HELEN HNATYSHYN HEADS COUNCIL OF WOMEN

WINNIPEG, Man. — Mrs. Helen Hnatyshyn, one of the prominent Ukrainian women's leaders in Canada and the widow of the late Senator John Hnatyshyn, was elected president of Canada's National Council of Women. Elected by the members assembled here for the Council's 77th annual convention June 2, Mrs. Hnatyshyn served as the Council's recording secretary last year.

band, John Hnatyshyn, was one of the first Canadians of Ukrainian descent to be named senator. Her sons Roman and Victor are, like their father before them, practicing attorneys. Her youngest son David is currently seeking admission to the Bar. Her daughter Elizabeth is a law student in Toronto.

The election of Mrs. Hnatyshyn reflects the growing recognition of the role and varied contributions of Ukrainians in Canada. The sphere of women's activity is but one of several where individual Ukrainians have risen to positions of influence and authority.

HARVARD PLANS SUMMER PROGRAM

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. — The Harvard University Ukrainian Studies Newsletter announced in its most recent issue that preliminary applications for the programs in Ukrainian studies planned to be given at Harvard in the summer of 1971 are being accepted now.

Two types of programs are being planned: credited survey-type courses in Ukrainian history, language and literature in the Harvard Summer School; a non-credited summer institute of Ukrainian Studies devoted to a variety of topics in Ukrainian history and culture.

Eligible to apply are undergraduates, graduate students, and non-students with B.A. degrees.

The story mentions the efforts by the Committee on Ukrainian Studies to expand the University library's collection on Ukraine, the publication of the Harvard series in Ukrainian studies, and the programs in Ukrainian studies planned for the summer of 1971.

Meanwhile the Newsletter of the Harvard Graduate Society, an association of alumni of the graduate schools at Harvard, in its May 18th issue carried a news article on "Ukrainian Studies."

RYBAK WINS DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY IN PENNSYLVANIA

BETHLEHEM, Pa. — State Representative William C. Rybak, a Ukrainian Attorney from Bethlehem, captured the Democratic nomination for Pennsylvania's General Assembly from the 135th district after a three-way fight.

Rybak was appointed U.S. Rent Control Attorney-Advisor for the Lehigh Valley Area in 1950. He was school director for the Bethlehem area school district from 1953 to 1959, and was president of the Board from 1957 to 1959.

In 1966, Rybak was chosen as "Pennsylvania's Handicapped Citizen of the Year." In 1967, he was the recipient of the Benjamin Rush Award for his many contributions to health services in the community.

UKRAINIAN DEMOCRATS MEET WITH GOVERNMENTAL CANDIDATE

NEW YORK, N.Y. — A group of high-ranking Democrats representing various nationalities groups on the Democratic National Committee met here Friday, June 12, with Justice Arthur J. Goldberg, one of the party's candidates for Governor of New York, and his running mate, State Senator Basil A. Patterson, who is running for Lieutenant Governor.

Representing the Ukrainian Democrats at the breakfast meeting, held on the eve of the June 23rd primaries, was Joseph Lesawyer, National Chairman of the All Americans Council and Democratic National Committee member, and Walter Klawnick, Chairman of the New York State Ukrainian Division of the Democratic Party, who is also a member of both the All Americans Council and the National Committee.

SOCIETY FOR PATRIARCHAL SYSTEM MEETS IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, N.Y. — Dr. Z. Gil, of Trenton, N.J., was elected president of the Society for the Patriarchal System of the Ukrainian Catholic Church at the organization's general meeting here Saturday, June 13.

TORONTO, Ont. — The Coordinating Committee of Ukrainian Organizations in the U.S. and Canada for the Establishment of a Patriarchate in the Ukrainian Catholic Church will hold a "Day of the Ukrainian Catholic Church" on Sunday, June 21.

The Coordinating Committee, which is sponsoring and directing this manifestation, has invited all bishops of the Ukrainian Catholic Church as well as all other clergy, laity, and all Ukrainian youth organizations to participate in the proceedings.

BOYS OPEN SUMMER CAMP AT SOYUZIVKA TODAY

KERHONKSON, N.Y. — Soyuzivka's "Lviv" villa will be humming again today, signaling the opening of the summer camps for the youngsters at this attractive UNA resort in the Catskills.

Nestled cozily among the tall trees, the Lviv villa is a natural site for camps. It has a fair-sized playground, its own swimming pool, dining hall and all other facilities that make the youngsters' stay comfortable without making it "soft."

Boys ranging in age from 7 to 13 will open the three-week camp tour today to be followed by the girls of the same age group. As of last week, 26 boys were registered for the camp.

