UCCA BOARD MEETS IN FIRST POST-VACATION SESSION SERIES OF CURRENT PROBLEMS DISCUSSED AT MEETING

NEW YORK, N.Y. (UCCA Special). — On Friday, September 10, 1971 the Executive Board of the UCCA held its first post-vacation meeting in New York City, with 24 executive officers attending.

After the minutes of the previous meeting were read by UCCA secretary Ignatius M. Bilinskiy, the meeting proceeded with its 15-point agenda.

President's Report

At the outset of his report, Dr. Lev E. Dobriansky, UCCA President, stated that for the past seven weeks he was out of Washington. He spent three weeks in the Far East, namely, in Manila, where he attended the WACL annual conference, and in Saigon and Taipei, where he delivered lectures and gave press interviews. He also was on his U.S. Army summer assignment.

He contended that the WACL conference was under the impact of President Nixon's announcement of his forthcoming trip to Peking. Many Asian delegates were stunned by the announcement, but there was a cautious apprehension as to what the meeting with the Red Chinese leaders may bring.

In Taipei, where the new U.S. foreign policy most probably will be felt acutely, he found a cool and reserved attitude toward the United States.

On the other hand, he pointed out, Red Chinese influence is being felt strongly in Albania, Rumania and Yugoslavia, and the world can no longer look on Red China as an isolated country.

Dr. Dobriansky proposed a number of suggestions and plans which he urged the UCCA to implement. Among them were:

• The Ethnic Heritage Study Bill has all the chances to be passed by Congress, especially after it won the approval in the U.S. Senate. There is an urgent need for a "UCCA Task Force," which would prepare the Ukrainian

participation in the program, especially in various U.S. universities. The following members were elected to this task force: Prof. Edward Zarsky, John H. Roberts, Mrs. Stephanie Pushkar, Mykola Semanyshyn and Andriy Chornodolsky.

• The Chinese issue is important, and at present the UCCA should maintain its neutral course, keeping in mind that Red China has been attacking the USSR for its oppression of Ukraine and other captive nations;

• Preparations should begin for the XIth Congress of Americans of Ukrainian Descent, to be held in October of 1972. Toward that end he urged the "streamlining of the

UCCA," a better political activity on the local levels; publications of two to three books on Ukraine, where the plight of the Ukrainian people could be encompassed with the current world problems.

He concluded that the UCCA work must go on regardless of what the international situation may appear, for the final liberation of Ukraine is paramount to world freedom.

Church Affairs

UCCA Executive Vice-President Joseph Lesawyer, who also chaired the meeting, reported that the UCCA Com-

SET "DAY OF AUTONOMY" ON CARDINAL JOSYF'S BIRTHDAY

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. — The "Day of Autonomy of the Ukrainian Catholic Church" was set for Sunday, February 20, 1972, by Archbishop-Metropolitan Ambrose Senyshyn, a date that coincides with the 80th birthday of Archbishop-Major Josyf Cardinal Slipyi.

The Metropolitan made his announcement at the combined deanery conference ("Soborochyk") held Wednesday, August 25, in Warrington, Pa. In addition to Metropolitan Ambrose and Auxiliary Bishops John Stock and Basil Losten, forty Ukrainian Catholic priests from the Philadelphia, Reading, Washington, Jersey City and Trenton deaneries took part in the conference.

Papers

Presenting special papers at the conference were: Very Rev. Athanasius Pekar, OSBM, on "Permanent Diaconate"; Very Rev. Msgr. Victor Popishil, LL.D., "Canon Law and the Ukrainian Catholic Church"; Rev. Ronald Popivchak, "A Study of Celibacy" which was the theme of the priest's doctoral dissertation. Acting as moderator was Very Rev. Msgr. Myroslaw Charyna.

During the luncheon break, Msgr. Charyna extended to Metropolitan Ambrose best wishes on the occasion of his

double anniversary: tenth as Metropolitan and 40th as priest. Other clergy joined in a joyous "Mnohaya Lita."

