XIth Congress of Americans of Ukrainian Descent Meets in New York

PROF. CLARENCE MANNING, 79, DIES

PROMINENT SLAVICIST WAS AUTHOR OF MANY BOOKS ON UKRAINE PLEASANTVILLE, N.Y. — Prof. Clarence Augustus Manning, outstanding American Slavist, a crusading scholar, translator and publicist who authored major books on Ukraine in the English language and was a contributor to The Ukrainian Weekly for 37 years, died Wednesday, October 4, 1972, at his residence here after a long illness. He was 79 years old.

He was a professor emeritus in Slavic Studies of Columbia University, where he had studied and taught for three decades, a member of major American scholarly societies, a member of the Shevchenko Scientific Society and holder of honorary doctorate from the Ukrainian Free University.

His first contribution to the study of Ukrainian literature was a translation of the preface of Shevchenko's "Haydamaky" in 1929. Beginning in 1938, Prof. Manning published a series of books and monographs on Ukraine: "Ivan Franko," "Ukrainian Literature" (1944, and reprinted in 1971), "Taras Shevchenko: Selected Poems" (1945), "The History of Ukraine" (1947), "Outline of

work published by the University of Toronto Press and financed by the UNA. Most of Prof. Manning's English language works were published and financed by the UNA and the Svboda Press.

Associated with The Ukrainian Weekly since its inception in 1933, Prof. Manning was a permanent weekly contributor of articles and commentaries on Ukrainian developments and events related to Ukraine and its people. He also published scores of articles and reviews for The Ukrainian Quarterly, and continued writing until his recent illness.

St. Louis UNA's Host President On His First Visit

ST. LOUIS, Mo. — Officers of UNA Branches 179 and 373 in St. Louis, Mo., and those of Branches 284 and 308 in East St. Louis, Ill., were joined by over 60 guests at a meeting-banquet Saturday, September 30, here, attended by UNA President Joseph Lesawyer, the first such visit by the organization's president to this Ukrainian community in the Midwest.

Mr. Lesawyer, who made the stopover here on his way to the National Fraternal Congress annual session in Dallas, extended greetings to the assemblage from the Supreme Executive Committee, pointing out that the St. Louis Ukrainian community is an integral part of the UNA family in the U.S. and Canada, which is preserving and expanding Ukrainian culture and heritage and thus contributing to the general welfare of these countries.

Challenged School

A non-conformist for his times, Prof. Manning challenged the pro-Russian school of historiography in this country and persisted in a crusading spirit to publish scholarly works that eventually opened the field of study to other Slavic peoples. He published a series of thought-provoking articles and books on the history and literature of Ukraine, as well as studies on the history of Bulgarians, Czechs, Slovaks, Poles, Byelorussians, Serbs, Croats and Slovenes.

APPEAL OF THE UKRAINIAN CONGRESS COMMITTEE OF AMERICA

From October 6 through October 8, 1972, an important event will take place in the life of the Ukrainian American community. During these days the XIth Congress of Americans of Ukrainian Descent will be held in New York City, at which questions of vital significance will be discussed and resolved, determining the future course of our community life in this country.

We are living in complex and rapidly changing times. Before our very eyes events are taking place that change the fate of peoples. The inter-relationship of forces in the world is also undergoing substantial changes, but the struggle for the ideals of truth, justice, national liberty and individual freedom goes on.

Our people in their native land, captives of Communist Russian imperialism, play a special role in this struggle. The fifty years of enslavement by the Soviet regime were marked by physical destruction of millions of Ukrainian peasants, workers and intelligentsia, who perished in concentration camps and during the man-made famine in the 1930's, and in the war years. During World War II our people rose to fight for the right to their own independent life by organizing their own armed forces — the Ukrainian Insurgent Army.

At the present time the terror by the alien occupying power in our native land continues unabated. We all know of the ruthless persecution of Ukrainian patriots in Ukraine, the arrests and severe sentences, and the implacable Russification of the Ukrainian population by Communist Russia. We are deeply disturbed over the fate of our kin in Ukraine. We cannot remain impartial onlookers as the enemy endeavors to destroy our own people and the country of our and our fathers' origin, and transform it into a colony of Russia. We want to help our suffering people to the best of our ability.

