TORONTO Ont. — The King Edward Sheraton in the heart of Toronto was the scene of the 34th annual convention of the Ukrainian Youth League of North America, September 1-4.

Some 300 delegates and guests from all over the United States and Canada attended the three-day conclave which was held for the first time outside of the United States.

The convention concluded Monday with the election of Daniel Bobeczko of Cleveland, Ohio, as president.

Mr. Bobeczko is a 1967 graduate of Carnegie Institute of Technology in Pittsburgh, where he received a B.S. degree in Mechanical Engineering.

He becomes the fifth person from the Ohio area to hold the post of UYL-NA president. The others were Eugene Woloshyn, William Murak, Michael Zadorecky and Taras Szmagala.

Both Mr. Woloshyn and Mr. Szmagala are uncles of the new prexy. His grandfather is the long-time UNA Supreme Advisor Dmytro Szmagala.

Elected along with Mr. Bobeczko were Ray Karbiwnyk of Philadelphia, 1st vice-president; Patricia Danielson Reynolds of Detroit, 2nd vice-president; Patricia Kochirka of Pittsburgh, financial secretary; Oksana Lenyk of Rochester, treasurer; Taras Herbowy of Utica, recording secretary. Advisors elected were: Robert Hussar of Rochester, William Polewchak of Clark, N.J., Ray Mandzuk of Toronto, Myron Shindak of Detroit, and Taras Szmagala of Parma, Ohio.

UNA Supreme Advisor Myron Kurobas of Chicago was elected to a 3-year trusteeship on the UYL-NA Foundation Board. Lawrence Sanagursky of Rochester, Patt Blaschak of Allentown and John "Chops" Nalepa of Elizabeth, N.J., were elected district organizers.

The new president's first order of business was the appointment of Carole Hussar as secretary.

Reports of the outgoing officers, discussions, and proposals for future activity both nationally and internationally filled out the agenda of the two-day convention.

A series of resolutions were adopted to promulgate the objectives of the organization stressing greater activity of its rank and file membership.

Chairing the sessions were: Dr. Krywolap, E. Kolman, vice-chairman, with H. Yesevsky and A. Revenko serving as secretaries.

KERHONKSON, N.Y. — Blessed with fine weather and encouraged by what appeared to be a record turnout of spectators (close to 4,000 according to estimate), the Ukrainian tennis players and swimmers fought it out for three days on Soyuzivka's refurbished courts and in the resort's Olympic-size pool to determine the national champions for 1967.

There were no upsets in earlier rounds and the players made the seeding committee look good as all eight seeds advanced to the quarter-finals. Shyan took care of the disappointing Rostyslav Smal ("Chernyk" Detroit), while Snylyk encountered trouble with Zenon Matkivsky (KLK), the latter refusing to yield until the third set when he weakened because of a nagging virus.

Backfire But that game backfired on Snylyk, as he, in turn, had little left for the third set against Olyneec in the semis, a player whom he had defeated for the eastern crown three weeks earlier.

With John Durbak, champion the last two years who is currently serving in the U.S. Army in Viet Nam, expected to be back next year, and Lev Vorobkevych, the better from Detroit and the only player to have won the tournament three times running, also readying himself for a comeback, next year's battle for the title should really be a grand one.

The biggest surprise — if not a revelation — was in the women's division, with Phyllis Korol ("Chernyk" Detroit) Snylyk (Newark "Chorno-

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
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ODUM Youth Has 17th Convention At Own Resort in Accord

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Editorials

It Was A Good Summer

Though the "official" termination of summer is still two weeks away, Labor Day weekend signals the end of summer activity, of vacations, of unperturbed relaxation and, hopefully, the stagnating heat that at times makes the latter imperative.

In more than one respect it was a good summer for our community, and particularly for our youth. The extended Labor Day weekend, utilized by countless groups and organizations for annual gatherings, was a fitting climax to a summer well spent.

Hundreds of our youngsters spent the summer camping at various sites across the United States and Canada, getting the much needed respite from school work, studies and exams. Their stay at the camps, as always, proved doubly rewarding since they spent it in an atmosphere wholly conducive to their Ukrainian upbringing.