The Metropolitan then made his announcement of the "Day of Autonomy," which, according to The Way Ukrainian Catholic weekly, contained the following passages:

"Soon ten years will have elapsed since the Ukrainian Catholic Church and the Ukrainian population in the free world observed in 1962 the 70th birthday of the Confessor-Captive Josyf Slipyi, Archbishop of Lviv and Metropolitan of Halych. On that occasion the Ukrainian Catholic Hierarchy in the free world published a memorial pastoral letter. Our Archdiocese prepared and distributed the brochure "Shepherd in Chains," with an appropriate covering letter throughout the entire world, informing all bishops and the press about the captivity and the persecution of Ukrainian Catholic bishops, headed by Metropolitan Josyf. Prayers and the Divine Liturgy were asked to be offered for the intention of our Confessor and our Church with him at its head.

"God's Providence saw fit to answer our prayers, for in the very next year Metropolitan Josyf was released by the Soviet authorities through (Continued on p. 3)

Parish Honors Fr. S. Chomko

BOSTON, Mass. — Fr. Stephen Chomko, 48-year-old pastor of the Ukrainian Catholic Church of Christ the King in Jamaica Plain, Mass., will celebrate a Divine Liturgy of thanksgiving tomorrow, September 19, at 3 p.m. as part of the day-long festivities staged by the parish in honor of the pastor's 25th anniversary of ordination.

Fr. Chomko was born in Scranton, Pa., on January 6, 1923, the son of Andrew and Anna nee Lewkowicz. He was ordained into priesthood on July 12, 1946, by the late Archbishop, Constantine Bohachevsky.

Since that time he served in Ukrainian parishes in Hamtramck, Mich., St. Joseph, Mo., Syracuse, Auburn, Rochester, N.Y., New Haven, Conn., and now in Jamaica Plain. He built churches, schools and auditoriums in several parishes and succeeded in gathering the Ukrainian Catholic faithful of various cities around their church.

He succeeded in joining the parishes of St. George and Sacred Heart here by forming the much larger parish of Christ the King. Construction of a modern Ukrainian Church was started last February on a tract of ten acres. The edifice, which will accommodate more than 400 faithful, should be completed this November.

WINNIPEG, Man.—Prime Minister Pierre E. Trudeau, who last June had aroused the ire of the Ukrainian Canadian community by his comparison of Ukrainian dissidents to FLQ terrorists, has accepted the invitation to address the tenth Congress of Ukrainian Canadians scheduled to be held in Winnipeg, Man., October 8-11, 1971.

Awareness Reflected

Premier Trudeau confirmed his attendance in a letter to Msgr. Dr. Basil Kushnir, current president of the Ukrainian Canadian Committee.

The UCC said that the presence of Premier Trudeau at this congress reflects the Federal Government's awareness of the diverse contributions of Ukrainian Canadians to the progress and well-being of Canada and their aspirations as a well-organized ethnic community.

Speakers

In addition to business sessions on Saturday, which dealt with the assessment of TUSM activity over the past twelve months and plans for the new term, the meeting heard two principal speeches, by Askold Skalsky, "Discrimination of Ukrainians in America," and by Roman Senkiw, which dealt with the activity and direction of TUSM.

Representatives of various Ukrainian organizations greeted the delegates assembled for what was the fourth national conference. Written messages were also received from Ukrainian organizations in the U.S., Canada, Europe, Argentina and Australia.

UNA LAUNCHES FALL MEMBERSHIP DRIVE 3,000 NEW MEMBERS SOUGHT BY YEAR'S END

JERSEY CITY, N.J.—The series of organizing meetings on the district level, designed to accelerate the Ukrainian National Association's fall membership drive, was launched Friday, September 10, in Jersey City, N.J., the site of Soyuz headquarters.

The drive, which extends to all centers of UNA activity in the U.S. and Canada, is designed to bring in a total of 3,000 new members by the end of the year. A goal of 6 million dollars worth of life insurance is sought as part of the new membership drive.

