Rev. Hundiak Installed as Bishop of Ukrainian Orthodox Church

BOUND BROOK, N.J. — In a colorful ceremony, attended by numerous clergy and faithful, Sunday, May 31, Rev. John Hundiak was installed as Bishop of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the U.S. Assuming the name of Bishop Mark, because of great reverence for the apostle and his writings and teaching, Rev. Hundiak was consecrated by Metropolitan John Theodorovich and Archbishop Mystyslaw Skrypnyk.

Bishop Mark fills the office left vacant by the death of Bishop Alexander Novytsky of the Chicago Diocese. Formerly the pastor of St. Demetrius Ukrainian Orthodox Church in Carteret, N.J., Bishop Mark has long been active in the affairs of the Ukrainian community here in America.

As Father Hundiak, he had served St. Demetrius Church since Oct. 15, 1932. During his pastorate, the parish grew in membership and facilities. Active in civic life, Bishop Mark had been an advisor during the depression to the organization of Carteret unemployed people. He was in the Welfare Board during three administrations, was the department chaplain and vice-chairman of the Zoning Board of Adjustments.

A member of the Church

Council and Consistory, Bishop Mark served as editor of the official publication of his church and published a church "Home News" to maintain contact with the 315 parishioners in the armed forces in World War II.

Born in Pluhiv, Ukraine, July 7, 1895, Bishop Mark attended high school at the Rohatyn and Zolochiv Gymnasiums. He completed his theological education after arriving in the United States on Oct. 8, 1913.

Since being ordained a priest in 1919 by the late Bishop Nicetas Budka, he has served churches at Chicago, Ill.; Minersville, Pa.; Newark, Passaic, and Troy, N.Y.

Attending Bishop Mark's elevation were Joseph Lesawyer, Supreme President of the UNA, and Supreme Vice-President Walter Sochan.

Also on hand to extend their congratulations were; Michael Piznak, Treasurer of the Ukrainian Institute of America, Edward Popil, Treasurer of the UWA.

Bishop Mark in addition received congratulatory telegrams from President Richard M. Nixon, New Jersey Governor William T. Cahill, as well as from Bishop Iov and Bishop Orest and scores of other organizations and friends.

Governors, Mayors Proclaim Fraternal Week Observance

JERSEY CITY, N.J. — New Jersey Governor William T. Cahill and Jersey City Mayor Thomas J. Whelan signed proclamations Thursday, May 4, announcing the week of June 8 to 14, 1970 as Fraternal Week in the State and in the city.

The Governor presented the proclamation after signing it at New Jersey's state capitol in Trenton to a delegation of fraternalists among whom were Joseph Lesawyer, Supreme Vice-President of the UNA, Supreme Vice-President Walter Sochan, and Peter Pucilo, Supreme Treasurer.

Other Groups

Also in the delegation were Peter Nowosielski, Executive Vice-President of the Sons of Poland, Mrs. Helen Wold, Secretary Treasurer of the N.J. Fraternal Congress, Merille Gille of the Lutheran Brotherhood, J.A. Sabol, President of the Slovak Union, Raymond J. Peel, of the Knights of Columbus, Peter J. Plaza, of the Sons of Poland, Harold J. Wittenbauer, N.J. Fraternal Congress, and Lois L. Levine, Chairman of the Public Service Commission.

In signing the proclamation Governor Cahill, amid the representatives of the various fraternal organizations, was assisted by newly appointed State Insurance Commissioner Robert L. Clifford.

The Governor commented that he was very happy to sign this document because

"the members of fraternal organizations have proven themselves to be good citizens, providing important services to their communities."

Commissioner Clifford also spoke telling the assembled representatives that he "appreciated the opportunity to be able to work with such fine people as the fraternalists."

Earlier in the day the same delegation of Messrs. Lesawyer, Sochan, and Pucilo, accompanied by Mrs. Anna Soslowska, Advisor to the Sons of Poland, Mrs. Janet Piscopo, Director of the Scholarship Committee of the Sons of Poland, and Michael C. Stefano, Supreme Council of the Knights of Columbus, received a similar proclamation from Mayor Whelan at his city hall office in Jersey City.

The Mayor told Mr. Lesawyer that he was always glad to help the Ukrainian people of Jersey City.

There were signings of proclamations in other municipalities. Mayor Hugh Addonizio issued his proclamation at city hall in Newark, while Irvington Mayor Harry Stevenson followed suit at his town hall office.