DR. YARYMOVYCH NAMED DIRECTOR OF NATO UNIT

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Dr. Michael I. Yarymovych, Deputy for Requirements in the Office of the Assistant Secretary of the Air Force for Research and Development, has been named Director of the Advisory Group for Aerospace Research and Development (AGARD), a North Atlantic Treaty Organization unit.

Noted for his advocacy of the proposed Space Transportation System, a national program to meet NASA and Department of Defense needs, Dr. Yarymovych has been responsible for programmatic and technical direction of the Air Force space program since March 1968.

His new duties in Paris, which he will assume July 6, 1970, place Dr. Yarymovych in charge of bringing together the leading NATO aerospace scientists and engineers to provide scientific advice to the NATO Military Committee as well as assist NATO nations in research and development for the common good.

Dr. Yarymovych, who was born in Ukraine, is 36 years old. After attending public schools in Germany, he immigrated to the United States in 1951. Graduating magna cum laude from New York University in 1955 with a bachelor of aeronautical engineering degree, he entered Columbia University, receiving his M.S. in engineering mechanics in 1956, and his doctorate of engineering sciences in 1960.

IMPROVE ENVIRONMENT

Mr. Hawrylak said that the seventies will place greater demands on the engineers to improve the conditions in which we live and to create a milieu in which man can enjoy all the benefits of advanced technology.

NEW ORTHODOX CHURCH BLESSED IN CLIFTON

CLIFTON, N.J. — The Holy Ascension Church, a new edifice on Hope Avenue in Passaic, N.J., that serves some 650 Ukrainian Orthodox parishioners here, was consecrated Sunday, June 7, by Metropolitan John Theodoreovich, Primate of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA.

Also taking part in the consecration ceremonies were Archbishop Mstyslaw Skrypnyk and recently consecrated Bishop John Hundiak who concelebrated with the Metropolitan the Pontifical Divine Liturgy Sunday morning.

Numerous Clergy Scores of visiting clergy from the neighboring areas took part in the elaborate ceremonies of consecration and the late afternoon banquet staged on the occasion at the Marriot Hotel in Saddle Brook, N.J.

Metropolitan John led the procession of clergy from the rectory to the church where he was greeted with bread and salt, in accordance with the Ukrainian custom, by a group of parishioners led by Peter Dutkevich, parish president and building committee chairman.

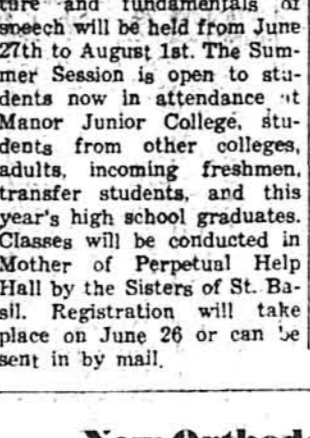
ENGINEERS HOLD CONFERENCE, OUTING AT SOYUZIVKA

KERHONKSON, N.Y. — The idea of "Ukrainian power," a concept that is steadily gaining momentum in various Ukrainian circles, was discussed extensively though still in broad terms by Ukrainian engineers at an afternoon conference here last Saturday.

The conference, part of the annual spring outing hosted at Soyuzivka by the New York chapter of the Ukrainian Engineers Society of America, brought together some 50 members of what is regarded as the largest Ukrainian professional organization in the U.S.

Wolodymyr Hnatkivsky, the newly elected national president of the Society, set the tone for the conference when he spoke on the general aims of the Society in the forthcoming years. One of three speakers, Mr. Hnatkivsky was followed by Roman Hawrylak and Jaroslav Terlecky, each of whom dealt with specific problems confronting Ukrainian engineers as professionals and as members of the Ukrainian community.

An associate fellow of the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics, Dr. Yarymovych is a member of Tau Beta Pi and Sigma Xi. In 1964 he was chosen by the Washington Academy of Sciences as the outstanding young engineer for Washington, D.C. He was nominated for the Arthur Flemming Award in 1967 and 1969, and received the Air Force Exceptional Civilian Service Award in 1968.

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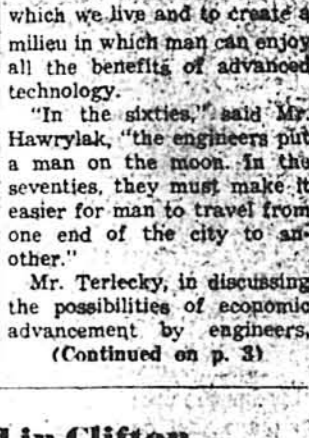

HERLINSKY RETAINS SENIOR MEN'S CROWN KERHONKSON, N. Y. — Michael Shyan (Carpathian Ski Club, Boston) defeated Dr. Zenon Matkowsky, his KLK colleague from Boston, in the finals of the Eastern tennis championships at So-yuzivka last weekend to take the Roman Slobodian trophy and the title for 1970.

