SHAMOKIN, Pa. — Michael Kitsock, District Manager, Syracuse, New York District for the United Service Division of the General Motors Corporation, and a fiction author, will be the principal speaker at the 75th UNA anniversary banquet, which will be held on Saturday, May 31, 1969 at the American Legion Hall in Shamokin, Pa., according to an announcement of the UNA Jubilee Committee.

Preparations For "Anna Yaroslava" in Final Stages

NEW YORK, N.Y. — Preparations for the premiere of "Anna Yaroslava" to be presented by the Ukrainian National Association on Saturday, May 24, 1969 at Carnegie Hall in New York City are now in the final stages. Rehearsals are being held, stage and costume settings are being readied, and tickets are being sold at an accelerated pace.

The opera, based on the marriage of Princess Anna Yaroslava, daughter of Grand Prince Yaroslav the Wise of Ukraine, to King Henry I of France in the eleventh century, was composed by Antin Rudnytsky, the noted contemporary Ukrainian composer. The libretto was written by Leonid Poltava, poet, writer and journalist.

The presentation of the new opera is made on the occasion of the 75th Jubilee Anniversary of the Ukrainian National Association.

The cast of the opera includes internationally known Ukrainian singers such as Marta Kokolska, soprano, a former member of the City Center Opera; Alicia Andreadis, mezzo-soprano, and former member of the Teatro Colon in Buenos Aires; Andrij Dobriansky, young bass-baritone, a member of the Metropolitan Opera National Company; Lev Reynarovich, baritone, a former member of the Ukrainian Opera in Lviv, tenors Ivan Hosh and Peter Zaharchuk, and sopranos Eugenia Wasylenko and Oryana Hewka and many other male and female singers. The choreographer is Roman Pryma-Bohachevsky, well-known ballet dancer and teacher.

John Starr Named Corporation President

NEW YORK, N.Y. — John G. Starr, a dynamic account executive whose rapid rise in the world of finance has been the talk of the town here, was named president of Stanwood Oil Corporation, based in Erie, Pa.

The announcement was made here Wednesday, May 14, at a press luncheon at Schwartz's Restaurant, attended by corporation officers, stockholders and personal friends of Mr. Starr.

In announcing the appointment, the outgoing president John A. Kaye said that Mr. Starr was selected from among 23 aspiring candidates. "He has the desire, the stamina, the imagination and the guts to take over the firm and lead it towards new heights of achievement," said Mr. Kaye, who is assuming the post of chairman of the board.

Mr. Starr, 45, has served as an account executive with Phillips Appel and Walden since 1961. Born in Woonsocket, Rhode Island, of Ukrainian immigrant parents, Mr. Starr attended the Holy Ghost Ukrainian school in Brooklyn, N.Y., where his parents moved from Woonsocket.

Active in Ukrainian civic organizations, notably the Ukrainian Catholic Youth League and the Ukrainian Veterans organizations, Mr. Starr served in the U.S. Air Force during World War II, having attained the rank of 2nd lieutenant. In 1961 he quit a promising career in engineering to enter the world of finance as a licensed stockbroker.

"I took a chance and it paid

off," says the personable executive. A man of seemingly inexhaustible energy, Mr. Starr has retained much of his interest in the Ukrainian American community. Early this year, he made a \$500 contribution to the Ukrainian Studies Chair Fund and a \$300 donation to the children's camp at Soyuzivka for the purchase of equipment.

Married to the former Julia Wojnowicz of Detroit, Mr. Starr is the father of three children — Peter, 16, Gregory, 14, and Christine, 12. The occasion last Wednesday was doubly auspicious for Mr. Starr's family, as his daughter celebrated her twelfth birthday. Mrs. Starr and Christine attended the press luncheon. The family, all members of the UNA branch 325, reside in Roslyn Heights, L.I. They are parishioners of St. Vladimir's Ukrainian Catholic Church in Hempstead, L.I.

Stachiw Elected Head of Shevchenko Scientific Society

NEW YORK, N.Y. — Dr. Matthew Stachiw, outstanding Ukrainian scholar and historian, was elected President of the Shevchenko Scientific Society at a meeting of the Society's executive board held on Friday, May 9, in New York City. The session was dedicated to the late Prof. Roman Smal-Stocki, President of the Shevchenko Scientific Society for many years, who died on April 27, 1969 in Washington, D.C. Dr. Matthew Stachiw, a vice president of the Society, who presided at the meeting, also delivered a brief eulogy of the late Prof. Smal-Stocki. Most of the meeting's agenda dealt with matters connected with the death of the Society's President.

