UNA Announces New Scholarship Winners

JERSEY CITY, N.J. — Scholarships worth \$10,000 were awarded to 56 Ukrainian students by the Ukrainian National Association for the academic year 1973-74. This total number of recipients marks a record number of winners during the course of the scholarship program's 10-year history. The winners were selected from 86 applicants by a special UNA scholarship committee. This committee includes members of the UNA Supreme Executive Committee, heads of the Auditing Board, Supreme Advisors Council and the Committee for youth and student affairs, and "Svoboda" editor-in-chief. Also invited to the scholarship committee were Dr. Bohdan Hnatuk and Taras Samagala. The scholarship awards were made as follows: one for \$1,000; five — \$500; five — \$300; five — \$200; and 40 for \$100. Photo-resumes of

each of the recipient appear on other pages. In selecting the winners, the committee considered financial needs, scholastic achievements or academic progress of individual candidates, participation in the Ukrainian community life, and the area of study. In the latter category, priority is given to students majoring in liberal arts, notably history, political science, sociology and related fields, with emphasis on Ukrainian area studies. Only students who are members of the UNA are eligible for the awards. The UNA Scholarship Fund was first established in 1962, and since then 515 applications have been received and awards were made to 135 Ukrainian students for a total of \$35,000. In addition to the regular scholarships, the UNA offers full tuition scholarships to students of journalism.

Olha Holoyda, winner of top scholarship

Olha, 18, was born in Chicago, Ill., and currently lives in Neillville, Wis., where she attends the University of Wisconsin in the hopes of achieving a law degree. Olha lost both her parents within a span of one year when she was 12 years old. A graduate of Neillville High School, Olha belonged to various clubs and was engaged in numerous activities: the National Honor Society, Girls' Association, Chess Club, Pop Club, American Field Service, the Future Teachers of America, a reporter for the school newspaper, editor-in-chief of the senior yearbook, and delegate to the Melvin Laird Conference. Olha also received an Elks Club Scholarship on the basis of good academic standing and leadership, the Badger State Citizenship award, a Wisconsin Honor Scholarship and a Neillville High School Scholarship. A TUM member, Olha also pursues extra-curricular activities,



serving as an executive board member in a Ski Club, writing for the UWM Post and member in the Pre-Med Association. Olha's favorite subject are English and history and her ultimate career is to become a lawyer. The recipient of a \$1,000 scholarship, she is a member of UNA Branch 472.

SIXTH UNA TRAINING COURSE HELD AT SOYUZIVKA

KERHONKSON, N.Y. — Last Friday, June 20, the sixth Ukrainian National Association Training Course for organizers and secretaries terminated here. Upon completing the course, 72 participants received artistically framed certificates. In addition to the registered participants, a sizable number of their husbands and wives vacationing at Soyuzivka with their children, also took part in the course. UNA Supreme President Joseph Lesawyer opened the course on Sunday, June 17. Shortly after, Dr. Jaroslav Padoch, UNA Supreme Secretary, outlined the weekly training program, and Walter Kwas, Soyuzivka manager, gave information concerning the student room and board arrangements. As in the preceding training courses, the students elected a Participants Council and chose Dr. Wasył Palidwor, long-time secretary of one of the largest UNA Branches in New York and vice-president of the previous UNA convention, as head. The courses were broken into two language groups: the Ukrainian, headed by Stepan Hawrysz, assistant to the organizing department, supreme advisor and field representative; the English, headed by Eugene Repeta, also supreme advisor and field representative. The students attended 36 half-hour lectures in both groups and participated in two debate panels comprised of all the field organizers headed by Mr. Repeta and Wasył Diduk, chairman of the Board of Supreme Advisors. A question-answer session followed every lecture.

N.Y. TIMES COMMENTS ON BREZHNEV VISIT

NEW YORK, N.Y. — On the editorial page of its Sunday, June 24 issue, the editors of the N.Y. Times discussed the significance of the state visit of Leonid Brezhnev to the U.S. in light of traditional Soviet propaganda about the "menace" of United States capitalism and the persecutions and repressions which are currently in progress in the USSR. The editorial began by stating that the summit talks between Brezhnev and President Nixon greatly aided in improving Soviet-American relations and in ending the cold war, but these talks were conducted in a synthetic atmosphere. It went on to say that the entire visit was a "carefully staged public relations show". Brezhnev was conspicuously shielded from any contact with the American public and press conferences were not permitted. Brezhnev, gave many hints, according to the editorial, that the cost for continuing such cordial relations would be a flow of multibillion dollars of American credit to the Soviet Union. This credit flow would tie the U.S. economy to the USSR and its fuel deliveries from Siberia for decades to come. The fiendly tone which Brezhnev is conveying to the American government is causing a great deal of worry to the Soviet conservatives, stated the N.Y. Times, who feel that Brezhnev might be for-

