PLAN SYNOD OF ALL UKRAINIAN ORTHODOX BISHOPS IN FREE WORLD

SOUTH BOUND BROOK, N.J. — A synod of all Ukrainian Orthodox Bishops in the free world is planned now in line with the announced efforts of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA to attain closer unity among the existing churches.

The plans were contained in a communique made public here last week, soon after the completion of the Synod of Bishops of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA.

The announcement said that the first stage on the road to unity of all Ukrainian Orthodox faithful in the free world should be the convocation of the leading hierarchs "living beyond the borders of Ukraine."

The announcement said that this step was in line with the appeal of the Synod of the Ukrainian Autocephalous

UCCA Urges UN to Heed Petition of Prisoners in USSR

NEW YORK, N.Y. — The Ukrainian Congress Committee of America voiced its unstinted support to the petition, submitted recently to the U.N. Commission on Human Rights by a group of Ukrainian and Russian political prisoners, held in slave labor camps in the USSR.

Dr. Lev E. Dobriansky, president of the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America, dispatched a letter to UN Secretary U Thant, urging him to put the petitions on the agenda of the UN Human Rights Commission.

Crass Violations

"These petitions stress the crass violations of human rights, denial of personal and national liberty, suppression of religious freedom and curtailment of other rights inherent to every citizen and individual regardless of race,

CHRISTENING UNWLA Branch 18 of Passaic Initiated

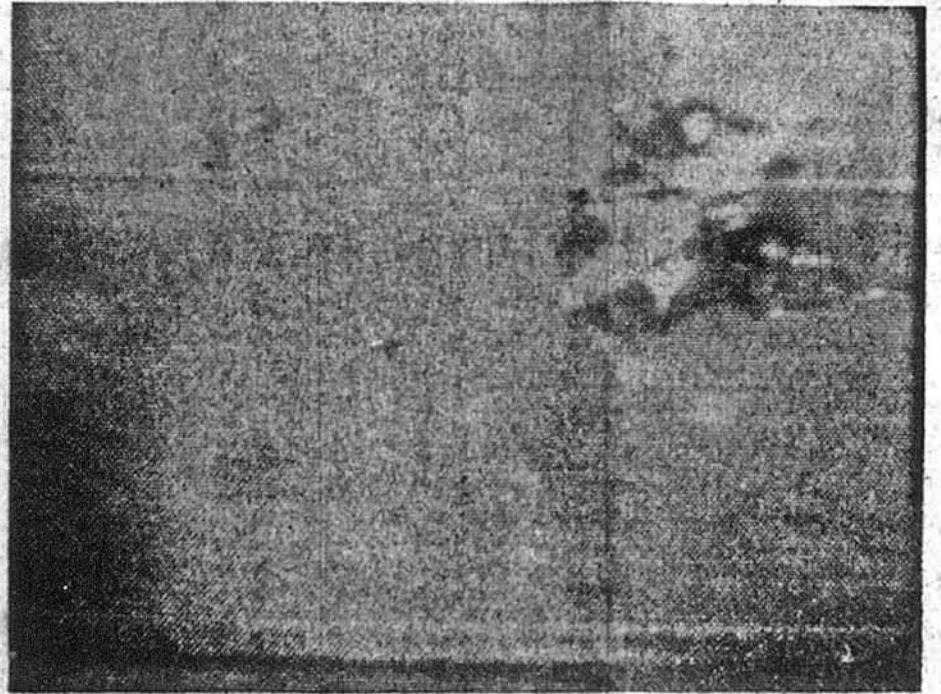

NEW YORK, N.Y. — The Federation of Ukrainian Student Organizations of America (SUSTA), seeking far-reaching changes in its structure, planning and activities, is meeting in its 11th congress this weekend at UNA's year-round resort Soyuzivka in the Catskills.

FIRST POST-CONGRESSIONAL PARLEY SEEKS NEW PROGRAMS, BROADER INVOLVEMENT IN ACTIVITIES

NEW YORK, N.Y. — The new executive board of the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America held its first post-congressional meeting, Friday, November 14, with 29 members, elected at the 10th Congress, in attendance.

The agenda included the report of Dr. Lev E. Dobriansky, elected president of the UCCA for the seventh consecutive term, who outlined the immediate plans of the UCCA for 1970, and reports of executive vice-president Joseph Lesawyer and executive administrator Ivan Bazarko, Ignatius M. Billinsky, secretary, Very Rev. Msgr. Myroslaw Charyn, vice-president, and Dr. Stephen Woroch.

