### UNA SUPREME ASSEMBLY ADOPTS \$5.5 MILLION BUDGET, AWARDS \$10,000 IN SCHOLARSHIPS, VOTES \$15,000 FOR NATIONAL CAUSES

#### Permanent Synod Scheduled to Meet in Rome



PHILADELPHIA, Pa. — The Permanent Synod of the Ukrainian Catholic Church, the body created last year and headed by Archbishop-Major Josyf Cardinal Slipyj, is scheduled to open its deliberations Sunday, June 4, in Rome, Italy, according to an announcement made by Auxiliary Bishop Basil H. Losten, head of the Philadelphia Archeparchy's information bureau.

The five-member Synod was formed at the Fifth Archepiscopal Synod, held October 31 through November 5, 1971, in Rome. Comprising the ruling body of the Ukrainian Catholic Church, in addition to Cardinal Josyf, its life-time head, are also: Archbishop Ivan Buchko, Archbishop Ambrose Senyshyn, Metropolitan of the Ukrainian Catholic Church in the USA, Archbishop Maxim Hermaniuk, Metropolitan of the Ukrainian Catholic Church in Canada, and Bishop Andrew Sapelak, Eparch of the Ukrainian Catholic Church in Argentina. All are expected to take part in the deliberations, said the announcement.

#### Windsor University to Start Two Courses in Ukrainian

WINDSOR, Ont. — Two courses in Ukrainian studies will be introduced next September by the University of Windsor, with the possibility that the program will be expanded to include a minor in Ukrainian.

#### PRESIDENT NIXON SEES ST. SOPHIA, TOMB IN ONE-DAY KIEV STOP

KIEV, Ukraine. — President Richard M. Nixon attended a banquet, placed a wreath at the Ukrainian Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, and toured the famous St. Sophia Cathedral during his overnight stop in Kiev Monday-Tuesday, May 29-30, in what was the first visit ever by an American President to Ukraine.

#### Entourage

An identical back-up plane was wheeled out and took the President to Kiev where he was greeted at the Borispol airport by an entourage of officials of the Ukrainian SSR, led by Aleksandr P. Lashko, head of the Republic's Supreme Soviet. Some 300 persons were on hand at the airport, said UPI and AP reports.

Unknown Soldier, while Mrs. Nixon was entertained by folk dancing children at the Pioneer Palace. The President, his wife, and his entourage were then taken for a tour of the 900-year-old Cathedral of St. Sophia. They left Kiev Tuesday in the Presidential jet "Spirit of 76" on the four-hour flight to Tehran, Iran.

Except for the banquet, the major American TV networks showed brief excerpts of the Presidential party's stay in Kiev on their Tuesday night newscasts.

The stop-over in Kiev ranged from "toned down" to "curiously muted," although dispatches stressed the fact that there were large crowds lining the streets from the airport to the center of the city, waving American and Soviet flags. The crowds, said the commentators, had waited in the streets despite the President's late arrival and despite cold, gusty winds.

The President and Mrs. Nixon were hosted at a five-course banquet at the Marinsky Palace the same night. Mr. Nixon is reported to have raised one of the crystal goblets by his place and saluted Kiev's history, said a UPI dispatch. — a record of invasions and destruction by armies of Mongols, Norsemen, competing princes, tsars and Nazi Germans.

"It is very appropriate," he is quoted by the UPI as having said, "that on the last night of our visit we should be here in this mother of all Russian cities, here in the Ukraine, among a people who are so strong."

#### Prof. Stephen Timoshenko, World Renowned Scientist, Dies

WUPPERTAL, W. Germany. — Prof. Stephen Timoshenko, Ukrainian born engineer and scientist of international renown, died Monday, May 29, in Wuppertal, West Germany, where he lived in retirement since 1944. He was 94 years old.

Many Works  
A Professor-Emeritus of Stanford University in California, where he taught theoretical and applied mechanics, Dr. Timoshenko distinguished himself as a scientist and author of many books and articles on elasticity of materials, mechanical engineering and applied mechanics. An award in his name was established in 1957 by the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.

Highest Awards  
Born in 1878 in the village Shtovivka, Konotop area, Dr. Timoshenko completed his studies in engineering at Petersburg University and was a professor of engineering there and in Kiev until the Bolshevik takeover of Ukraine. He was a founding member of the Ukrainian Academy of Sciences in 1918. He came to the United States in 1922 and was a research engineer with the Westinghouse Co. in Pittsburgh before joining the faculty of Michigan University in 1927

#### Annual Meeting Concludes With Resolutions, Recommendations

KERHONKSON, N.Y. — The Supreme Assembly of the Ukrainian National Association, which met at Soyuzivka last week in its annual session, elected Mrs. Ulana Diachuk Supreme Treasurer, as reported last week, voted \$15,000 in contributions for national causes and awarded \$10,000 in scholarships to 34 needy students.