The significance of these uniquely desirable surroundings is repeatedly underscored by the youngsters themselves, not so much when they are confronted with direct queries by the elders, but when they are given the opportunity to show what they have learned in the relatively short time.

They recite Ukrainian poetry without the slightest trace of "accent" - even those who spoke little Ukrainian when they arrived at camp site, they sing Ukrainian songs with greater feeling, they perform Ukrainian dances with greater zest and they have learned to love the Ukrainian heritage because they gained deeper understanding of it.

Last weekend we were all witness to that. Thousands of our youths flocked to our resorts, hundreds of them took part in athletic events, competing perhaps harder than in their schools. They staged programs that surpassed in numbers and in quality those given by their seniors. And what is most important, they did it willingly, without prodding, with enthusiasm.

They were serious when the occasion called for it at convocations, mixing conviviality with somber deliberations to set the plans for future activity.

The year ahead will be rich in events of great significance. After a summer that was good, indeed, our youth should be ready for different though no less important kind of activity that determines the overall progress of our community. We are certain that they are ready for it.

And Now The World Congress

The event that is undoubtedly of paramount importance for all Ukrainians is the World Congress of Free Ukrainians, scheduled to convene in mid-November in New York.

We have repeatedly stressed here that in view of the magnitude and vast ramifications of this historic gathering it is extremely important that we all do our utmost to assure its success.

The event has aroused the interest of our world-wide community, and particularly our kinsmen in Europe are looking forward to it as a manifestation of our unity and re-dedication to the cause of Ukraine's ultimate liberation. This is clearly the impression of UNA's Supreme President Joseph Lesawyer, who had recently completed a six-week journey through the countries of Europe.

To the best of our knowledge and those who follow the developments in Ukraine, our brothers there also look to this event to dramatize their plight before the world public opinion.

To be sure, there may be doubts in some quarters as to our capabilities of staging such an event on a correspondingly high level. As we have stated before, we believe it can be done. We have shown it in the past, a mere four years ago when we staged our biggest and most impressive manifestation in conjunction with the unveiling of the Taras Shevchenko monument in the nation's capital. The "spirit of Washington," as we called it at that time, is still fresh in our memory. It has not been extinguished.

The core of our community on the North American continent, which must bear the brunt of organizing and staging the World Congress, is preparing for it with increasing confidence and belief that it will be a success. Now is the time to marshal our know-how and resources for this sole event that may well prove to be the turning point in our history.

(1) It is my firm conviction, my dear Seminarians, that any young person of the various ethnic groups that make up our America, any young person that neglects to study and learn the language, history and culture of his forefathers, any young person who refuses to work actively and unstintingly for the high ideals of our government, such a person, I say is a hidden enemy of the United States. I will go a step further and say that such a person, whether consciously or otherwise, becomes a tool of aid and works for Moscow and its communist inspired imperialism and ideology, which, briefly stated, makes every effort to destroy the moral and political strength of the United States. America needs highly educated citizens, fluent in many

THE GENERALS AND THE SENATE

There is a trite saying that has been current in the United States at least since the end of the American Civil War in 1865 to the effect that the United States is a nation of pacifists dominated by veterans.

Like all such slogans it contains at least a modicum of truth for it refers to the political power of the veterans of the different wars in which the United States has fought, as shown by the veterans' groups organized into associations for social purposes. After the Civil War there was the Grand Army of the Republic, after the Spanish-American War the Veterans of the Spanish-American War and, later, after World War I, the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

After World War II no new society arose but that was because of the relatively large number of men who participated in both wars and the old societies could furnish many resources and facilities which did not need to be duplicated, while the Reserve Corps and the National Guard offered a convenient connection between the two groups of veterans.

Distrust of Power

Yet with all this there is no country which has had less occasion to fear and distrust the power of the military men than the United States. The officers of the regular Army, Navy and Air Force have always been fully in accord with the principles of the United States.

