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UKRAINIAN CATHOLICS OF METROPOLITAN NEW YORK GIVE ENTHUSIASTIC WELCOME TO CARDINAL SLIPYJ

METROPOLITAN JOHN GREETS CARDINAL IN BOUND BROOK UKRAINIAN HIERARCHS VOICE HOPE FOR UNITY

Bound Brook, N.J.—Archbishop John Theodorovich, Metropolitan of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church in the USA, greeted the visiting Primate of the Ukrainian Catholic Church, Josyf Cardinal Slipyj, at the altar of the golden-domed Church-Memorial here Tuesday, August 6, in a historic meeting of far-reaching ramifications for the faithful of both Ukrainian Churches.

"I greet you as a brother, a Christian, and a Ukrainian," said the Orthodox prelate as he met the Ukrainian Cardinal at the foot of the ornate iconostas inside the church.

Metropolitan John, recalling the "tree of disunity that was planted centuries ago by our ancestors," said that although the Ukrainian Churches had chosen "different roads to God," both are blessed by the Almighty and are now "coming closer together."

Cardinal Josyf, in responding to the Metropolitan's greetings, said that it was "a happy and blessed occasion" for him. "Let this be a moment of joy on the way to our unity," said the Primate of the Ukrainian Catholic Church.

Cardinal Josyf journeyed to this picturesque site from Stamford, Conn., accompanied by Bishop Schmondiuk, Msgr. Myroslaw Marusyn, Msgr. Emil Manasterky and Prof. Wasyl Lencyk. He was met at the door of the church by a group of faithful, both Orthodox and Catholic and members of the Orthodox clergy led by Archbishop Mstyslaw Skrypnyk, head of the Consistory.

He was greeted with flowers by 7-year-old Melania Hrybowych, while members of the local church organization offered bread and salt on an embroidered scarf. The Rev. Paul Falko welcomed

TELEGRAM FROM PRESIDENT JOHNSON

Catholic University Of America Confers Degree On Cardinal

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The Catholic University of America conferred an honorary Doctor of Laws degree on Cardinal Slipyj at a special convocation here August 2. The degree was conferred

by Patrick Cardinal O'Boyle, chancellor of the university and archbishop of Washington. In the citation read by C. Joseph Nuesse, acting executive vice rector of the university, the Cardinal was referred to as a "scholar, educator, steadfast and resourceful leader of a vast, if scattered, Christian flock."

Acting rector John P. Whalen, addressing the convocation in Caldwell Hall auditorium, said that "in many ways, Cardinal Slipyj symbolizes in his own person the heroism of his own people." He told the Cardinal: "In no way can we this morning render the tribute due you or sufficiently express our admiration for your long and indomitable struggle for righteousness against the forces of evil."

Accepting the degree with "deepest gratitude," Cardinal Slipyj declared that he regarded it as "a token of respect for the Ukrainian people who are favored by this University, which includes Ukrainians among its faculty and student body."

Choral music during the exercises was sung by the Ukrainian Men's Choir of Holy Family Ukrainian Catholic Church in Washington, Nicholas Kormeluk directing. During his stay in Washington, the Cardinal and his entourage paid a visit to the Taras Shevchenko monument.

NEW YORK, N.Y. — A crowd of some 1,000 well-wishers greeted Josyf Cardinal Slipyj, Primate of the Ukrainian Catholic Church, upon his arrival here Wednesday, July 31, at John F. Kennedy Airport. The Cardinal arrived from Detroit where he spent two days visiting the Ukrainian community, after a similar visit in Chicago over the

DETROIT, Mich. — Governor George Romney and Detroit Councilwoman Mary L. Beck joined thousands of this city's Ukrainian Catholics in honoring Cardinal Slipyj during his visit here July 29-31. Both the State and the city proclaimed July 29 and 30 as Cardinal Slipyj Days. Miss Beck, who was among some 1,000 persons gathered at Metropolitan Airport on July 29 to welcome the Cardinal, addressed words of greeting to the archbishop-major in both English and Ukrainian. Among the official greeters were Dr. B. Lonchyna, head of the Cardinal Slipyj Welcoming Committee, M. Duzhy, its executive director, and the "Trembita" male chorus. Governor Romney met with Cardinal Slipyj for 40 minutes in the Basilian Fathers home, then accompanied the prelate to Cobo Hall for a Moleben attended by about 6,000 persons.

Liturgy at Singer Bowl

Some 7,500 followers braved oppressive heat to attend a two-hour long Pontifical Divine Liturgy at the Singer Bowl in Flushing Meadows (site of the recent New York World's Fair) on August 3.

Many in the audience, which included hundreds of uniformed Plast and SUMA young people, held umbrellas as a shield from the blazing sun.

