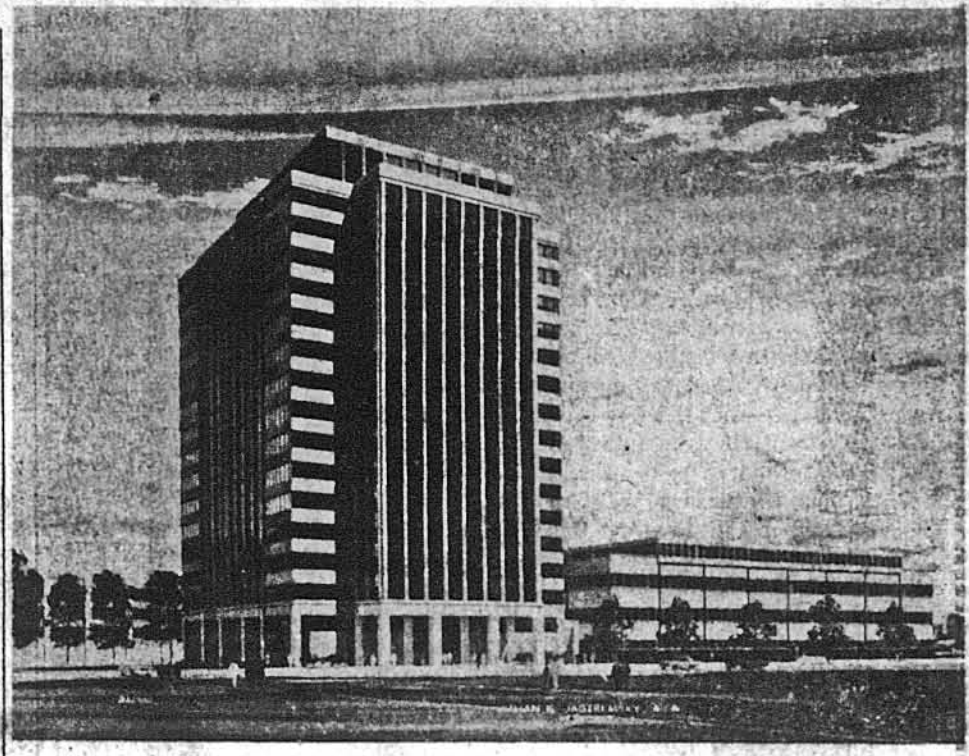

UCCA Condemns Extradition Of Lithuanian Sailor

NEW YORK, N.Y. — The Executive Board of the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America (UCCA) strongly condemned U.S. Coast Guard officials who handed over the Lithuanian defector, Simas Gruzde, to his Soviet captors. Terming the act a "most disgraceful violation of our traditional policy of political sanctuary," the UCCA expressed its full support of an immediate investigation and bringing those responsible for this crime to account.

"STARSHI PLASTUNY" MEET IN EIGHTH CONGRESS

TORONTO, Ont. — The "Ulaf of Starshi Plastuny" held its eighth general congress last weekend at the Dutch Sisters Motor Inn, here in Metro.

The 143 Plast members, 61 "starshi plastunsky" and 32 "starshi plastunky," who journeyed here for the congress which is called every three years, adopted changes that most agreed would greatly streamline their future activity.

The assembled youths, a group made up predominately of Plast members from throughout the United States with a large contingent of Canadians, started their program of discussions and reports late in the afternoon Friday, November 27, and ended their congress on the following Sunday.

Catholic Studies Foundation Established in Washington

WASHINGTON, D.C. — A new foundation, known as the Ukrainian Catholic Studies Foundation, has been established in Washington, D.C., to research, present lectures and publish books on the future of the Ukrainian Catholic Church in America and in Ukraine, as well as the future of Ukraine as a nation.

The foundation is sponsored by Archbishop Ambrose Senyshyn, OSBM, Metropolitan for Ukrainian Catholics in the United States. It is located at St. Joseph's Ukrainian Catholic Seminary, 201 Taylor Street, N.E.

First Lecture

Archbishop Ambrose Senyshyn will lecture on, "Christianity in Soviet Ukraine," explaining why the Ukrainian Catholic Church is outlawed by the Kremlin and how it survives in secret. This first lecture will take place on December 11 at the Seminary.

Heads Board

Dr. Lev E. Dobriansky, chairman, is a professor at Georgetown University, President of the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America, Chairman of the National Captive Nations Committee and author of numerous books and articles on the Soviet Union including "The Vulnerable Russians." As chairman of the Ukrainian Catholic Studies Foundation, Dr. Dobriansky will endeavor to bring outstanding authorities to lecture to the seminarians and invited guests. The lectures will be published in book form for distribution to libraries.

Serving with Dr. Dobriansky are: Reverend Dr. Myroslav J. Lubachivsky, vice-chairman, Msgr. Dr. Basil Makuch, treasurer, Stephen J. Skubik, secretary, Michael Burda, Edward A. McCabe, Mrs. Judith Pretka, Michael Waris, Jr., and Mrs. Sophie Zadoretsky are board members and committee chairmen.

VALENTYN MOROZ SENTENCED TO NINE YEARS OF HARD LABOR

NEW YORK, N.Y. — Valentyn Moroz, the 34-year-old lecturer of modern history at Ivano-Frankivske Pedagogical Institute in Ukraine was sentenced to nine years of hard labor at a trial which concluded Friday, November 20, according to the Press Service of the Foreign Branch of the Ukrainian Supreme Liberation Council here.

Second Arrest

Moroz, who was arrested for the second time by the Soviet Secret Police last June, was accused of "anti-Soviet propaganda and agitation." He was said to have written articles exposing the regime's Russification policy and crass violations of human rights. He was accused of having authored the "Reportage from the Boris Confinement," describing the inhuman conditions of Soviet concentration camps, which was clandestinely circulated in Ukraine and eventually found its way abroad. The prosecution was unable to prove the charges, according to the press service information.

Protests Unheeded

Many Ukrainians in the free world had submitted petitions in behalf of Moroz to the UN Commission on Human Rights. As of this date, there is no evidence that the commission took any action in this case.

Moroz is married and the father of a son. His wife, also a teacher, is in danger of being expelled from her job.

Alexander Klymko, Noted Artist, Dies in Elizabeth

ELIZABETH, N.J. — Alexander Klymko, one of the leading Ukrainian artists and an illustrator of national renown, died here Friday, November 27, apparently of a heart failure. He was 64 years old.

An architect by profession, Mr. Klymko gained prominence early in his life for illustrations of Ukrainian magazines in Lviv and later in Buenos Aires, Argentina. Born in Western Ukraine in 1906, Mr. Klymko combined his training of an architect with his talent of a painter to design scenery and props for film studios in London, England, Buenos Aires, and New York. One of his famous pieces of work involved huge scenery designs at the New York World's Fair in 1963-4. He was also commissioned to design the sets for the movie version of "Hello Dolly," one