They have never tried to dominate American foreign or domestic policy and the country has never been confronted with that kind of a threat of the military in politics that has marked the history of many a European and Asian country.

It would be impossible to conceive of the type of military intrusion into politics that we are familiar with from the columns of the daily press in many lands, where the armed forces have been a favored caste, separate and above the average citizen.

One reason for this has undoubtedly been the fact that almost alone in the country the veterans' groups have been free from any class feeling and have been able to draw on all veterans, while the labor groups have never adopted an anti-governmental policy as they have in some countries and sought political goals of a suspicious character.

Thus the favorite excuse for the left in many lands is the real or hypothetical danger from the right which can only be met successfully by the left regarding itself as a special democratic element without asking itself whether it and its extremist groups are justified. The old slogan of the democrats - "no danger from the left" - has been a dangerous guide to politics in many lands.

Unpleasant Symptoms

On the other hand, it cannot be denied that the intro-

duction of non-American modes of thinking since World War I has produced some unpleasant symptoms.

Between the two World Wars, there was a group of so-called intellectuals who tried to prove that the military and the munition-makers were forming an unholy alliance against the peace of the world.

Today we have equally irresponsible intellectuals who inveigh against the Establishment, in which they include all individuals and associations that desire the rule of law and public decency without agreeing with their own dogmatic urge to scrap all this in quest for something new and better.

We have to understand and appreciate all this if we are to understand many of the arguments put forward by Senator Fulbright as Chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee in his efforts "to restore to Congress a meaningful role in the conduct of foreign affairs," and stop the influence of President Johnson.

He and his allies in the Congress and the press are talking early and late about it exactly as that group of Senators that President Wilson called the "wilful men" contradicted all efforts of Wilson to maintain peace. They claimed that all his efforts were dominated by a desire to get the United States into the war, while most Americans along the Atlantic coast regarded him as a most dangerous pacifist. Even such members of his cabinet as William Jennings Bryan resigned as Secretary of State because of Wilson's catering to an assumed war party.

Chairman Furious

Fulbright seems especially furious because various Chiefs of Staff have not been reprimanded for reporting to Congress their belief that more bombing of North Viet Nam is needed and that the war, if it is to be ended, must be ended by total victory of the breaking of the Communist will to resist.

These seem to the critics to have gone beyond the consoling speeches of the President and Secretary MacNamara. Yet the position of these high officers is always uncomfortable. There is no one so skilled in finding out when an officer is being muzzled by his superiors as a Senator and there is no one so ready as a Senator to berate even a President of his own party for compelling the commanding officers not to tell Congress their own definite opinion when they are asked.

The Senate finds it great sport to attack the honest opinion of the officers as evidence of the military getting out of control and the government for preventing Congress from learning the truth. When we remember further that there are quite a few Senators and Congressmen who have worked for years in the Reserve Corps and have

risen and are active in the higher ranks, we must realize that some are fully aware of many of the currents and cross-currents of military thought and realize almost instantly whether the officers appearing before them are voicing their own and the best military opinion. They are in a position to bring out to their colleagues in the Senate from the officers' own words the extent to which they have been muzzled.

Friendship Deteriorates

For a couple of decades Johnson and Fulbright, as two Senators from adjacent states confronted with many of the same problems, were close friends and collaborators in managing the Democratic votes in the Senate.

After Johnson became Vice-President and still more since he became President, this friendship has changed gradually into bitter hostility and Senator Fulbright has forged a new set of allies apparently united only by their determination to oppose everything that President Johnson desires.

They have attracted a number of Senators on various points but they are not so sure of their support that they have yet ventured to try to repeal the so-called Tonkin Gulf Resolution which offered by an overwhelming majority, full support for the President in his policy in Viet Nam. They certainly have nowhere near the majority by which they passed the first resolution and they realize that anything else would be poor political strategy despite the hysterical movements among the intellectuals, the Communists and the hippies, three groups to which they listen as relevant.

When we consider the entire discussion from this point of view, it is an important factor in preparation for the political campaign of 1968.

