHEREAS these submerged nations look to the United States, as the citadel of human freedom, for leadership in bringing about their liberation and independence and in restoring to them the enjoyment of their Christian, Jewish, Moslem, Buddhist, or other religious freedoms, and of their individual liberties; and

WHEREAS it is vital to the national security of the United States that the desire for liberty and independence on the part of the peoples of these conquered nations should be steadfastly kept alive; and

WHEREAS the desire for liberty and independence by the overwhelming majority of the people of these submerged nations constitutes a powerful deterrent to war and one of the best hopes for a just and lasting peace; and

WHEREAS it is fitting that we clearly manifest to such peoples through an appropriate and official means the historic fact that the people of the United States share with them their aspirations for the recovery of their freedom and independence:

NOW, therefore, be it Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that the President is authorized and requested to issue a Proclamation designating the third week of July, 1959, as "Captive Nations Week" and inviting the people of the United States to observe such week with appropriate ceremonies and activities. The President is further authorized and requested to issue a similar proclamation each year until such time as freedom and independence shall have been achieved for all the captive nations of the world.

**PHILADELPHIA, PA.**  
The Captive Nations Week Committee of Philadelphia will hold a manifestation in which 14 nationality groups, including Ukrainians, will participate at 5 p.m., on Sunday, July 16, near Independence Hall at 5th and Chestnut sts. The Young Americans for Freedom organization will also participate. Speaking at the manifestation will be Mayor of Philadelphia James H. Tate, congressmen William J. Green and Edward B. Bester, and chairman of the Philadelphia Captive Nations Week Committee, Dr. Austin Epp. The Presidential Captive Nations proclamation will be read, after which the Captive Nations representatives will place a wreath on the Liberty Bell.

**CLEVELAND, O.**  
Captive Nations Week observances in Cleveland will begin with a rally to be held on Monday, July 17, at 8:30 p.m., in Public Square, downtown Cleveland.  
Governor James A. Rhodes of Ohio will be the main speaker on the program. Also speaking at the rally will be Ralph J. Perk, Cuyahoga County Auditor and chairman of Cleveland's Captive Nations Committee, and Dr. Michael S. Pap, professor at John Carroll University. The rally will include a parade of flags which will show the color guards and national costumes of all participating nationalities and organizations. A personal message is expected from Dr. Lev E. Dobriansky, chairman of the National Captive Nations Committee and president of the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America (UCCA). Dr. Michael S. Pap heads the Ukrainian Captive Nations Week Committee, which consists of five members and is elected at the annual meeting of the Cleveland branch of the UCCA.

**PITTSBURGH, PA.**  
Former Hungarian Under-Secretary of the Treasury and Minister of Finance, Dr. Nicholas Nyaradi, will be the main speaker at the Captive Nations Week observance to be held at the Roosevelt Hotel on Monday, July 17, by the Captive Nations Committee of Pittsburgh.  
Dr. Nyaradi, who presently is Director of International Studies at Bradley University in Peoria, Ill., is author of the book "My Ringside Seat in Moscow." He will share the podium with General Arthur Trudeau. The Captive Nations Committee of Pittsburgh has also arranged for a quarter-hour, daily, radio program to be broadcast during Captive Nations Week over station WPIT each evening at 8:00 p.m. Each program will discuss the plight of the Captive Nations, including those confined within the Soviet Union. This is the ninth observance of Captive Nations Week arranged by the Captive Nations Committee of Pittsburgh. The following nationalities are represented on the committee; Ukrainian, Lithuanian, Hungarian, Slovak, Polish, and Latvian.

**CHICAGO, ILL.**  
A Captive Nations manifestation will take place in Chicago at 12 p.m. on Saturday, July 15. The persons involved in the manifestation will gather, with their flags and placards, at 11 a.m., at Wells and Becker drives. From there they will march down State st. At 1:45 p.m., after the

**SYRACUSE, N.Y.**  
On July 17, a joint city-county Captive Nations Week proclamation will be issued in Syracuse. The Captive Nations Week Committee of Syracuse, chaired by Dr. A. ### Vatican Suspends Bishop Elko

ROME — The Most Rev. Nicholas T. Elko, Bishop of the Catholic Ruthenian rite, who is under Church investigation, was suspended by Pope Paul VI, on July 3. An apostolic administrator, Mgr. Edward Rosack, Bishop Elko's vicar general, was named by the Vatican.