The Association's supreme officers as well as regional organizers are attending the district meetings in an effort to stimulate the UNA activity, report on the present status of Soyuz and offer suggestions on the methods of organization. The meetings will continue through October. Preceding each formal session is a two-hour-brush-up course for branch organizers.

New York District

Plans to invigorate the organizing and fraternal activity of the New York District were the main topic of discussions at the committee's meeting, held at the "Dnister" Branch 361 headquarters in New York Friday, September 10.

Among several resolutions adopted at the meeting was a proposal by Bohdan Lastoweky to call a special meeting of branch presidents as soon as possible to engage them and other branch officers in the fall membership drive.

Chaired by Atty. John O. Flis, the committee's chairman, the meeting heard supreme officers, Dr. J. Padoch, Secretary, and Mrs. Mary Dushnyck, Vice-President, discuss some of the ways of adding impetus to the current campaign. Evaluating the organizing status and activity of the District's individual branches was UNA regional organizer Wasyli Orichowsky.

Dr. Padoch, in addition to enumerating a series of organizing methods, pointed to such fraternal activity as UNA days as being conducive to establishing better rapport between members and non-members. He said that branch officers and convention delegates must be

come more active in the membership drive. The Secretary's proposal that a series of brush-up courses for organizers be held every Thursday beginning at 7 p.m. for a period of four to six weeks was adopted by those present at the meeting.

Mrs. Dushnyck, who also stressed the need for organizer courses, noted that three special awards have been instituted for the year's top organizers, in addition to bonuses which the districts can earn by exceeding their designated quotas. She also spoke of the UNA women's committee's efforts to erect a statue of Lesia Ukrainka at Soyuzivka.

Mr. Orichowsky, in evaluating branch activity, announced quotas of new members to be organized by each individual branch of the District.

Hudson County District

Accent on membership was the theme of the meeting held Friday, August 10, at the Ukrainian Community Center in Jersey City, which saw representatives of seven Branches of the Hudson County District discuss the fall drive.

Chaired by Myron Sirvi of Bayonne, N.J., the committee's chairman with Dmytro

Dydyk serving as secretary, the meeting heard Supreme Vice-President and Recording Secretary Walter Sochan outline the basic objectives of Soyuz, stressing the fact that membership is the essential life-line of all UNA activity.

Mr. Sochan, in presenting a series of suggestions on membership organization, urged branch officers to devise plans and follow-up methodically in seeking out new prospects.

FIRST IN CANADA

Joseph Romaniw is Named Air Force General

SASKATOON, Sask.—Col. Joseph Romaniw, the son of Ukrainian immigrants to Canada, became the first Canadian of Ukrainian ancestry to be promoted to the rank of Brigadier General in the Canadian Air Force.

Gen. Romaniw, 50, is married and the father of four children. A member of the Canadian Air Force since 1939 when he volunteered as an 18-year-old student at Saskatchewan University, Gen. Romaniw was stationed in England during World War II.

He returned to Canada after the war, completed his studies with a Bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering and chose air force as a career. He was subsequently sent to England by the Canadian Air Force where he continued his studies and earned a Master's degree in aviation

and rocketry. He served as a liaison officer between the Canadian and American governments for the northern air defense lines.

The son of Dmytro and Maria Romaniw, who came to Canada in 1912, Gen. Romaniw was brought up in a Ukrainian atmosphere and has retained great interest in Canada's Ukrainian community. While in England, he frequently attended Ukrainian functions and helped many Ukrainians in the post-war Europe.

His sisters, Mrs. Anna Zeleny and Mrs. Stephanie Wovk, are both active in various Ukrainian organizations in Canada. His brother Walter is dean of the School of Communications at Windsor University. His younger brother Myroslaw is a major in the Canadian Air Force.