It has no significance as to the good sense or loyalty of the American armed forces which are by all accounts as loyal and devoted American patriots as those who fought in America's other wars, or the system by which Congress and especially the Senate can maintain touch with the present situation so as to give their sober and unbiased judgement when it is time for the Senate to vote on American policy.

Palance Hurt, Undaunted

Jack Palance, noted Ukrainian American stage, TV and movie star, was in Toronto's St. Michael's Hospital after being injured on the set of "The Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" special.

The two-hour program is being taped in that city for screening on ABC later this year. Producer Dan Curtis said

The Crystal Ballroom was the scene of the banquet, Saturday night. Principal speaker was Mr. John Fisher, Centennial Commissioner of Canada. He was introduced by toastmaster Bohdan Stefaniuk.

Others seated at the head-table were: noted actor Jack Palance, who was in Canada shooting "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" for TV presentation this fall; banquet chairman Mrs. Sophie Lucyk; Mr. and Mrs. Leon Kossar, he is Canadian National Director of the Folk Arts Council; UNA Supreme President Joseph Lesawyer and his wife Mary; His Excellency Bishop Isidore Borecky, Eparch of Toronto; Honorable John Yaremko, Q.C.M.P.P., Minister of Social and Family Service of Ontario; Honorable Michael Starr, M.P., Canada's former Minister of Labor; Rt. Rev. Palance suffered superficial injuries when he fell 16 feet from a window in a Canadian Broadcasting Corp. studio. He is expected to remain under observation for a few days. Production will not be interrupted. Curtis, who said Palance refused to use a stunt man, reported that the actor asked, after he fell, "Did we get the shot?"

The first Ukrainian immigrant arrived in Pittsburgh in 1880. Shortly thereafter a few more arrived. In 1888 more Ukrainians migrated to Pittsburgh from their European villages. In 1890, twenty-five families settled in the south side of Pittsburgh.

Industrious Group

These immigrants were an industrious group who had been accustomed to toiling long hours and facing many hardships in their native land. They were a pious group who had strong religious convictions. They had no church of their own until 1891 when the congregation purchased the property on the corner of 7th and Carson Streets.

In 1880 St. John's received its first pastor. In 1891 the

Church received its first charter of incorporation. On November 19, 1907 the Church and property were signed over to the Ukrainian Catholic Diocese of Philadelphia, when the Most Rev. Soter Ortynsky was bishop.

Father Nicholas Stepanovich became pastor in 1895. Within his 16 years of administration, he is credited with the erection of a brick church and hall. He also arranged for the purchase of land for the parish cemetery, located at Churchview Ave., and Glass Run Road in Carrick.

Personal Sacrifice

During the depression years the parish debt had steadily mounted and the Church was in danger of losing its property. Through personal sacrifices and that of his parishioners, Father Michael Kindey, who became pastor in 1931, is credited with preventing a foreclosure on the mortgage, and eventually paid off the debt. He was also instrumental in obtaining Sisters for the establishment of a parochial school.

The Church is now in the process of being renovated in preparation for the diamond jubilee on Sunday October 1, 1967. An interesting program is being planned which has never been witnessed in the Pittsburgh area. Everybody is invited to attend. The banquet is by reservation only.

strengthen the faith and the hope of its people.

4. My fourth and last point, that a human person to be human must remember his origins, the land and the people from which he sprang, flows out of my Ukrainian soul, out of the world outlook of a Ukrainian, out of my national feelings and convictions. I became an American citizen with a specific purpose in mind, to continue the work I have done all my life, that is, to fight for the freedom and self-determination not only of Ukraine, but also of America and of every nation in the free world which is under attack or endangered by the Moscow inspired communist conspiracy.

the world belongs to that nation which has the strongest, the best, the most forward looking ideas and intellectual capacity.