**Temporary Position**  
The administrator's position is a temporary one. He is the apostolic administrator "sede plena," meaning he will govern the diocese although the head of the diocese has not been removed.

Bishop Elko has been in Rome since December, 1966, explaining his case and answering charges brought against him by 35 of his Byzantine-rite diocesan priests.

The Vatican Congregation for the Oriental Church has been investigating the charges, which accuse

### EUROPEAN FREEDOM COUNCIL FORMED AT MUNICH MEETING

MUNICH, West Germany—Representatives of free and subjugated European nations met in Munich during the weekend of June 30 — July 2, and resolved to establish the European Freedom Council, a coordinating body for the organizations fighting Communism.

**Executive Board**  
The Conference elected an executive board with the following members: president—Mr. Ole Bjorn Kraft; chairman — Mr. Yaroslav Stetzko and Mr. Ivan Matteo Lombardo; two members — Mr. Theodor Oberlander and Mr. John Graham.

Mr. Kraft is a former Foreign Minister of Denmark, former Vice-President of the European Council Council and of the Danish Parliament.

Mr. Stetzko is president of the Anti-Bolshevik Bloc of Nations.

**Former Minister**  
Mr. Lombardo is former Minister of Foreign Trade, and former General-Secretary of the Italian Socialist Party, and Vice-President of the Atlantic Treaty Association.

### Plast Rally to be Held in Canada

OTTAWA, Ont. — The Ukrainian youth organization, Plast, will hold an international rally July 23-30, in South Bolton, Que., 1400 Plast members from the United States and Canada are expected to attend the rally, which will take place 70 miles southeast of Montreal.

The rally will celebrate the 50th anniversary of Ukrainian statehood, the Canadian Centennial and the 55th anniversary of Plast. The federal commission on Canada's Centennial has recognized the rally as an official project in the celebration of the centennial.

Attending the rally will be Metropolitan Ilarion of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church in Canada, Metropolitan Maxime Hermaniuk of the Ukrainian Catholic Church in Canada, Archbishop Michael, Bishop Isadore Boretzky, senator Paul Yuzyk, federal representatives Michael Starr and Nicholas Mandziuk, and Mgr. Dr. Basil Kushnir, president of the Ukrainian Canadian Committee.

### UNA Day Held in Detroit

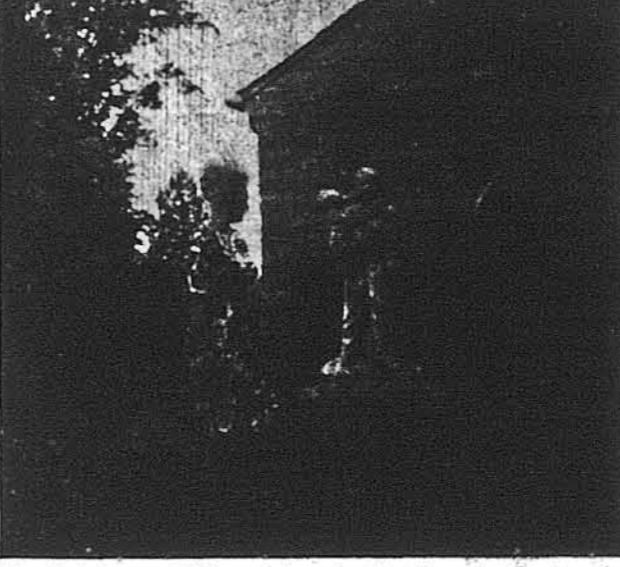

SYDNEY — According to the latest census taken in 1961, there are 21,536 Ukrainians residing in Australia.  
Ukrainian leaders of various organizations are of the opinion that there are at least 30,000 Ukrainian immigrants in Australia. Up until 1949 and in 1950 there were 9,000 Ukrainians registered. From the 9,000 figure it seems that only 2,347 persons were not yet citizens of Australia.

### Weekly Will Not Appear on July 22

Although The Weekly will not appear during Captive Nations Week, all pertinent news will be published in the following issue, on Saturday, July 29.  
The offices of the UNA and Svoboda will be open during this time.  
The last issue of Svoboda and The Ukrainian Weekly will appear this Saturday, July 15. Publication of Svoboda will resume on Monday, July 24.