It was decided that on June 7, 1969, a memorial Mass will be said at St. George Ukrainian Catholic Church in New York City for the repose of the soul of Prof. Smal-Stocki, and that similar memorial Masses will be said in other larger centers throughout the United States.

Concerning the presidency of the Shevchenko Scientific Society, two proposals were made: one called for an extraordinary convention of the Society not later than the end of November, 1969 and that Dr. M. Stachiw serve as interim president to that time; the other called for the immediate election of new president. The latter proposal was accepted by a majority vote. As a result, Dr. Stachiw was elected.

Inasmuch as Dr. Stachiw resides in Scranton, Pa., it was decided that at the next meeting of the executive board of the Society, a division of functions among mem-

bers of the Presidium of the Executive Committee will be effectuated. The Presidium, in addition to the President, includes Dr. Basil Steciuk, Scientific secretary, Roman Kobrynsky, Office Director, and Dr. Vincent Shandor, legal counsel to the Society.

At the session, it was reported by the secretary that the Shevchenko Scientific Society of Canada under the direction of Prof. Eugene Wertyporch held a memorial session in memory of the late Prof. Smal-Stocki, and that a similar session was held by the Shevchenko Scientific Society of Europe under the presidency of Prof. Volodymyr Kubyshyn in Sarcelles, near Paris.

It was also reported that in addition to a letter written by the late Prof. Smal-Stocki to Metropolitan Ambrose Senyshyn, which was read during his funeral, Prof. Smal-Stocki also left a legacy, which has not as yet been made public.

UCCA Pays Tribute to Smal-Stocki

TENTH CONGRESS OF AMERICANS OF UKRAINIAN DESCENT TO BE DEDICATED TO HIS WORK AND MEMORY

NEW YORK, N.Y. — On Friday, May 9, 1969 the Executive Board of the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America (UCCA) held its monthly meeting with 25 members attending. UCCA Executive Vice President Joseph Lesawyer, who chaired the meeting, delivered a short eulogy and called on all to rise in tribute to the late Prof. Roman Smal-Stocki, a member of the UCCA Executive Board for several years.

On the proposal of UCCA President Dr. Lev E. Dobriansky, the forthcoming Xth Congress of Americans of Ukrainian Descent will be dedicated to the work and memory of Prof. Smal-Stocki. The UCCA will issue a volume of Prof. Smal-Stocki's works in recognition for his services to the cause of Ukrainian liberation. In addition, it was decided that the Autumn 1969 issue of The Ukrainian Quarterly would be dedicated entirely to the memory of Prof. Smal-Stocki.

Dr. Dobriansky reported on a series of issues under con-

sideration, among them the forthcoming U.S. population census in 1970, concerning which the UCCA will issue special instructions and recommendations. He also dwelt on the 10th anniversary of "Captive Nations Week Resolution" (July 13-19) and the visit of Dr. Ku-cheng Kang from Taiwan to the United States this summer. The UCCA will also issue a statement in memory of the late Alvin M. Bentley, former U.S. Congressman who helped in the passage of the Shevchenko statue resolution in the U.S. Congress. The UCCA President also reported on a number of issues, particularly in connection with the new Administration's policies and recommended that 10 "Shevchenko Freedom Awards" be issued to Ukrainian and American leaders during the Xth Congress of the UCCA.

Mr. John Wynnnyk, head of the UCCA Auditing Committee, reported on the audit of books and activities of the UCCA and proposed a series of recommendations with a view of augmenting the financial efficiency of the UCCA.

UCCA Treasurer Dr. Jaroslaw Padoch outlined a plan for the current fiscal year and stressed the urgency of purchasing a representative home of the UCCA in New York City.

Mr. Ivan Bazarko, UCCA Executive Administrator, reported on the general situation of UCCA branches throughout the country and underscored a need for sponsoring state-wide meetings of UCCA branches and member organizations at which representatives of the UCCA Executive Board would outline issues and problems in connection with the Xth Congress this fall. His recommendation in this respect were accepted and will be implemented.