Our attention must also be directed to problems which confront us here in this country. Our community in the United States, due to circumstances beyond our control, is facing many dangers, among them the threat of losing our national identity through assimilation. This is closely connected with our concern for our children and youth. We all wish they become good citizens of this country, but that they also retain pride in their heritage and always keep in mind the welfare of the country of their forefathers.

We must think of improving the education of our growing generations in our own schools and of bringing the youth into the fold of Ukrainian cultural, social and political life. No less important in our deliberations is the question of the proper development and growth of our church and religious life. We must realize the fact that our Churches are and will remain in the future a factor which will ensure our tomorrow. Therefore, we are deeply interested in the well-being of our Churches. We want to see the Ukrainian Autocephalous Orthodox Church attain its full unity in a Sobor of Bishops of the Ukrainian Autocephalous Orthodox Church; the Ukrainian Catholic Church find its structural completion in the patriarchal system headed by a patriarch; and we wish that all our Protestant communities be in an active, organizational unity.

We also have clearly defined duties with respect to the country in which we live. In 1976 the United States will mark the 200th anniversary of its Independence. It is a great event, and we, as full-fledged citizens of this country who contributed untold labor and sweat, should join other fellow Americans in the observances of this signal event. On this occasion we must manifest to all fellow citizens our contributions to the development of this country and to demonstrate that we are worthy co-partners in the process of building America. There should not be a single Ukrainian community in the United States that does not take part in the observance of the Bicentennial of American Independence. All these questions and issues should be before the eyes of our XIth Congress, so that participants may submit constructive proposals which will strengthen our community and chart a course that will contribute to our well-being in the future — for the benefit of Ukraine and of the United States of America.

Edward Bobyn Is Director Of Research Establishment

VALCARTIER, Que.—Edward J. Bobyn, a 51-year-old Canadian of Ukrainian descent, has been serving as Director-General of Canada's Defense Research Establishment in Valcartier, Que., a post to which he was appointed in 1968.

Mr. Bobyn was born in Krydor, Sask., in 1921, of Ukrainian parentage. Following matriculation, he attended the University of Saskatchewan and obtained a B.Sc. in Engineering Physics in 1944.

During the summer of 1943, he volunteered for service with the Royal Canadian Signal Corps as a lieutenant and two years later was posted to the Canadian Armament Research and Development Establishment (CARDE) at Valcartier, Que., then a Canadian Army Station...

In August 1960, he was posted on loan to the SHAPE Air Defense Technical Center in Holland, where he was appointed chief of systems research. On his return to Canada in October 1963, he was named director of Systems Evaluation, RCAF in Ottawa...

Mr. Bobyn is married to Helen Bubniuk of Saskatoon and they have six children, three boys and three girls, ranging in age from 23 to 5.

Mr. Bobyn is a Fellow of the Canadian Aeronautical and Space Institute, member of the Engineering Institute of Canada, member of Sigma Xi Society and a recipient of the Centennial Medal.

Lehigh-Valley, Philadelphia UNA Districts Meet

JERSEY CITY, N.J. — Supreme, district and branch officers of the Ukrainian National Association met over the past two weekends in Northampton, Pa., and Philadelphia in two of a series of some thirty such parleys being held in September and October in centers of UNA activity to discuss the current status of the organization and to invigorate the Fall membership drive.

Twenty-five branch officers of UNA's Lehigh-Valley District, which comprises 12 Branches with approximately 1,500 members, took part in the meeting Saturday, September 23, at St. John the Baptist Ukrainian Catholic Church hall, which was preceded by a condensed course for secretaries conducted by UNA Supreme President Joseph Lesawyer and assistant to the head of the Organizing Department Stepan Hawrysz.

Both Mr. Lesawyer and Mr. Hawrysz imparted suggestions on organizing methods and, utilizing available literature, elaborated on various UNA policies and attendant benefits. After their presentations, the officers replied to a series of technical questions posed.

The subsequent meeting, opened and chaired by Supreme Advisor and District Chairman Anna Haras, heard Mr. Lesawyer assess the current status of the UNA and its role in the life of the Ukrainian community. The UNA president also discussed the current situation in Ukraine, focusing attention on the plight of Ukrainian intellectuals who are being arrested and incarcerated in Soviet concentration camps for their courageous stand against oppression and Russification.