For these reasons, I dare to affirm to you here and now, that America does not only ask of our Ukrainian people that they educate their youth to be American patriots with a full knowledge of the language, history and culture of Ukraine, she does not only ask this I say, she demands it of us. She demands that the Ukrainian community keep itself well-informed of the oppression that Ukraine and many other nations enslaved by Moscow have suffered. The Ukrainian community will thereby become a living reminder to the United States of the fact that imperialism, communism and colonialism actually, destructively hates the human person. Besides this, America demands of us Ukrainians not only a knowledge of our own cultural heritage, but its continuance and development in all its branches. The United States needs intelligent, enlightened Amer-

ican Ukrainian patriots, not some unenlightened boneheads who have become comic Gogol-like figures of American life.

2. My second point is that not only does American foreign and domestic policy demand of us, American citizens that they have a knowledge of our Ukrainian language and culture and its further development, but the American Educational System also demands this of us.

All of us here are educated men, and you know as well as I do, that you cannot get your Masters' degree or Doctorate within the American educational system without a knowledge of languages and cultures, including Ukrainian. After all, Ukraine is practically the geopolitical center of all the Slavic World. Ukraine is the economic foundation of Moscow's imperialism and colonialism, which even today is destroying our soldiers in Korea, Vietnam and other places. Ukraine is the key to East Europe, to the countries of the Black Sea and the Balkans. This is why Ukrainian-

American citizens have a moral obligation to prepare the greatest number of experts on Ukraine and East Europe for the United States. Every empire comes to an end. Let us not forget that just because it has been enslaved, East European history has not come to an end. On the contrary, it continues to evolve.

Furthermore, our American educational system will have to prepare a huge corps of experts in Ukrainian for our government in order that it might be able to act wisely and promptly during coming events. The security of America and its people depends upon it. Without such a corps of experts, America, in the face of these coming events will be nothing more than a deaf, dumb and blind political lout.

3. My third point is directed to you as to our future priests and leaders. Not only does America demand from us Ukrainian Americans a knowledge of our language and culture, but so also does the Holy See. Her ideas, di-

rectives and objectives, generally speaking, coincide with those of the United States' program of developing friendship and goodwill among nations by way of respect for their languages and cultures. Therefore, America expects you as future priests to be loyal, active American patriots and exponents of our language and culture. The Holy See for her part demands your full commitment to Christ Who calls you, as He did the Apostles, to preach the good news of the gospel to all nations in all languages, not just in English. Do not, therefore, because of laziness, discriminate against the language of your forefathers, and do not make light of Christ's commands.

A further reason for you to nurture a knowledge of Ukrainian and its culture is because the Holy See, after Stalin's destruction of our Holy Church in Ukraine, has designated and established our Ukrainian Byzantine Rite as a separate, distinct Rite within the Catholic Church. From among you are to come

the new generation of professors of our Church history and of our theology. Not only would our Ukrainian Church suffer were you to neglect the tasks placed upon you by Christ and His successor, the Bishop of Rome, but all of Catholicism in the United States would suffer as well. I say this because I believe that priests who do not understand the tasks placed upon them by Christ and the Church and their country, America, are not true priests, but the gravediggers of America and the Holy See. You must be on fire with your love for our Holy Faith and our America. Of all the nations of the world, only she has guaranteed freedom to every ethnic group to proclaim the fundamentals of Christian truth in their native tongues against the Muscovite anti-Christ; that is to say, to preach freedom and justice and mercy and brotherly love for the benefit of all captive nations and Ukraine. The radio stations of the free world will carry your voices to Ukraine and this will

And Now Some More Soccer

The dust, raised by the emergence of professional soccer in the United States, has hardly had a chance to settle and is being stirred again, on a smaller scale, by the start of the American and German-American soccer seasons.

Nats Win Opener

The Philadelphia Ukrainian Nationals opened their season on a winning note last Sunday in Rochester, New York, winning 3-1 over a newly formed team in the league, the Rochester Lancers.

The teams were tied at 1-1 at the end of the first half but the Nats, sporting a new player in heir forward line came through with two more goals in the final stanza to win 3-1. The newly acquired forward is Lew Passache. Passache proved his value to the ulcb when he scored at the 40th second of the first half to put his side ahead. Rochester tied the score on a goal by Jose DeCastro.