Soyuzivka Picks New "Miss" Tonight

MET OPERA STAR IVANKA MYHAL, "LYMAN" DANCERS TO PERFORM IN PAGEANT

KERHONKSON, N.Y. — A new Miss Soyuzivka will don the crown that Zirka Hloba has proudly worn for a year as the annual pageant comes to a climax tonight at the UNA resort.

Held within the framework of the traditional UNA Day here, the Miss Soyuzivka contest has evolved over the years into one of the biggest social events of the season. Inaugurated on a modest scale in 1956, the contest usually attracts a dozen beauties vying for the title and crowds in excess of 3,000 who come from near and far for the weekend replete with all sorts of convivial, social and sports activities.

Miss Hloba, the star of the Soyuzivka dancing ensemble the last two seasons, was chosen last year from among eleven contestants by a panel of judges which included the famed Ukrainian actor Mike Mazurki.

All May Run

Unlike last two years, when the queen and two runners-up were selected from

among the young ladies chosen as Misses Soyuzivka of the Week during the summer weekends, this year the contest reverts to its previous format, with all young ladies — providing they are over 17 years of age and members of the UNA — allowed to compete for the title and all that goes with it.

In the course of her year's reign, Miss Soyuzivka acts in a representative capacity at various UNA functions. She also receives a week's

vacation at the popular UNA resort.

The contestants are judged on appearance, personality, poise and participation in Ukrainian community life. The panel of judges, whose composition is not revealed until after the contest, interviews briefly each of the individual aspirants.

As in previous years, a concert program precedes the judging and the contestants are introduced to the public.

Tonight's concert program features Metropolitan Opera mezzo-soprano Ivanka Myhal, one of the brightest Ukrainian stars to appear in recent years on the international scene.

Born in Lviv and raised in Canada, Miss Myhal is a graduate of the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto. She studied voice and interpretation with Mme. Jennie Tourel, and toured the U.S. and Canada with the Metropolitan Opera Studio in 1969. She has appeared as a soloist with symphonic orchestras in (Continued on p. 3)

Rudnytsky "Artist-in-Residence" At Cincinnati Conservatory

CINCINNATI, O.—Roman Rudnytsky, the internationally renowned pianist, was recently named faculty member and "artist-in-residence" by the University of Cincinnati College Conservatory of Music according to an announcement made here last week.

Unique

The title of "artist-in-residence" is a unique one, bestowed on a faculty member who is an exemplary artist-virtuoso. Mr. Rudnytsky will take up his new duties at the end of this month.

A graduate of the Juilliard School of Music in New York where he received his bachelor of science and master of arts degrees, he was a scholarship student of Rosina Lhevinne. Rudnytsky has also studied with Wilhelm Kempff in his Beethoven Master course at Positano, Italy, with Friedrich Wührer at the Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria, and prepared for the doctorate with Leon Fleisher at the Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore.

He gave his first piano and violin recital at the age of seven and has played continuously since in the U.S., Canada, and Europe, including a 1966 concert tour in Soviet Ukraine, and a recital on Chopin's piano in Valdemossa, Majorca. He has received the golden keys to the cities of Omaha and Detroit on the occasion of his recitals there.

Most recently, he completed his sixth concert tour of Europe.

Prior to his tour Rudnytsky completed the recording of Ernst Gould's "Symphony for Piano and Four Instruments" in Los Angeles on a commission of the Ford Foundation.

The youngest faculty member of the Indiana University of Music since he joined the school in 1965, Rudnytsky's appearances with orchestras have included the Washington National Symphony, the Detroit Symphony, the Toronto Symphony, Miami Symphony, the Mozarteum Chamberata Academica Orchestra

in Salzburg, Austria, and the "Haydn Orchestra" of Bolzano, Italy, in addition to recitals at New York's prestigious Carnegie Hall and Town Hall.

Born in New York, Roman Rudnytsky is the son of Dr. and Mrs. Antin Rudnytsky. His father, a former pupil of Petri and Schnabel in piano, and Schreker and Busoni in composition, is well established in the music world as a conductor-composer-pianist. His mother, the former Maria Sokil, is the distinguished opera singer.