Zuk's Piano Recital - A Great Success in N.Y.C.

NEW YORK, N.Y. — Irene Zuk, the brilliant Ukrainian Canadian pianist, scored another success in a recital at Michael Paul Hall of the Juilliard School on Monday, June 1, here.

The young artist played an exciting program of works by Haydn, Revutsky, Liszt, Chopin, Eckhardt-Gramatte and Moussorgsky. The Haydn Sonata in G Major, which opened the program, was given a restrained, well-balanced performance; it was played with lightness, precision and a good sense of style.

After this classical work, the recital turned to music with strong romantic identification. There was a colorful Spanish Dance by the contemporary Canadian composer, Sonia Eckhardt-Gramatte. With its driving rhythm in imitation of the guitar and almost improvisatory, song-like sections, it constituted an effective show-piece and was excellently played.

An interesting part of the evening was the group of three pieces, two by Ukrainian composers, and one by Liszt, based on a Ukrainian folk song. The lyrical "Song Without Words" by Revutsky with rich harmonies was beautifully underlined with an evocative singing tone.

The large audience enthusiastically called for encores. Mr. Zuk complied with a scintillating performance of La Campanella and with Chopin's First Etude.

Jules Rimet Cup Will be Retired

Should either Brazil or Italy capture the 1970 soccer World Cup title, the solid gold trophy will be retired. Rules state that if any team wins the Jules Rimet Cup three times, it will get to keep it permanently.

It must have been a bitter pill to swallow for England. They had built up a quick 2-0 lead in their quarterfinal match with the Germans and seemed to be certain of advancement. But, as in the 1966 games, the Germans managed a tie and then, unlike the 1966 affair, it was the Germans who scored the winning goal in overtime to take a sweet victory.

World Cup games are still the most popular TV and radio programs in West Germany. Munich has found a new way of measuring the popularity of a program. It measures the thousands of gallons of water flushed away as viewers rush to their bathrooms after watching the more popular programs.

A city official said 2,200 liters of water a second were flushed away by Munich citizens after the game between England and Germany last Sunday, which was televised from Leon, Mexico.

(Last Wednesday, Brazil defeated Uruguay 3-1 in the semifinal match at Guadalupe. Italy edged out West Germany 4-3 in overtime at Mexico City's Aztec Stadium. Brazil and Italy will meet in the final tomorrow. Uruguay and West Germany are meeting today to decide the third and fourth place).

Lakehead Male Choir To Perform in Dauphin

DAUPHIN, Man. — The famous Lakehead Ukrainian Male Choir will be one of more than twenty groups to appear at Canada's National Ukrainian Festival in Dauphin, July 31, August 1 and 2.

For the past fifteen years the members of the Lakehead Ukrainian Male Choir have devoted much time and energy to bring pleasure to their listeners, thereby propagating the music of Ukraine and by these efforts making a worthwhile contribution to the culture of Canada.

The group of approximately 35 voices presented its first concert in June of 1955 and since has given many performances on Radio, television and in concert halls. Canada's centennial year was a particularly busy one for the group as they visited a number of towns in northwestern Ontario and culminating with participation in the International Festival in Winnipeg.

When in 1969 the choir marked its fifteenth anniversary, Mayor E. H. Reed presented the men with a scroll for the city of Fort William and paid special tribute to Mr. Hryhory Myhal who has been the choir's director since its inception.

Some eighteen costumes, representing Ukrainian female attire from the third century B.C. through the eighteenth century, will be modeled here in two separate shows Friday and Saturday, July 31 and August 1. The research on the authentically recreated costumes was done by Mrs. Christine Voyevodka, traveling to Dauphin with Mrs. Maria Savchak, president of Branch 64.

Meanwhile, the American Soccer League has started its season and Newark Ukrainian Sitch and the Philadelphia Ukrainians met for the first time two weeks ago in Philadelphia. The game ended in a scoreless draw.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. (AY) — In the "good old days" before World War II, when white pugilists predominated on the boxing scene and there was much more interest in his sport, a few Ukrainian Americans made a name for themselves in the ring. There were such as Big Ben Moroz, Steve Halaiko and Johnny Jadick. Moroz died at an early age and last month Jadick died in Philadelphia at the age of 62.

Jadick won the junior welterweight professional boxing championship of the world in 1932, defeating Tony Canzoneri in a 10-rounder at Connie Mack Stadium. He successfully defended his title several times. He lost it in 1936 to Battling Shaw in New Orleans.

Jadick had a strong left jab and copied the style of light-heavyweight champion Tommy Loughran, also of Philadelphia. Altogether Jadick fought 134 times. After retiring from the ring, Jadick was a clothing salesman for many years and kicked out the first ball at one of the Ukrainian Nationals' home soccer games in 1962.