In Bayonne, Mayor Francis G. Fitzpatrick signed his document before city tax assessor Myron Solonyka who accepted it on behalf of the fraternalists.

of New Jersey Governor William T. Cahill, issued Thursday, June 4, 1970

WHEREAS, the president of the National Fraternal Congress of America, an affiliation of some 100 fraternal organizations and ten million members, has proclaimed June 8 to 14, 1970 as Fraternal WEEK; and

WHEREAS, the fraternal benefit system through its societies and lodges in every community, performs many religious, charitable, patriotic and benevolent activities; and

WHEREAS, these local societies and lodges, and members in the civic and patriotic projects, render great service to our state and nation, especially through the "Blood for Brotherhood" program; and

WHEREAS, the fraternal benefit societies proclaim their patriotism through special observances of Flag Day, June 14, and are a part of the National Flag Day Foundation, an organization devoted to keeping alive the memory of Dr. Barnard J. Cigrand, the "father" of Flag Day, through the maintenance of the schoolhouse in Fredonia, Wisconsin, where in 1883 he held the first known Flag Day observance to honor the flag of the United States of America; and

WHEREAS, the National Fraternal Congress of America long has chosen the dates of Fraternal Week to include Flag Day; and

WHEREAS, the president and executive committee of the National Fraternal Congress of America have called upon all leaders of societies and lodges comprising the entire fraternal benefit system and its ten million members to apprise fully all the people of the ideals and objectives of the fraternal benefit system and to unite in observance of Fraternal Week.

FIRST THREE AT HARVARD

Complete Program in Ukrainian Studies

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. — Three Ukrainian students are the first to complete their doctoral course work within the program of Ukrainian studies established at Harvard University in 1968.

Two of them, Lubomyr Hajda and Orest Subtelny, have worked under the direction of the Committee on History and Middle Eastern Studies and under Prof. Omeljan Pritsak as their advisor.

The third, George Grabowicz, studied in the Department of Comparative Literature under Prof. Wiktor Weintraub as his advisor.

The Boards of Examiners for the general examinations of both Messrs. Hajda and Subtelny were chaired by Dr. Pritsak. Mr. Hajda, who passed his examinations on May 21st "with distinction," had as his examiners Professors Alexander Ohloblyn (Ukrainian history), Omeljan Pritsak (Turkish-Ukrainian relations, comparative and historical Turkology), Edward Keenan (East European history up to Peter I) and

UCCA SELECTS PHILADELPHIA TO MARK ANNIVERSARY

CURRENT ACTIVITIES IN CAPITOL, POSSIBILITY OF ASSISTANCE TO FLOOD VICTIMS IN UKRAINE, OTHER MATTERS DISCUSSED AT UCCA EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING

NEW YORK, N.Y. (UCCA Special). — The observance of the thirtieth anniversary of the founding of the UCCA will be held Saturday, October 10, in Philadelphia, Pa., according to a decision taken by the UCCA Executive Board at a meeting, held Friday, June 5, here.

President's Report

In turn, Prof. Lev E. Dobriansky, President of the UCCA, presented an extensive report on his activities in the nation's capital, summarized as follows:

● "Operations Independence" (H. Res. 979 calling for official recognition of January 22 as "Ukrainian Independence Day" by the U.S. Congress) is progressing satisfactorily. A number of Congressmen have already introduced their own resolutions, and now two U.S. Senators are preparing similar resolutions in the Senate. He urged the UCCA Branches to give their utmost support by writing and calling their Congressmen and Senators and requesting their assistance. In this Congressional election year the chances for a passage of the resolution are good.

● The ratification of the genocide convention is meeting certain snags on the part of Conservative groups and from some ethnic organizations which seem to have missed the implication and meaning of the document.

● Reprints of the "Captives Nations in the 40's" article, with the preface by Congressman Edward J. Derwinski, have been extensively (Continued on p. 5)

is the net result of the utter failure to resist this pressure.

Guests at Meeting

Two guests were present at the meeting before the official deliberations began. Dr. John Hvozda, president of the Organization for the Defense of Lemkivshchyna, spoke on the dire situation of Ukrainians in Communist Poland and appealed to the UCCA to intervene on their behalf. It was suggested that a memorandum be prepared by the said organization, which in turn the UCCA would submit to the U.S. Government in Washington.