Mr. Hawrysz, in analyzing the membership drive, said that as of August, the District had organized 73 new members of the 150 total designated for the year. He said that Mrs. Haras, now top woman organizer in the UNA, had herself brought in 45 of the 73 total. He also noted other secretaries, namely, John Hutzayluk, Stepan Iwaschko, Stepan Kolodrub, Martin Sheshka, and others who are intensely active in the current membership campaign.

Attesting to the District's determination to meet and possibly exceed its quota of new members, Mrs. Haras presented Mr. Lesawyer with 9 new applications for a total of \$15,000 worth of insurance. In the spirit of true fraternalism, Mrs. Anne Sagan, president of UNA Branch 147 in Allentown, presented a check for \$1,000 to the UNA president as a contribution of her branch and other organizations towards the UNA Flood Relief Fund. In thanking Mrs. Sagan, Mr. Lesawyer stressed the need for more assistance to the victims of the floods in Wilkes-Barre, Pa., and Elmira, N.Y.

PHILADELPHIA

Forty-five representatives of Philadelphia District Branches, as well as Chester, Bristol and Trenton, took part in an organizing meeting Sunday, October 1, at the Ukrainian Youth Home in Philadelphia. Opened by Mr. Hawrysz, the District Committee's chairman, the meeting heard UNA Supreme Vice-President and Recording Secretary Walter Sochan and Supreme Auditor Dr. Iwan Skalzuk deliver the principal addresses on the current status of Soyuz, its membership campaign and various phases of its activity.

PITTSBURGH BANQUET NETS \$4,000 FOR HARVARD ENDOWMENT

PITTSBURGH, Pa. — A total of \$4,169 was raised in one evening here for the Ukrainian Studies Chair Fund, upping Pittsburgh area contributions to over \$30,000 for this national project. More than 300 persons attended the fund-raising banquet here Sunday, September 24, held at St. George's Ukrainian Catholic Church hall on the initiative of the parish, its pastor, the Rev. William Dzydzora, and the parish council, headed by Michael Fedora, Jr.

Pittsburgh area were given by local USCF activists Dr. George Kyschakewych, chairman of the local committee, Michael Korchynsky, and Mr. and Mrs. Michael Komichak. In addition to the over \$30,000 raised thus far, the committee has pledged \$25,000 more by year's end. The network of Pittsburgh area activists includes individual volunteers in Pittsburgh-North, Pittsburgh-South, Ambridge, McKees Rocks, Carnegie, Aliquippa, Arnold and Monessen. Contributing substantially to the campaign's success is its constant popularization over the local Ukrainian radio program directed by Mr. Komichak.

Parish Contributes

The net proceeds from the banquet and donations amounted to \$3,169, while the parish council contributed \$1,000 to the USCF towards the endowment of the third chair of Ukrainian studies at Harvard. Among major donors in the course of the evening was Allegheny County Commissioner Thomas Forester who contributed \$100. The principal speaker at the banquet was Dr. Roman Szporluk, associate professor of history at Michigan University, who last summer taught a course in modern Ukrainian history as part of the summer program in Ukrainian studies at Harvard.

Up to date reports on the fund-raising drive in the that 13 new membership applications were just submitted by the following branches: 6 by Branch 245; 3 each by Branches 83 and 362; and one by Branch 375. He also reminded that next year the District will be marking its 35th anniversary and said that appropriate observances are being planned.

Mr. Sochan described UNA's multi-faceted activity both as a fraternal benefit society and as the largest Ukrainian organization in the free world. The Vice-President stressed that UNA's broad involvement in Ukrainian community life is contingent upon its continued growth in membership and financial resources. Dr. Skalzuk, who had just taken part in the semi-annual audit of UNA assets, books and operations, summarized the findings of the week-long review. He brought the participants up to date on the construction of the 15-story skyscraper in Jersey City, discussed the possibility of bond issues to finance the construction, voiced satisfaction with the sale of the English language encyclopedia, and suggested a series of intensive short-term membership drives in major centers of Ukrainian life in America.
