Solovij Opens Exhibit "5 x 10 + 1 x 13"

NEW YORK, N.Y. — On Saturday, October 21, at 9 p.m., the public will witness the opening of Jurij Solovij's exhibit of paintings and sculpture "5 x 10 + 1 x 13".

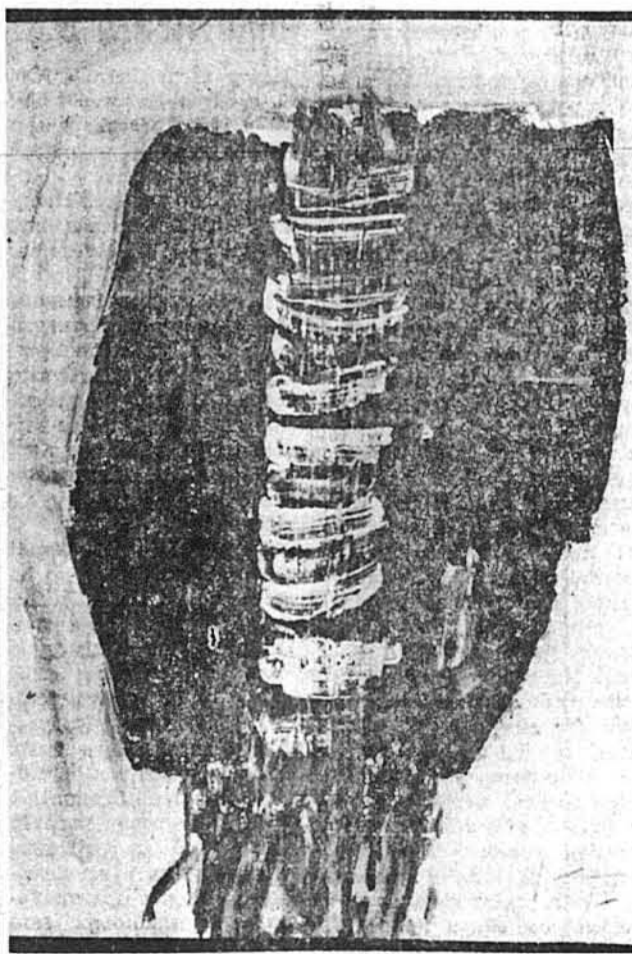
To the artistically discriminating viewer, the art of Jurij Solovij has long meant work reflecting exquisite artistic quality as well as profound intellectual substance.

As an artist, Jurij Solovij's work has evolved through several formative periods: from post-impressionism in the 1940's, through an abstract expressionism of the 1950's, to a figurative expressionism of the 1960's.

This unceasing process of exploration and development of his work, philosophy and art has brought Mr. Solovij to the threshold of a most powerful and challenging project called the "Thousand Head Series" which he began in 1970.

Mr. Solovij has exhibited widely in New York, Chicago, Toronto. Last year he had a very successful one-man show at the Gunther Franke Gallery in Munich, West Germany.

In December of this year Mr. Solovij is scheduled to have an exhibit in the St. Lawrence Art Center in Toronto. The New Jersey State Museum in Trenton also invited Mr. Solovij for a one-

man show in September of 1973. In addition to his association with the Gunther Franke Gallery, Mr. Solovij is presently negotiating with several other European galleries, among them Paul Rice of London and the Galerie fuer Zeitgenossische Kunst of Hamburg.

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Illinois U. in Chicago Starts Ukrainian Course

CHICAGO, Ill. — Prof. Myroslaw Semchyshyn gave the inaugural lecture in Ukrainian Culture and Civilization Tuesday, September 26, at the University of Illinois, Circle Campus, in Chicago...

The opening of the course at Chicago's Circle Campus of the University of Illinois represents more than a year and a half of persistent efforts on the part of a special committee, currently headed by Dmytro Hryhorchuk and Jaroslaw Hankewych.

A factor in the group's success has been the response of Ukrainian students and Chicago's community at large, notably the local "Self-Reliance" Credit Union which has contributed \$2,000 for this purpose and extended a substantial loan which made possible the opening of the course.

Proceeding Prof. Semchyshyn's inaugural lecture was a brief statement by Prof. N. Moraweciw, head of the Department of Slavic Language and Literatures, who introduced the lecturer and announced that Prof. Semchyshyn will offer a course on contemporary Ukrainian literature in the Winter quarter.

Mark Golden Anniversary

For Roman and Stephanie Smook October 28, 1972, is a date of special significance: It was 50 years ago on that day that they were joined in marriage. Today, they are marking the golden anniversary of their wedding.

There's hardly a Ukrainian in the United States who does not know Roman I. Smook, the energetic, persevering attorney from Chicago, whose involvement in Ukrainian community life is as long as it is diverse.

No major convention, no event of national magnitude over the past fifty years has gone by without the presence at times most telling, of Atty. Smook. He was there either as a delegate or officer or a concerned observer.

For hundreds, perhaps thousands, of Ukrainian refugees who were left homeless in the aftermath of World War II, the name of Atty. Roman Smook meant hope: as director of the United Ukrainian American Relief Committee in Europe from 1947 through 1949, he used his knowledge and acumen as a lawyer, his understanding and feeling of concern for the fate of his

brothers and sisters, to help them find a haven and start a new life. A member of the Ukrainian National Association since 1926, he was elected to the post of Supreme Auditor in 1937 and again in 1941. A member of Branch 425, he was a delegate at UNA's last convention in 1970 and there is no reason to believe that he will not be present at the next convention in 1974.

A graduate of Kent College of Law—now a part of the Illinois Institute of Technology—Atty. Smook will mark yet another milestone in his life next year: On June 3, 1973, he will mark the 50th anniversary of his legal practice. It was from this Institute that Atty. Smook received an honorary Juris Doctor degree last year.

Unavoidably, the Smooks have suffered many hardships in their life. The hardest blow they had to bear was the untimely death of their son, Roman W., an aerospace engineer with North American Rockwell. It was a tragic loss to the Smook family, but they overcame.

Their daughter Anita is married to Edward R. Luter and the family lives in Dallas, Tex.

The Smooks' family tree extends to two grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.