The Supreme Assembly chose Philadelphia as the prime site of UNA's 28th Regular Convention to be held in 1974. If no appropriate site for the large, week-long assemblage can be found in the City of Brotherly Love, the convention will be held in New York.

The meeting of the 26-member Assembly, the Association's highest governing body, had commenced Monday, May 22, and concluded Friday, May 26. In addition to the fiscal appropriations, the Supreme Assembly adopted a series of resolutions and recommendations for the well-being of the organization and its membership. This filled out the agenda of the last day's session.

The week-long meeting included reports of all the officers, as well as Svoboda Editor-in-Chief Anthony Dragan and Soyuzivka manager Walter Kwas, discussion of plans for the future, meetings of separate committees, and adoption of resolutions and recommendations.

Discussed at length during the plenary session Thursday afternoon, May 25, was the construction of the 15-story UNA skyscraper being built in Jersey City. Reports on various aspects of the con-

struction were presented by the architects, Julian K. Jas-tremsky and Apollinaire Osadca, and engineers Roman Wolchuk and Roman Halibey.

Separate committees also met on Thursday and prepared a series of recommendations which were discussed and dealt with at Friday's plenary session. The scholarship committee, which reviews applications of students and recommends candidates for awards to the Supreme Assembly, met Sunday, May 21, on the eve of the Assembly's annual session.

The traditional dinner for officers and guests was held Thursday night. The assembled honored Mrs. Ulana Diachuk, the newly elected Treasurer of the Association, and President Joseph Lesawyer who was celebrating his 61st birthday.

On Friday, reports of the committees were given as follows: press and public relations, Prof. John Teluk, Supreme Vice-President, and Mr. Dragan; women's affairs, Mrs. Mary Dushnyck, Supreme Vice-President; youth affairs, Supreme Advisor Bohdan Futej; sports, Mrs. Dushnyck; Canadian affairs, Sen. Paul Yuzyk, Vice-President for Canada, and Supreme Advisor Wasyly Didiuk; finances, Ivan Wynnuk, Supreme Auditor, who proposed a budget anticipating \$5,585,000 in income and \$4,878,950 in disbursements, and an appropriation of \$15,000 for charitable, educational, cultural and other national causes; organization, Dr. Dr. Ivan Skalczuk, Supreme Auditor; scholarships, Dr. (Continued on p. 3)

In accordance with the express desire to involve more young people in the Committee's activities, the meeting elected three students to the Board of Directors — W. Lupan, I. Bereznycky and L. Iwaskiw — and recommended that Zoia Hraur-Korsun and Ihor Chenstuch also join the Board after their membership in the organization is approved.

The auditing board, elected for the first time as a separate body and not from among the members of the Board, consists of I. Kedryn-Rudnytsky, Prof. P. Stercho, I. Skira, Dr. J. Padoch and Mrs. U. Diachuk.

Named UUAARC's honorary members are: Yurij Lesiuk, who has contributed a total of \$30,560 to the UUAARC, Mrs. Katherine Peleshok and Roman Slobodian.

Among more significant changes in the by-laws are: general meetings will be held every three years in the month of April, the Board of Directors will meet once a year in February, the auditing board will review the books and operations once a year, and the number of directors on the board should not be less than 17 and not more than 32.

Attending the meeting were 48 delegates representing 32 organizations. According to reports presented by the officers, a total of \$56,110.32 was deposited (Continued on p. 2)

#### HUMAN RIGHTS COMMISSION READIES DOCUMENTATION

NEW YORK, N.Y. — Documentary evidence and material relating to the recent arrests of Ukrainian intellectuals in Ukraine is being compiled now for use in defense action by the special committee headed by the Hon. John G. Diefenbaker, former Prime Minister of Canada.

Various aspects of the defense action were discussed at a meeting of the Human Rights Commission of the Secretariat of the World Congress of Free Ukrainians, headed by Sen. Paul Yuzyk of Canada. The meeting was

held Monday, May 22.

The Human Rights Commission was reorganized at the last plenary session of the World Congress Secretariat, held last January. In accordance with the rotational system, the seat of the Secretariat was transferred to Europe for the remaining two years of the six-year term.

The Human Rights Commission is maintaining its headquarters in New York. In addition to Sen. Yuzyk, other members of the Commission are: Joseph Lesawyer, vice-chairman, Dr. Mi-