Roman's younger brother, Dorian Rudnytsky, also a Juilliard graduate, is a member of the New Rock Ensemble which recently appeared in the movie "Zacharia."

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Danko, Stine to Run In Jersey City Election

JERSEY CITY, N.J. — As a result of the recent conviction of the mayor of Jersey City, N.J. along with six other city council and Hudson County figures, the posts of Mayor and Councilman-at-Large in Jersey City will be up for election this coming November 2nd.

The Ukrainian Democratic Organization of Hudson County, N.J., recently met and chose two of its officers, secretary Alexander F. Danko, to run for Mayor of Jersey City, while vice-president Stanley Stine was picked to run for Councilman-at-Large.

Activist

Alexander Danko, a political neophyte who has never run for office, before has always been a keen student of political science and has long been a Ukrainian activist, going back to the 1930's when he participated as a youngster with his parents and brother Walter in protest marches against the Russian Communist starvation program in Ukraine and the Polish government's repressive policies in Western Ukraine through the Khrushchev shambles in the U.N. in 1960 and the recent Russian in carceration of Ukrainian intellectuals.

Since the passing of his brother Walter exactly 17 years ago, Mr. Danko has written on political action history, culture, civic affairs and sports (including the annual All-Ukrainian College Football and Basketball Teams) for a number of Ukrainian publications in the U.S. and Canada. He also contributes material for American publications.

Al Danko had participated in football, baseball, swimming and track while in high school, where he graduated at the age of 15, and was an undefeated amateur boxer winning a Golden Gloves and three service titles while in the U.S. Army, serving for three years including the European theatre of operations during World War II.

Mr. Danko, who has Bachelor's and Master's degrees in accounting, economics, finance and business administration, is a Wall Street investment securities analyst and stockbroker with growing real estate interests. He continues to be active in Ukrainian affairs. At present, he is a board of director member of the Jersey City Ukrainian Community Center, where he is the chairman of the finance and constitution

committees, and is an adviser for youth activities in numerous cities in New Jersey.

Solid Record

Mr. Danko is a past president of the Ukrainian National Home, Ukrainian Sporting Club and St. Sophia Ukrainian Youth Club, all of Bayonne, the New Jersey Ukrainian Basketball League, and the Ukrainian Youth League of North America (at which time UYL-NA reached its highest financial peak in its 38-year history). He also served as district organizer, publicity director, sports director, adviser and editor of Trend and Trendette, for a total of 10 years on the UYL-NA executive board, and was active in the UYL-New Jersey. He was financial secretary on the first youth board of officers of the St. Sophia Ukrainian Orthodox Church of Bayonne after the church burned its mortgage after only 10 years in existence, and was historian of the Ukrainian American Veterans. He belongs to the UNA, UWA, and UNAA.

Along with two close friends Messrs. Walter Bradnar and Joseph Yaworsky, Mr. Danko has travelled the length and breadth of the Ukrainian community in the USA and Canada on a social basis and for Ukrainian functions, and has appeared on numerous radio programs to publicize Ukrainian aspirations for freedom.

Human Dynamo

Mr. Stanley (Stanislavshyn) Stine, whose parents came from the same village, Hryhoriv in Rohatyn, Western Ukraine, as Mr. Danko's mother, is a graduate of Dickinson High School and St. Peter's Institute of Industrial Relations in Jersey City.

Stanley, who is better known as "Sparky" as he does resemble a human dynamo in action when the time is opportune, has had a taste of politics when he served as an aide to J.C. Mayor Charles Witkowski some dozen years ago and backed several other candidates for city and state office. He was instrumental for obtaining a fine school basketball court gratis for the N.J. Ukrainian Basketball League, which had 10 cities represented for three years.

Mr. Stine, who works for the Colgate-Palmolive Co. printing department in Jersey City, has also been active