In the second period some of the old timers on the team like Henry Wagner and Ismael Ferreyra came through with scores. Wagner scored the second goal to put his team ahead 2-1 and Ferreyra netted a goal with only two minutes remaining to put the game on ice.

Sitch in Rochester

Philadelphia will open its season at home this Sunday against another newcomer to the loop, Washington Britanica. While the Nats were winning, the Newark Ukrainian Sitch were getting ready to play the Lancers this Sunday. Sitch will play in Rochester in their first game of the season, and hopes to repeat the Nats performance of a week ago.

The German-American Soccer League champion, New York Ukrainians, will also start this Sunday at the Ukrainian field against Hellenic Sport Club. Hopefully the game will be different from the one just a few months ago when one of the USC players required extensive medical care as a result of a "sporting" dispute.

The player involved was Peter Lobaton. Lobaton ran afoul of the predominantly Greek crowd and was severely beaten, suffering a concussion among other things. The match was a deciding one for the GAL championship but at the time of the hooligan attack Hellenic was ahead.

Pros in Play-Offs

While the season is starting among the semi-professionals, the National Professional Soccer League is still in the midst of its play-offs.

The Baltimore Bays, who had won the Eastern Division championship, defeated the Western Division finalist, Oakland Clippers, 1-0, at Baltimore last Sunday before 16,619 pro-Baltimore fans.

Some press reports said that Baltimore was aided in its victory over the strong California club by the continuous chanting of the crowd which urged its Bays to score. With 17 minutes left in the game Dennis Violett, a 32-year-old Englishman, banged the ball into the upper right hand corner of the net on a pass by team captain Juan Santisteban, of Spain.

Fire Coach

The two clubs are meeting in the second game of the two-game total-goal series in Oakland today. If Baltimore can keep the Clippers from scoring it will walk away with the first National Professional Soccer League championship. But, ironic as it may be, the coach who piloted the Bays to these triumphs in the initial season is being fired by the Baltimore "for the good of the organization."

sets 6-4, 6-3, but Dr. Huk's methodical stroking proved too much for his teammate from Newark. Kuchinsky's victory in the semis over Bohdan Burachinsky (Newark Sitch) can be classified as a minor upset (2-6, 6-4, 6-4).

Another Durbak?

In the junior division final, Lubomyr Hnatiw from Utica, N.Y., defeated Ihor Zubal ("Lviv," Cleveland), 6-4, 6-0, thus becoming the first winner of the new John Krasnyk trophy, provided by the UNA in honor of the late sports leader and one-time USCAK president. Hnatiw has the talent to follow in the footsteps of this now famous predecessor, Durbak, Smal and Zenon Jackiw, top-notch players in the men's division.

In the boys division, (14 yrs.) Roman Rakochy, Jr., took The Ukrainian Weekly trophy for the second straight time, defeating Andrew Nowycky ("Lviv" Cleveland) in the finals, 6-1, 6-4. The latter competed also in the junior division, losing a tough three-setter to Zubal.

Four boys competed in the 11-year division, with Roman Melnyk winning over Ihor Kushnir, 6-3, 6-4. Roman's brother, Zenon, took second place by virtue of his victory over Oleh Pastushenko (6-0, 6-1).

Dzvinka Lenec won The Ukrainian Weekly trophy for the third consecutive year in the junior girls division. In a repeat final, Miss Lenec defeated Miss Maria Pavlichka, 6-4, 6-4.

Great Meet

The two-day swimming meet had spectators buzzing and milling around the swimming pool for two afternoons, as Mr. Jaroslav Rubel, meet supervisor, lined up one group after another for what proved to be extremely close-contested events.

Philadelphia's Ukrainian Student Sports Club of America (USSKA) again won the team trophy, (51 points), claiming a second leg on the UNA hardware. A major surprise of the meet was the showing of the Terpak family — Daria, Christine, Michael and Paul — who came in first in each of their respective divisions, with the exception of Paul who was edged out by Volodymyr Kornienko in the boys 25 m. free-style.