The meeting unanimously coopted Dr. Walter Dushnyk to full-fledged membership in the UCCA executive board, with all rights and privileges as editor of UCCA's publica-

Two Ukrainian Youths Die in Vietnam Action

JERSEY CITY, N.J. — Two Ukrainian youths, one from Rochester, N.Y., the other from Boston, Mass., died in Vietnam within a period of barely two weeks.

David Babey, a 20-year old Rochesterian, who was a member of UNA Branch 367, was killed in action on October 19.

Nikolaus Zozula, 23, Boston University graduate, member of SUMA and of the UNA Branch 374, died on November 2, in an enemy rocket and mortar attack, according to a Defense Department announcement.

Babey, a former athlete at Irondequoit High School, was graduated in June 1968 and entered the Army that September. He had been in Vietnam for 41 months and expected to complete his tour of duty in a few weeks.

While in high school, Babey was a defensive halfback on the football team and a hurdler on the track team.

In a letter to his uncle, Gerald Phelan, a police officer, Babey said he believed he had a duty to serve in Vietnam and combat communism.

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The art of Ukrainian Easter egg decoration was demonstrated here to a large group of on-lookers, including Mrs. Richard M. Nixon, who came to view the 1969 Co-op Craft exhibit staged by the Department of Agriculture.

James Kilraine, who is half Irish and half Ukrainian, deftly demonstrated the art of pysanka decoration, as well as ceramics and other Ukrainian crafts.

A 33-year-old government personnel analyst from Branchdale, Pa., Mr. Kilraine said he learned the art when he was 14 years old.

"A woman immigrant taught the custom to me," he was quoted as saying in the New York Times. "In Ukraine it is very common and it is undergoing a revival among Ukrainian Americans today."

Seventy-six craftsmen from across the country are giving demonstrations of their crafts at the exhibit which opened October 2. More than 1,000 articles submitted by 200 persons from 32 states were on the month-long exhibit.

'78 World Cup in Argentina

Earlier this year news media reported that the United States Soccer Football Association applied to its international parent body, FIFA, for permission to hold the 1978 World Cup games in the United States. On September 10, FIFA apparently told the USSFA "try us for 1982."

According to a short story in the British magazine World Soccer, FIFA had confirmed on September 10 that the 1978 games had been awarded to Argentina. The confirmation was in reply to the widely circulated reports here on the USSFA application.

Try in 1982

A spokesman for FIFA said, according to World Soccer, that no application from the USSFA had been received but that if one is received the U.S. body would be told "they could introduce an application for the 1982 finals."

There are some interesting reasons why the games were awarded to Argentina. According to the story, the decision to award the finals to the Latin American country came after they failed to get the 1970 finals, which went to Mexico.

It seems that Sir Stanley Rous, long-time president of FIFA, had said, in 1964, that as both Argentina and Mexico worked hard for the 1970 games, the loser would be given the 1978 finals.

It seems, to us, that Mexico tried harder, but it also seems to us that being number two is not so bad, after all.

Kiev Loses

Kiev Dynamo, competing in the second round of the European Champions Cup, lost to Italian champion Fiorentina, 2-1, on Wednesday, November 12. The loss on the home field cuts the Ukrainian team's chances considerably.

The final of the European Cup will be played in Milan or Rome on May 6 next year, and the Cup Winners Cup final will be in Vienna on April 29.

1,000 For Pele

One of the most brilliant soccer players ever to play the game, Brazil's Pele, has finally scored his 1,000th goal last Wednesday.

The 29-year-old forward of the Santos F.C. reached the milestone in a game against Vasco da Gama at the huge Maracana Stadium in Rio de Janeiro. Santos won the otherwise insignificant match 2-1.

The achievement of the goal millenium was the high point of Pele's 13 years as one of the world's top professional soccer players.

Only two other major league players achieved the coveted mark in the history of soccer — Arthur Friedenreich of Brazil (1,329 career goals) and Franz (Bimbo) Binder of Austria (1,006).

Pele almost scored the 1,000th goal of his career last Sunday in the last minute of play but the ball rebounded from the crossbar. Pele's teammate, Jair, pounded the ball into the net to give Santos a 1-1 tie with the Salvador squad.

The Brazilian forward scored his 999th goal on November 14th on a penalty kick in an exhibition match.

The International Football Federation (FIFA) announced in Zurich that the public drawing for next year's World Cup championships will be held January 10 in Mexico City. The 16 finalists will begin play in four groups — with the winners advancing to the championship round.

Brazilian national soccer team coach Saldanha was quoted as telling Mexico City newsmen that European football play was, in his words, barbarous. He also predicted that the World Cup will be decided between defending champion England, Brazil, Uruguay and West Germany.