Dr. Edward Zarsky, head of the UCCA Educational Council, reported on the audience with Metropolitan Ambrose Senyshyn by members of the UCCA Educational Council, which took place on April 30, 1969 in Philadelphia.

Several other problems, including the current anti-Ukrainian campaign by some Slovak newspapers and leaders in connection with the demands of the Ukrainian minority for cultural freedom in the Friashiv area, as reported by Dr. Walter Dushnyk, were discussed and referred to UCCA special committees for closer examination.

The UCCA Executive Board meeting was effective in that it brought up a number of concrete issues, many of which were discussed and recommended for implementation.

task stipulate that they will refuse to look after the child unless it is baptized. "Usually," writes Zelenkov, "it is impossible immediately to satisfy the needs of all the parents in the nurseries and kindergartens. If it is impossible to settle the situation of accommodating children in nurseries and kindergartens, we must forget about the young mother."

He further writes: "Religious rites, especially baptism, are important watchwords in the atheistic upbringing of youth, because people other than the parents also are responsible for the baptism of a child. It is sufficient to recall that 69 percent of the parents who baptized their children are under 30. It is well to ponder this."

End of the Road For U.S. in World Cup Play

The United States World Cup team, with its best chance ever to qualify for the famed tournament next year in Mexico, became the victim of little regarded Haiti which held the Americans scoreless in the two-game series.

Banach in Goal

The coup de grace came last Sunday when the U.S. team, with Orest Banach in goal, lost 1-0 in San Diego before a crowd of 6,546. The American squad lost the first game of the series 2-0 at Port au Prince last month.

Insult to Injury

Haiti now must play the winner of the El Salvador-Honduras series for the right to go to Mexico in 1970. The U.S. team, coached by Gordon Jago, coach of the Baltimore Bays in the North American Soccer League, had an opportunity to get on the scoring sheet early in the match when Siegfried Stritzl blasted a shot at the Haitian goal only to see it hit the crossbar and bounce out.

Sitch Ties, Nats Lose

Meanwhile, in the American Soccer League which completed its second Sunday of competition, Newark Ukrainian Sitch played to a tie while Philadelphia Ukrainian Nationals lost.

For Sitch, which had lost the Sunday before to the Philadelphia Ukrainians, the 2-2 tie was gratifying, especially since it was against a highly reputed team, the Philadelphia Spartans.

The game was played at Harrison's JFK Stadium which is now the home field for Sitch. Despite this advantage, if it ever is an advantage, Sitch had to come back from a 2-0 deficit to gain the tie.

Sitch took over command of play in the second half, with some help from a strong and cold wind, and evened matters. Lou Wilczak, playing at right wing, headed the first goal midway in the final period and with 10 minutes remaining Marian Oleksyn scored from close range to tie the game to the delight of about 300 spectators.

In Washington, the Philadelphia Ukrainians suffered a 4-0 loss at the hands of the powerful Washington Darts. The D.C. squad held a 1-0 lead in the first half but than poured it on in the second adding three more goals.

USC Ties

In the German American Soccer League, the New York Ukrainians managed a tie with Giuliana, 1-1, thanks to a penalty shot made good by Walter Schmotolocha with just a few minutes remaining in the game at Metropolitan Oval.

An interesting thing may be developing in Philadelphia where the Nats are reportedly sharing the Temple University Stadium with the Philadelphia Spartans. On opening day on May 2, the Spartans, thanks to good publicity, drew some 4,000 spectators in their game against Washington.

The Nats will have their opener tomorrow against Inter of New York, and this may indicate how things will go in the future. Besides, there is a real chance for a good, healthy rivalry developing between the two Philadelphia sides which may stir soccer enthusiasm and bring back the fans.

As an aside to the whole thing, the Spartans have in their lineup several former Nat players. One is Henry Wagner, former captain, and the other Carlos Yacovino, who was known while with the Nats as "Yakovyna." Remember??

Archbishop to Close Jubilee Year

PHILADELPHIA (ER) - that his personal delegate will be sent to Philadelphia September 28 when the jubilee year will end. Metropolitan Ambrose indicated that the celebration will be a two-day affair. The March 16 observance by the Philadelphia Deanery was the first public celebration of the jubilee. Throughout the year, all deaneries in the Philadelphia archdiocese will conduct similar programs.