Radio Broadcast Warns Against Most Favored Nation Status

WASHINGTON, D.C. — June 20 to 24. The purpose of it was to inform the American public, especially the students and young professionals which constitute the majority of this station's listening audience, about the current situation in the USSR. Three examples of acts of repression against the Ukrainians, Jews and Czechoslovaks and Brezhnev's role in them were cited in the program. Some radio stations, adhering to the policy of co-existence with the Soviet Union, refused to air this program.

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EDITORIALS

Independence Day

There is no greater holiday in the history of a nation than the anniversary of its birth. It is an even more glorious occasion when the event can be observed in freedom, with a feeling of pride in the country's past accomplishments, and with a sense of purpose in the nation's future course. For America this day is July Fourth. On that day this nation will be 197 years young.

But while the day is greeted with happy, noisy, firecracking joviality, it was not so 197 years ago. It was on July 1, 1877, that the Continental Congress, meeting in secrecy, took up the question of independence. And it was on July 2, 1776, that the Congress adopted Richard Henry Lee's resolution "that these United Colonies are and of right ought to be free and independent states." And on July 4th, the Congress finally voted to adopt the Declaration of Independence as proposed and formulated by Thomas Jefferson.

The Liberty Bell—its rim emblazoned with the message to "proclaim liberty through all the land to all the inhabitants thereof"—pealed off the birth of America on July 8, 1776, signifying the first public celebration of the nation's birth.

The record of history in the years that followed shows the growth of the nation and the development of a system of government and a way of life that has no equal in man's history. To be sure, there were convulsions in America's rise to the position of global leadership, including a civil war that threatened the country's unity. Yet at each and every turn in its history, America had the kind of leadership that not only lived up to the tasks of the hour but launched a new, bold phase in its continued progress.

And it is to America that millions around the world, still struggling valiantly for the blessings that are our here, look for hope, for leadership, for inspiration. It is with this dual sense of pride and responsibility that we should greet this July Fourth, grateful for what we have here and mindful of the hopes of millions that have yet to be fulfilled.

Ten Years of UNA Scholarships

Helping students financially to achieve a higher education has been a project of many governments, foundations, and organizations throughout the world. The Ukrainian National Association Scholarship Fund has pursued this course for the past ten years, and since its establishment in 1962, \$35,000 have been awarded to 135 worthy students. This total does not include the special scholarships which are awarded to students of journalism.

This year's 56 scholarship recipients set a record number of winners.

Among the first scholarship winners over fifty years ago was Prof. Alexander A. Gnanowsky, presently Professor Emeritus of entomology at the University of Minnesota. Prof. Granowsky came to the U.S. from Ukraine in 1913 without any knowledge of the English language, and through the aid of a UNA Scholarship, built himself up to be one of the most prominent scholars in the field of entomology.

Judging on the record of past recipients, it is no ill-found hope that this year's winners will also follow in the steps of Prof. Granowsky to prominence, that will bring glory not only to themselves, their parents but to the Ukrainian people as well.

The UNA and "Svoboda" salute and congratulate all winners, both past and present.

A nation without educated citizens is a lost people that can easily be grasped by a clever oppressor. Educated leaders enable a nation and its people to resist oppression and to wrest themselves from the clutches of imperialism.

Scholarships are but one of the many ways that the UNA helps to build a strong base of future professionals and community leaders. Since its establishment, the UNA has supported all Ukrainian scientific and scholarly societies, educational organizations, and student and youth groups. In the past year the UNA was instrumental in helping the Ukrainian Studies Fund establish two more chairs of Ukrainian Studies at Harvard University. Many scholarly works on varied topics have been published by the UNA throughout its history, among them, "A History of Ukraine" (1941) by Prof. Michael Hrushevsky, and the two volume "Ukraine: A Concise Encyclopaedia" (1971). These publications provide a most needed source of learned information about the history of Ukraine for American and foreign universities and scholars.

By these methods, the UNA helps its members to further themselves intellectually and helps its nation to receive its leaders.