The Cardinal, garbed in brilliant gold vestments and wearing a jewel-studded mitre, was the principal celebrant.

His concelebrants were Metropolitan Ambrose Senyshyn of Philadelphia, Bishop Joseph M. Schmondiuk of Stamford, Bishop Yaroslav Gabro of Chicago, Metropolitan Maxime Hermaniuk of Winnipeg, Bishop Neil N. Savaryn of Edmonton and Bishop Isidore Borecky of Toronto.

The stage of the Singer Bowl was fitted out with a red baldachin, or canopy, above the altar. The temporary sanctuary was draped in red pleated cloth.

200-Voice Choir

As the prelates celebrated the mass of St. John Chrysostom, a 200-voice choir sang the responses. The members of the choir, under the direction of Michael Dobosh, wore blue and yellow robes.

Several score worshippers lined up during the service to make their confessions before three priests. The clerics sat in folding chairs while the penitents knelt beside them.

Preaching in Ukrainian, Cardinal Slipyj delivered a short homily praising the United States and its religious freedoms.

The outdoor mass was celebrated under a heavy security guard, a precaution against assassination threats made on the life of the 76-year-old prelate.

Lieutenant Michael Luchuf of the Police Department said that the police detail was doubled after two threats on the Cardinal's life were received Friday night by WABC-TV.

After the mass, a private luncheon was held at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel.

Captive Nations Week Observed In Pittsburgh

Judge Matthew J. Troy Declares All Captive Nations Must be Free

NEW YORK — Some 100 representatives of Communist-dominated countries and over 150 members of the press and sympathizers of the Captive Nations gathered here July 19 at a reception concluding Captive Nations Week. The reception was held in the Upper East Side town house of artist-art collector George Maillard Kessler.

Also on the scene, though not officially part of the program, were about a dozen New York City policemen, stationed outside the building and a nearby street corner reportedly to forestall any further incidents in the recent outbreak of bombing happenings in the metropolitan area.

In a brief formal ceremony, Judge Matthew J. Troy, chairman of the Captive Nations Week Committee of New York, declared that there could not be one kind of freedom for the people of Vietnam and another for the people of more than 20 captive nations—all nations must be freed from totalitarian communism.

Michael Spontak, head of the Ukrainian division of the American Friends of the Anti-bolshevik Bloc of Nations,

called on Americans to "utilize the force of the people from the Captive Nations — a potentially powerful force — in attaining true peace with justice for all nations based upon universal freedom and social righteousness."

A Captive Nations Week resolution endorsing the concept of human rights for all peoples enslaved by Moscow and Peking, was read by Mrs. Doria Stapaniak, from the AF-ABN Ukrainian Division, who wore a Ukrainian historical costume.

Dr. Ivan Docheff, chairman of the AF-ABN, was master of ceremonies.

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Indiana Girl Takes on Job Of Road-Building in Africa

Chris Holowaty is spending a month in the authentic "African Queen" setting of Western Africa, says a story in the Gary (Ind.) Post-Tribune.

Miss Holowaty isn't some director's new Katharine Hepburn or another tourist on safari. As she puts it, she'll be "digging right in with the natives" ...literally. The 22-year-old daughter of Dr. and Mrs. M. O. Holowaty of Gary will help build a road in Togo.

From July 5 to Aug. 5, she is participating in the Ecumenical Voluntary Service, which screens applicants from all over the world. Although the World Council of Churches is the parent organization, "there are no religious requirements. In fact, the only requirements are that the applicant be between the ages of 19 and 30, in good health and able to work well with people."

The candidates, who assume all personal costs such as transportation and room and board, select their own programs. "I chose Togo, Africa, because I speak French, which is spoken there," Chris explained. "And I thought it would be very interesting to see such a totally different culture."

The Ecumenical Voluntary Service serves "to foster un-

derstanding between different peoples of the world." Chris will take lots of slides in Africa and says she is willing to speak anywhere about her experiences there when she returns.

Odd Job For Nurse

A graduate of Indiana University School of Nursing, Miss Holowaty plans to work in neurology at Riley Children's Hospital in Indianapolis after traveling in Europe. "But in Togo, I will not be concerned with the medical aspect, unless it's my own," she says. "I'll just be working on the road."

"Basically, I feel I will be able to learn much more from these villages while I'm living with them than I can teach; to gain more from them than I can give. But I hope they also learn a little about us Americans." She's packing lots of visual aids; picture post cards of Gary; an assortment of penny candy; Kool Aid; balloons; instant sauce mixes and instant salad dressings.

"I was told to bring mosquito netting and lots of insect repellent."

"Any other essentials?" she was asked.

"Oh yes," Chris laughed. "Dungarees and work gloves."