Prof. Joseph Boyko, of the University of Munich and the Ukrainian Free University, also in the Bavarian capital, greeted the UCCA Executive Board and stressed the necessity of intellectual reaction against Communist policies in Ukraine and elsewhere.

He added that the prevailing indifference in the free world to relentless Communist persecution and Russification of the captive nations, encourages the Kremlin and the continued drive of Moscow to subvert the free world

distributed both by the UCCA president and the UCCA central office in New York.
• The UCCA president also reported that his new book, "Russia, USSR and U.S." is being printed by an American commercial printing company and the UCCA should subscribe to 2,500 copies to enhance the sale of the book.
• "Captive Nations Week" preparations are in full swing, and the practical theme of the observance should be the need of a special Captive Nations Committee in Congress. Prof. Dobriansky also suggested that the World Congress of Free Ukrainians should prevail upon Ukrainians in other countries to observe Captive Nations Week with appropriate ceremonies and programs.
• The American Council for World Freedom which held its meeting recently in Washington, was attended by the UCCA president. A suggestion was made that the UCCA join the Council upon closer examination of its aims and objectives. Ignatius M. Billinsky, UCCA secretary, was appointed to serve as liaison officer with the group.
• The WACL (World Anti-Communist League) will hold its annual meeting, September 15-20, 1970 in Tokyo, Japan, and it was decided that Mr. Billinsky will represent the UCCA, if an official invitation is received.
• Prof. Dobriansky also reported that a U.S. Congressional Committee will soon release testimony of Prof. Kratkov, a former head of the Soviet "cultural exchange" department in Moscow, who defected and revealed Soviet thinking and operations in this field.

For his doctoral dissertation Mr. Grabowicz has undertaken a study of the 17th century school drama, with special emphasis on the Ukrainian drama in relation to its Polish and Russian counterparts. His recent study on "The Kholmynsky Rebellion of 1648 in the Contemporary Polish Literature," will be published in the near future in the Harvard Series in Ukrainian Studies.
Having become doctoral candidates, the three students will now begin work on their doctoral dissertations.
Lubomyr Hajda, born in 1941 in Sianik, Western Ukraine, came to Harvard in 1966. He received his B.A. degree from Boston College in the same year. The topic of his dissertation is the Turkish policy of Hetman Petro Doroshenko (1665-1676).
Orest Subtelny was born in Cracow in 1942. After studying at Temple University and the universities of Vienna and Hamburg, he received his B.A. degree from Temple in 1965. In 1967 he earned an M.A. degree in history at the University of North Carolina and came to Harvard in the same year. Mr. Subtelny's dissertation topic will concern the activity of Hetman Pylyp Orlyk (1710-1742).
George Grabowicz, born in Cracow in 1943, graduated with a B.A. degree from Yale University in 1965. In 1965-66 he was an honorary Woodrow Wilson Fellow and a Ful-

Ivan Nedilsky, Noted Composer, Dies in New York

NEW YORK, N.Y. — Ivan Nedilsky, noted Ukrainian composer, conductor and teacher of music, died here Friday, June 5, at the age of 74.
Mr. Nedilsky, a graduate of the Berlin Conservatory of Music, was particularly noted for his choral music and compositions which gained great popularity among Ukrainians on both sides of the ocean.
Born in Zoloty Potik, Buchach county, Western Ukraine, in 1895, Mr. Nedilsky completed his secondary education in Bukovina and served in the Austrian armed forces before entering the Berlin Conservatory after World War I. He graduated in 1924 and returned to Ukraine where he taught music in Stanyslaviv and was director of the city's State Music School.
After a four-year stay in West Germany following World War II, Mr. Nedilsky came to the United States where he resumed his com-

posing and teaching. One of the founders of the popular Ukrainian Music Institute of America in 1952, Mr. Nedilsky taught at the New York school and served on the Institute's board of directors.
Among scores of choral compositions that made Mr. Nedilsky popular is the famous "Zaslao Sontse Zolote," a song that is included in every Ukrainian choral ensemble's repertoire. He was awarded first prize in the first "Dumka" chorus contest for his "Pid Homim Kyivskyyh Dzvoniw."
Surviving are his wife Sophia, sons Volodymyr and Jaroslaw, sister Maria in Ukraine, several grandchildren, nieces and nephews.
Funeral services were held Wednesday, June 10, from St. George's Ukrainian Catholic Church here, with interment at the Ukrainian Orthodox Cemetery in Bound Brook, N.J.
